
# Drilling 92 Holes at Once in a Ford V-8 Block

### Italy or Ethiopia Must Leave League, Says Italy

The great test of the League of Nations strength began yesterday under pressure, as Baron Aloisi, the Italian delegate to the council now in session made two dramatic announcements of Italian policy. He first gave the League its choics-to choose between Ethiopia and Italy as members of the League. Italy will not remain if Ethiopia does, he intimated.

The second announcement was to the effect that Italy does not consider the Kellogg Peace Pact as binding in so far as Africa is concerned. The treaty, signed some years ago by a large majority of the nations was to outlaw war.

Aloisi's condemnation of Ethiop'a was one of the features of yesterday's African nation as a "world outlaw."
