### To Hold New Convention at Ville Marie, Sept. 7th

A decision to hold a new convention at Ville Marie on September 7 has been reached by the president, G. A. Howard, and executive of the Pontiac Liberal-Conservative Association.

At a convention held at Campbell's Bay, Que., recently Charles Beloc, ex-M.P., was named standard-bearer when delegates and officers of the association were unable to agree as to whether proxies should be allowed. A meeting was held in Shawville later, when the executive and 40 members of the association decided to hold a new convention at an early date. Since that time two vice-presidents have interviewed the majority of delegates, and find most of them in favour of a new convention, and many members claim that the convention was not conducted according to the constitution, and is, therefore, unacceptable.

J. A. Raymond, Noranda, is being prominently mentioned for the nomination, and commands a host of supporters who are dissatisfied with the first nomination meeting claiming that it was not properly representative.

### There is also trouble in the Liberal ranks in Pontiac, there being two Liberal candidates in the field.

**INTERESTING CAREER OF ETHIOPIAN REPRESENTATIVE**

No member of London's diplomatic circle bears a more heavy responsibility at this time than Dr. A. W. Martin, who is the minister plenipotentiary in London to the Emperor of Ethiopia. His career is one of the most romantic in all the annals of the diplomatic service. Sixty-seven years ago, in 1868, he was picked up as a year-old baby on the battlefield of Magdala by a British soldier, whose regiment promptly adopted him. A kindly English lady took charge of him, and gave him his name of Araj Warguch Martin. He graduated in medicine at Edinburgh University and entered the Indian government's medical service in Burma, whence on retirement he returned to Addis Ababa to become one of the present Emperor's most trusted and intimate advisers.
