

Porkies Look Easy in Third T. B. L. Play-off Monday

Batting, Fielding, Pitching, Records for T. B. L. Schedule

Dorey Led League in Hitting; Callery and Wood Close for Pitching Honours. Sixty-eight Players Took Part in Season's Baseball on Four Temiskaming League Teams.

Records for the complete season in the Temiskaming Baseball League, made up late last week, show Reg Dorey as the heaviest hitter of the league, a whole flock of good outfielders who got through the season without an error, and Fred Callery and Inky Wood just about neck and neck for the pitching honours.

The figures don't tell the whole story. Some players, particularly infielders, who made plenty errors at the beginning of the season, improved remarkably as the season wore on. But a few errors makes the fielding average hard to pull up.

Temiskaming Baseball League Winners Still Don't Have to Meet Kirkland Lake. Outlawed St. Lawrence League in Ottawa Valley Complicated Play-off Arrangements, but Seems Clear Enough Now.

WEIGHT SHIFTING CALLS FOR SIDE MOTION OF HIP

NUMBER 690
The part of the correct swing that seems most difficult for all to grasp is that covering the proper transfer of weight. The proper transfer cannot be made without some side motion of the hips.

Instead of this hip action most players move the entire body from side to side when they shift. Others rotate without any side motion of either hips or shoulders with the result that the weight always travels in a direction opposite to that taken by the hands. With the body opposing the hands, the swing cannot be successful. Concentrate on your hips. Give them all of your attention in the backswing. See that they shift straight to the right as you start the club away from the ball. Keep your head about opposite the ball and you'll experience a new freedom and power in your swing.

Macs Win 12-3 to Get Big Edge for Wednesday Game

Porkies Use Both Cox and Senese in Attempt to Stem Tide of McIntyre's Hitting. Winners Get Five Runs in Second Inning to Take the Heart Out of Porkies.

Saved from a whitewash by three runs in the last inning, Porkies lost the third game of the T.B.L. play-offs on Monday night to McIntyre 12-3.

Five McIntyre runs in the second innings took all the heart out of the losers and although there was not an inning as bad as the second after that, the boys couldn't seem to settle down to business.

Pitching was their big trouble. Cox was nervous in the first two innings and when Senese was substituted for him, the young South End pitcher showed that he wasn't in shape that day. He had pitched a full game on Friday and the management had not intended to use him on Monday. He walked two in each of the third, fourth and sixth, forcing a run in the fourth.

When it came to base running, Porkies were outguessed and outplayed. They collected eight hits off Wood in the first eight, and had three in one inning without making a single tally. Cox replaced Senese in the eighth and by that time had a confidence back. In the last two innings, he allowed no hits and gave no walks. Wood's seven strike-outs were scattered through the game, except in the ninth when Porkies seemed to be away on a batting spree with only one out, Inky fanned two to end the game.

Porkies looked pretty good as the Macs had their first batting. Malloy had hit and was on first when Osborne popped a fly to Wagner at short. Cybulski grounded one to Wagner, who threw to Cattarello to the second to force Malloy and Carlo got the ball to Hammill in time for a double play.

There was almost a repetition when the Macs went into the field. Cattarello hit over second when Wagner attempted a sacrifice. Osborn caught the pop fly that resulted and Cattarello was out as Osborn pegged across to Cybulski. Schultz and Murray hit but were left on as Thomas went out at first.

Angrignon led off in the hitting rally of the Macs in the second by cracking out a single near second. Quinn followed, but Wagner muffed. Eddie had stolen second, so the error on Quinn's batting put him on third. Gilbert drove the two runners in as he dropped one over short. MacDonald sacrificed Gilbert to second and Adamson brought him in as he curved one out to right field. Wood made it two on with another to right field, when Cox was pulled and Senese put on the mound. Malloy hit Senese's first ball out to deep center field, to bring in Adamson and Wood, but was caught at the plate on the same play as Murray played to Schultz. Osborn hit over second, but Cybulski popped to short to finish off the inning.

Though the Porkies got two on hits in the second, Chamberlain was cut off at second, Cox fanned, and Cattarello's attempt rolled out in front of Adamson for an out at first.

Senese walked Angrignon and Quinn to start off the third, and Gilbert put them in scoring position on a neat sacrifice. MacDonald chose that spot to sock out a triple to right field, bringing in two runs. Adamson and

Wood were out on files. The third was just about the same for the Macs. Malloy had been out on a fly to Chamberlain at third base when Osborn took a walk. Cybulski and Angrignon hit to load the bags and Quinn walked to force in Osborn. Gilbzt's attempt to bunt was caught by Hammill, who threw wild to third in an attempt to catch Cybulski off base, but instead allowed him to score. MacDonald filed out to centre field. In Porkies' fourth at bat, Quinn made the only unassisted double of the series. Chamberlain had hit and stolen second. Hammill fanned. Senese sent a fly to Quinn, who touched second to put out Chamberlain, who was off base. Porkies held well then until the seventh, when MacDonald started another rally by hitting between first and second. Adamson was out at first. Wood grounded one to third where Chamberlain fumbled, allowing MacDonald to reach third. Malloy cleaned off the bases with the longest hit of the day, to deep center field. He scored on Cybulski's hit, after Osborn had been out at first. Angrignon flied out to centre field.

The ninth didn't start off any too well for the Porkies, as Gilbert made a smart catch on Schultz's attempt. But Murray came through with a hit over third, and went to second on a passed ball. Thomas' drive to second was mishandled to put two on; Chamberlain grounded one to the infield, scoring Murray, and Thomas came in on the play as the Macs loosened up a bit. Chamberlain stole second and was sliding in to third as Adamson threw wild, allowing him to score. Wood fanned Hammill and Senese to finish off the game. Prize fielding efforts of the day were both made by the centre fielders. Angrignon came up from deep centre to catch a fly from Cattarello in the fifth. While the Macs were at bat in the same inning Murray took one of Malloy's in about the same place.

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London Fall Race Dates Are Altered

Toronto, Ont., August 29—New dates for the second meeting at Queens Park, in London, are from Saturday, October 5th to Saturday October 12th, it was announced to-day by Fred S. Orpen, representing his father and associates. The change was necessitated by the new dates for the Long Branch and Dufferin Park seasons. Originally it had been intended that London would close down the Canadian racing season of 1935 but the revision of dates makes it better all around. There will be continuous sport in Ontario until the season comes to a close. Horsemen will only have a short jump from Toronto to London and then back again to Toronto to finish out the season. For the London meeting, many changes are being planned and there will be quite a few additions to the plant. Fred S. Orpen, managing director, is expected to take a run up to the Forest City in the near future to start making arrangements for the season.
