Enthusiastic on Prospects of Making James Bay Area a Mecca for Tourists. Polar Bears, Walrus, Etc., Available. Banquet at Moosonee.

Moosonee, Ontario, August 28th (Special to The Advance)—Capt. Nielsen of the Hudson's Bay Company motor ketch "Fort Churchill," and S. C. Kerr, barrister, of Stebenville, U.S.A., big game hunter for the Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh, were guests of honour at a banquet at James Bay Inn on Sunday evening.
Mr. Kerr, who has spent the greater part of the summer on the islands that dot the coast of eastern Hudson Bay, hunting specimens for the Carnegie Institute, is enthusiastic about the prospects of making Moosonee and the Hudson Bay big game hunters. Polar bears and walrus make great sport for those who like to go into the odd corners of the world after game, he told the gathering.
