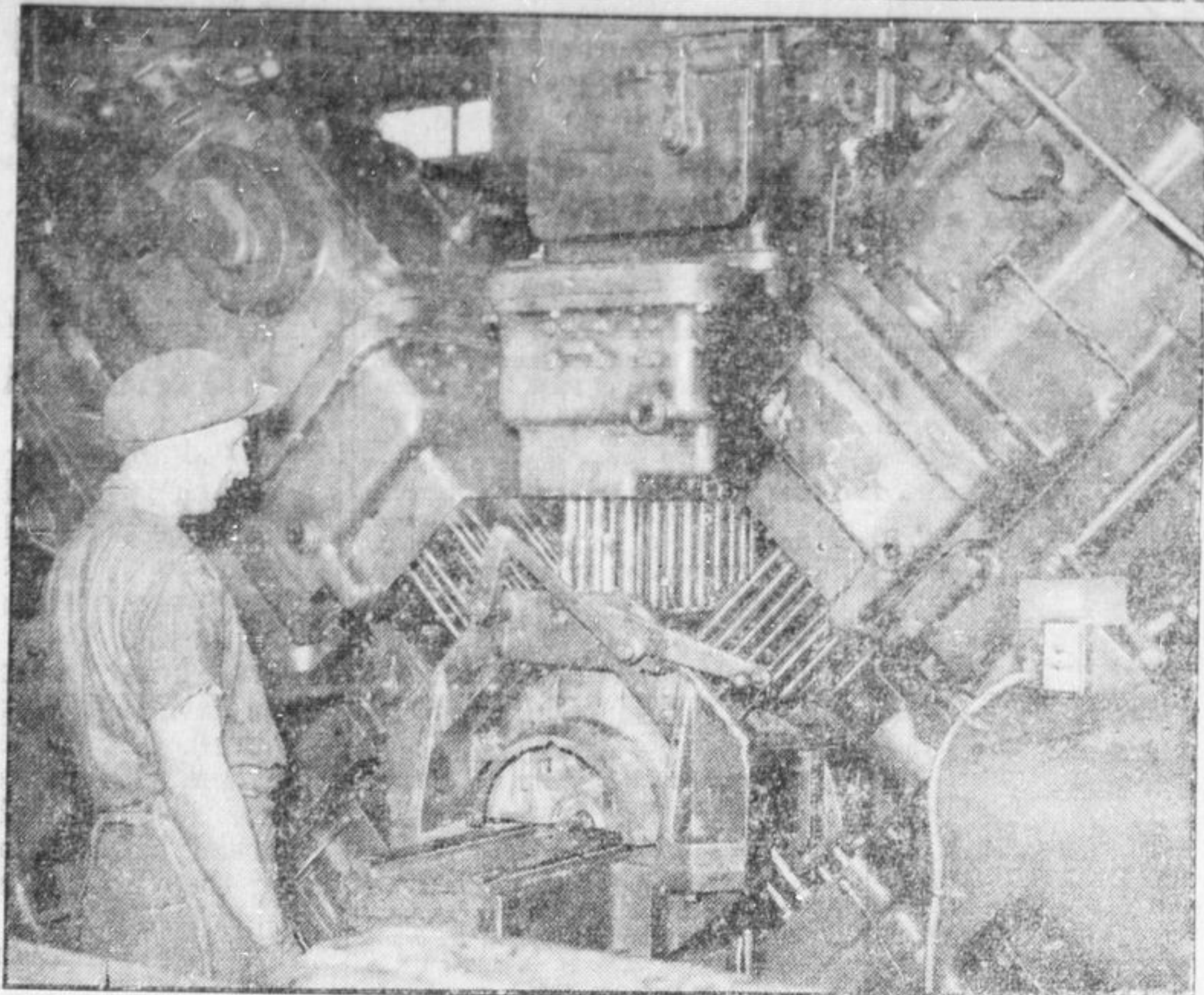


Drilling 92 Holes at Once in a Ford V-8 Block



The multiple drill in the Ford of Canada machine shop at Windsor bores 92 holes at the same time in the Ford V-8 cylinder block—a striking example of how modern manufacturing methods permit the giving of greater value every year in automobiles. Although the machine can handle 576 cylinder blocks in an eight-hour day with a single operator, this does not mean that less labor is required in the factory. More man-hours of labor at high wages are used in the manufacture of the Canadian Ford V-8 than in any earlier Ford car because standards of accuracy, durability, performance and safety are constantly rising.

ETHIOPIA MAKES FURTHER MOVE TO DEFEND FRONTIER

Reports from Ethiopia to-day indicate a fresh movement of the nation's troops toward the frontier, as an apparent answer to Italy's verbal attack on Ethiopia at yesterday's League of Nations conference.

Premier Bennett, in response to a call from Premier Aberhart, promised to help Alberta in its financial difficulties. The province has to raise \$12,000,000 at once.

