

Porkies Win Week-End Game To Take Second Place

Abitibi Drops Another to Porkies; Called in Seventh

Papermakers Find Difficulty Feilding Team but Take 9-1 Beating Gracefully. Senese Allows Five Hits, No Walks and Gets Five Strike outs. Watson and Laroque Divide Game for Abitibi.

Porkies moved up even with Hollinger in the T.B.L. on Thursday evening when they took a 9-1 game from the visiting Abitibi team.

The game didn't get under way until nearly seven o'clock since the car bearing half the Abitibi team was delayed. The papermakers had some trouble fielding a team at all, and brought only nine players with them.

Better Batting Averages Several of the Porkies bolstered up their batting averages in the 12 hits they collected in six innings, but the number of times Porcupine runners were trapped attempting steals kept the score down.

Cattarello opened the scoring by letting loose a three-bagger to right field. Wagner followed with a single to centre, bringing in the first run. Schultz went out at first. Murray hit, scoring Wagner, after being given a life when a foul fly was dropped. Chamberlain flied out as Wilkes at third made a remarkable catch. Bradley hit over short and while Hammill was at bat, began a steal. He was trapped by Johnson, Yurchuk and Gratton, but while the play was being made, Murray crossed the plate.

In the second Senese hit and was scored by Wagner. Cattarello walked and came in on Schultz' hit. Chamberlain got the only tally of the third as he hit, stole second, went to third on an overthrow to second and scored as Hammill's drive to short was fumbled. Malloy Allows Only One Hit as Crippled Macs Tie Holly

Game Called in Eighth for Darkness. Hollinger Up on the Bit, but Tough Luck Intervenes to Rule Out Winning Run. First Call for Coacher's Interference Here This Season. Same two Teams Meet at Local Ball Park To-Night.

To have a 2-1 victory snatched from them in the last inning was Hollinger's latest quota of bad luck in the T. B. L. On Friday they were tied two-all with the Macs at the end of the eighth when the game was called for darkness. It was one of the nicest games of the season, but the draw doesn't help Hollinger's standing in the league. Should Porkies win against Abitibi and Hollinger take McIntyre in to-night's game here, the two teams will still be tied for second place and the postponed Hollinger-Porcupine game will be necessary.

The Macs had three men out: Inky Wood, because of suspension; Norm Hann, ill; and Fred Callery, sore arm. Norm Malloy did the hurling for the Macs and surprised everybody by holding the heavy hitting Hollinger team to a single smash.

Lloyd Chambers was on the mound for the Holly and held the Macs to six scattered hits. He fanned seven and walked only one.

Just One Bad Inning It was in the fifth inning that Malloy went a little bad. He walked three men, hit one, and Smith got the Holly's only hit, batting in one run and forcing in another. The Macs had collected one in the second when Eddie Angrignon doubled and was brought in by Knetchel. Hits by Gilbert and MacDonald and an error by Holly allowed the tying run to cross in the eighth.

The game had plenty of highlights and gave the crowd more to talk about than they're had for a long, long time. Holly would have had three in the bad fifth but for a coacher's interference. Romualdi had walked, gone down to second as Coleman sacrificed, Chambers walked but Lortie fanned. Guidolin took a walk to fill the bags. Smith dropped a single and Romualdi came in, leaving the bases still loaded. Monaghan was hit by a pitched ball and forced over what looked like a winning run. As Howard was at bat, MacDonald catcher, let one by. V alter Coleman, coach at third, got excited and

in telling Guidolin to run home, followed him down the side of the base line. Malloy noticed Coleman, attracted Empire Scully's attention to it, and Guidolin was called out to retire the tie. It was a tough decision for Hollinger, for Guidolin's run would have won the game.

All in the game There never was a question that Coleman had run down the line with the intention of confusing the McIntyre team, but since it's definitely set out in the rules that a coach may not act in that way, the umpire had no other alternative. Hollinger didn't get another chance and in the next three innings only nine men faced Malloy.

