

# McIntyre Nine Wins Another T. B. L. Championship

## Score 7-1 as McIntyre Takes Fourth Game of Play-Offs

Lone Porcupine Run Made Tally 2-1 in Fifth. Macs Find Cox in Eighth to Bring in Four Runs and Cinch Game. Cold Weather Makes Play Tough.

Another Temiskaming Baseball League championship was chalked up for McIntyre's big baseball team yesterday afternoon as they took Porkies in the last of the playoffs, 7-1. Ike Solomon's well-trained baseballers outplayed the Porkies at every turn through a short game in weather that suggested hockey as a more reasonable sport.

Despite the cold, a large crowd of South Enders turned out to cheer their team on, but the moral support had little effect on anyone other than Chamberlain, who appeared to be the only Porky who could find Callery's pitching. The tall young McIntyre hurler fanned nine, walked three, and allowed only four very scattered hits, never more than one an inning. The single Porcupine tally, made in the fifth inning when the team was down only two runs, came after Thomas cracked out a triple to right field. Tup Gilbert tripped in the long grass and was delayed making the return. The score came on what was designed to be a squeeze play. Hammill had fanned and Jannette had accepted a walk after the triple. Cox was at bat and, in attempting a bunt, missed the ball. Thomas, nearly at the plate as Callery pitched, turned back. Adamson threw wild to third and the runner came in.

Eddie Angrignon was the Macs' heaviest hitter. Up to the eighth, he had a perfect batting record—four times at bat and four hits. Malloy, up six times, collected three; and Quinn, with four "legals," got a pair.

### Teck Lead in First

The Macs took a nice little lead in the first inning as Malloy led off with plenty of confidence and dropped a safe one over second. Osborn sacrificed him to second neatly. Cattarello made his only error of the season by muffing a grounder from Cybulski, and Angrignon brought in both runners with a hit to deep centre field. Though Quinn was out at first, Gilbert made it two on when Wood retired the side on a fly to Wagner.

More than once Porkies managed to pull the game out of the fire, and the fans had no kick at all until the seventh. In the fifth, for instance, smart Porcupine fielding retired the Macs with three on. With only Osborn out, Cybulski, Angrignon and Quinn got on. Gilbert attempted a bunt for a sacrifice, but popped to Hammill. Play was so fast that Cy was held at third. Wood finished it off with a fly to Hammill.

### Find Cox in Eighth

The Macs really got a chance to warm up in the sixth. Osborn hit over short, but was out at second as Cybulski forced him. Angrignon drove one to deep centre and Quinn followed with a long blow to right that scored the two runners. Wagner fumbled Gilbert's attempt and after Wood was called out at first on a play from Cattarello, MacDonald smashed a single to mid-right, bringing in Quinn and Gilbert. At this point Cox was pulled from the box and Senese substituted. The young South Ender finished off the inning by fanning Callery.

## Boxing Champions of North at Sudbury

Canadian Legion, Sudbury Branch, to Stage First Real Championship Bouts There, September 24.

"For the first time in the history of Northern Ontario, a recognized championship tournament is being staged at which every embryo slugger will be given an opportunity to compete in a title meet, this tournament being held under the sanction of the Ontario Amateur Boxing Union and the winners will be recognized in future Ontario title meets," says a story in The Sudbury Star.

"This mammoth and ambitious boxing meet is being staged in Sudbury for two days commencing September 24 at the Palace Rink under the sponsorship of the Canadian Legion, Sudbury branch. All recognized classes will be represented and an attempt is being made to secure entries from all points in Northern Ontario. The classes will be at the following weights: 105 pounds, 112 pounds, 118 pounds, 126 pounds, 134 pounds, 147 pounds, 160 pounds, 175 pounds and heavyweight. The winner in each event will be presented with a medal, stating that the holder is the recognized amateur boxing champion of Northern Ontario.

"Winners of these bouts will be entitled to enter the Ontario boxing finals as champions of Northern Ontario without the necessity of competing in preliminary and qualifying rounds. The last day for entering this tournament is September 20 and all entries should be made to the secretary, Canadian Legion, Sudbury.