Italy or Ethiopia Must Leave League, Says Italy

The great test of the League of Nations strength began yesterday under pressure, as Baron Aloisi, the Italian delegate to the council now in session made two dramatic announcements of Italian policy. He first gave the League its choice—to choose between Ethiopia and Italy as members of the League. Italy will not remain if Ethiopia does, he intimated.

The second announcement was to the effect that Italy does not consider the Kellogg Peace Pact as binding in so far as Africa is concerned. The treaty, signed some years ago by a large majority of the nations was to outlaw war. Aloisi's condemnation of Ethiopia was one of the features of yesterday's session of the council. He branded the African nation as a "world outlaw."

In the meantime, the members of the British cabinet were called from summer vacations to a hurried session at London, where this latest announcement of Italian policy will be discussed. It is likely that the outcome of the cabinet meeting will be the announcement of a definite policy on the part of Britain.

Brantford Expositor:—Sir Robert Borden, Canada's wartime premier, opened the Central Canada Fair at Ottawa and during the course of his remarks said: "I am enough of an optimist to believe that the clouds are not so dark as they were and that some glints of sunshine are commencing to stream through." Sir Robert in his own life has always manifested the cheery spirit and perhaps this is one of the reasons why he is still able to maintain many valuable activities in his 82nd year.

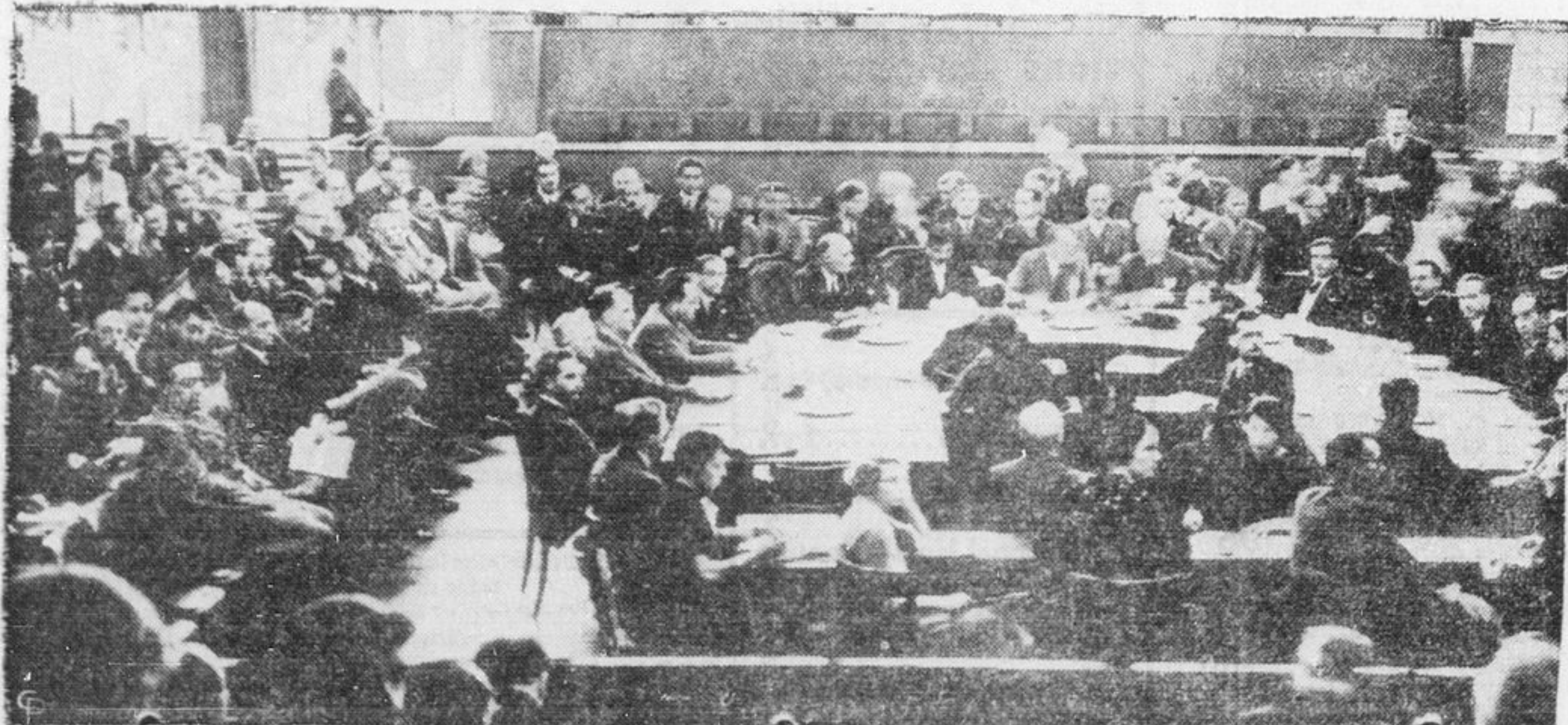