About the end of the sixth, the sky became heavily overcast and it looked as if the game might be called but, after long deliberation, it was allowed to go to the last of the eighth. A few drops of rain fell just before the tying McIntyre run was scored by Tup, Gilbert, but it wasn't enough to suspend play.

Chambers got good support from his team mates. In the sixth Malloy had hit and gone to second as Harry Cowden sacrificed. Cybulski smashed one out just to the right of centre field in a spot that looked perfectly safe. Malloy started around the bases and was almost home when Smith made a remarkably fine catch in an outstretched glove. He pegged to Monaghan at second for the only double of the day.

Coleman Prize Peg The prize fielding play of the day was in the seventh after Angrignon and Osborn were out. Quinn put one over third that looked like a good safe Texas-leaguer. Romualdi went streaking across from third and tried to take the ball on the roll. He missed and Quinn started down to second. Coleman backed up Romualdi, recovered in nothing flat and fied the ball to Monaghan at second in time to get Quinn it looked impossible.

Malloy registered only three strike outs, but the Holly lads had a hard time making anything look safe. Eight put-outs were made on fly balls and eleven at first. In the sixth, Malloy pitched only four balls. Dorey let the first one by and cracked the second down to Cybulski at first. Wagner hit his first to Quinn at second for a put-out at first, and Romualdi grounded his first one to Cowden at short for the third out at first.

All Set for Big Shoot Here on Wednesday

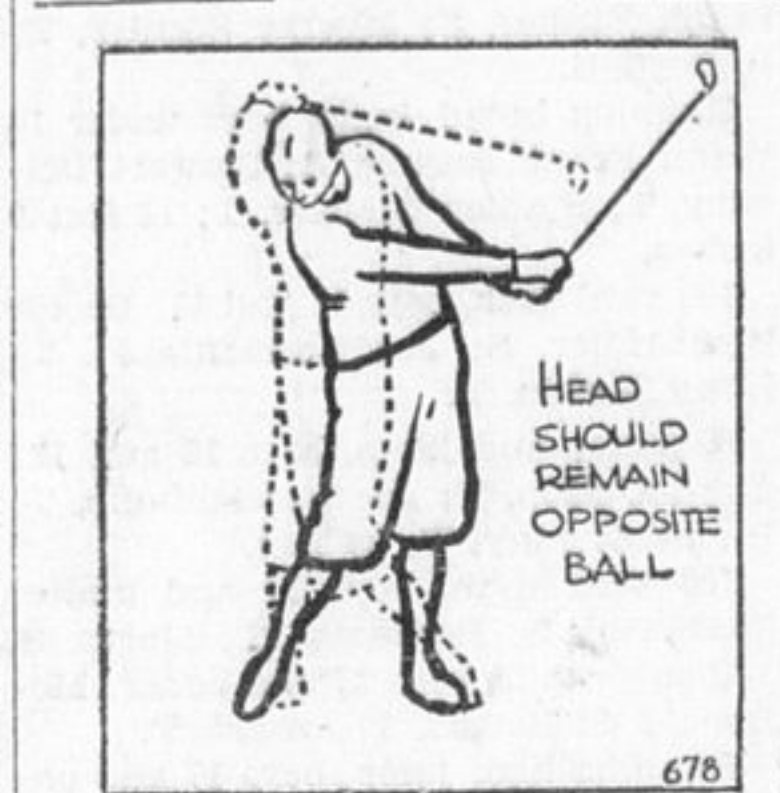
Phil Aylett Again Gets High Score in Weekly Meet of Timmins Club.

GOLF FACTS NOT THEORIES!

The player doesn't live who thinks too much about the position of his head. Certainly little enough has been said about this part of the swing.

So many players think that they hold their heads in the right position when it moves all over the place. A common fault is to let it drift forward so that it is over the left leg at the finish of the swing. This finds the top of the body swaying forward. The ball invariably goes to the right of the intended line. The clubhead is dragged through the hitting area instead of being swung with the necessary snap. The player's head should remain behind the ball until well after the moment of impact. Then both clubhead and ball will travel properly.
