The death of Hon. H. C. Scholfield, former minister without portfolio in the Henry administration, occurred yesterday at Toronto, following an illness.

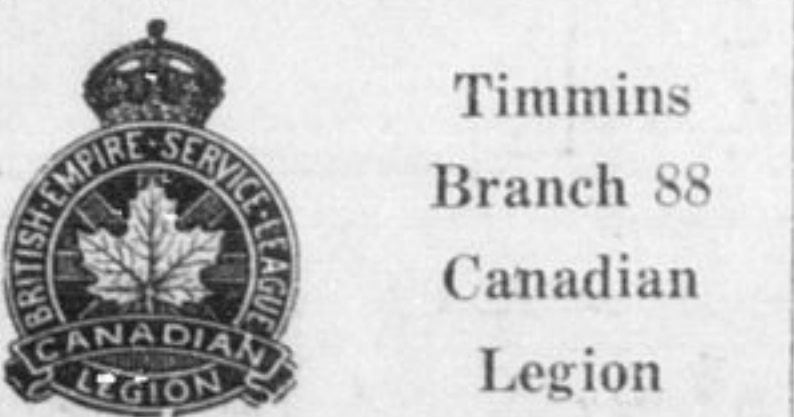
PASSENGERS RESCUED FROM THE WARD LINER "DIXIE"

The job of transferring the 219 people still aboard the ship was under way to-day and every sign pointed to complete success, with no lives lost.

ELECTION CAMPAIGN GOES ALONG NICELY ON THREE FRONTS

The election campaign is going along actively on at least three fronts. To-morrow night the Right Hon. R. B. Bennett will fire the first big gun of his campaign through a radio address. Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King is in the Maritimes and was welcomed to Halifax last night by a crowd of 7,000 people. In the West, Hon. M. F. Hepburn, premier of Ontario, is speaking for Mr. King. Last night he told a huge audience at Regina that 50 "low tariff" Liberals would be elected in Ontario alone.

Dome Will Not Work Foley-O'Brien Mine

Purchase of Property Announced on Good Authority, but Price Not Disclosed.

Foley-O'Brien Mine at South Porcupine has been taken over by the Dome mine at an unannounced purchase price it was learned this afternoon from a reliable source.

It was made clear to The Advance that the Dome places no value on the upper levels of Foley-O'Brien and will not develop the property at all. The value of the smaller mine lies in the possibility that the good ore of the Dome's lower levels may extend into Foley-O'Brien property.

Foley-O'Brien Corporation, Limited, as the mine was known in its later days, owned 520 acres immediately adjoining the Dome. A considerable amount of surface work was done in 1934, but results were not encouraging. Dome has made it quite clear that any deep underground development reaching into their newly acquired ground, will not be effected for many years. Foley-O'Brien has been acquired with an eye to the distant future. The Advance was told to-day. The sale was made outright.

Increased Output of Gold in Ontario

Porcupine Shows a Slight Gain in First Six Months of the Year. Kirkland Down.

Increased production of gold in Ontario during the first six months of 1935 over the same period last year was credited Tuesday by Ontario's Department of Mines to the new and booming fields in Northwestern Ontario, notably the Jellicoe area containing Little Long Lac.

Total gold produced from all sources in the first half of the year was 1,052,639 fine ounces, compared with 1,040,222 fine ounces in the first six months of 1934. The output increased in its actual world value from \$36,626,316 to \$36,882,698.

Production in the 1935 period came from 44 mines, with the Porcupine camp showing a slight gain and the Kirkland Lake area a loss. This deficiency was more than made good by the bringing into production of several mines in Northwestern Ontario. Prominent among these were Central Patricia, Pickle Crowe, Little Long Lac and McKenzie Red Lake, all of which milled high-grade ore.

"This area," said the departmental report, "had 20 producing mines during the period with output rising from \$1,334,204 for the first half of 1934 to \$2,634,720 in 1935. Mining development is reported as most active from all the principal camps as well as the newer fields."

Estimated at the standard price of \$20.67 a fine ounce, production this year was valued at \$21,759,971, as against \$21,503,242 for the first half of 1934. The actual world price value in each case was more than \$15,000,000 higher.

The province's total metallic mineral production from January to June this year was valued at \$65,598,201, more than \$2,000,000 higher than the first six months in 1934 when the figure was \$63,332,940. Chief gains were in gold, copper and nickel.

When, after the first council meeting of the new cabinet, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett posed with four newly appointed ministers for a newsreel talking picture, he displayed keen interest in the sound camera's mechanism. "How does that gadget work?" he asked, and was promptly invited to try it for himself. Here is Mr. Bennett, his right eye glued to the view finder, trained on the Peace Tower. Ear-phones attached to the headpiece enable him to hear through the sound apparatus the chimes announcing the hour. Professional cameraman Roy Tash is demonstrating. Note Mr. Bennett's hat on the grass beneath the tripod. In other words—his hat is in the ring!

Took Poison, but is Likely to Recover

Arthur Douglas is Making Good Progress to Recovery at St. Mary's Hospital After Narrow Escape.

Arthur Douglas, 141 Kirby avenue, rear, is in St. Mary's hospital making unusually good recovery from poisoning by potassium permanganate. He admits taking the poison on Tuesday afternoon. About 4 o'clock on Tuesday Dr. Day was called to the Douglas home and found the man suffering from the effects of some form of poison. The police were notified and Douglas hurried to the St. Mary's hospital. At first it was feared that there was no chance of the man's recovery, as the effect of the poison is to cause internal burns. Under the care given him, however, he appears now well on the way to recovery and will not likely be permanently affected by the poison. For some time past Douglas has been in considerable trouble, his wife having left him with three young children to care for. A visit to the home this week after the poisoning showed that the man had been giving the children the best of care and attention, as well as keeping the home very neat and clean. Apparently, however, Douglas became dependent, and admits attempting to end it all on Tuesday. Douglas has been employed for some years by the T. & N. O. and all who know him speak in high terms of him.

Noted Ten-piece Orchestra Coming to the Riverside

Guy Grayson and his Royal Collegians of St. Thomas, on a first tour of the North, will be in Timmins this Friday evening, when they will fill an engagement at the Riverside pavilion. The band is a ten-piece one and has attracted much favourable comment in other Northern centres. Straight admission will be charged.

Half-Million Belgians Honour Their Dead Queen

The body of Belgium's beloved Queen Astrid was borne to the Royal crypt in the Church of Our Lady of Laeken on Tuesday at Brussels, Belgium through streets lined with 500,000 of her sorrowing subjects.

The Queen, tragically killed last week in a motor accident in Switzerland rests beside the late King Albert and other members of the dynasty founded by Leopold I in 1831.

The street lamps and even the taxicab headlights were veiled in black, while from windows and building tops crepe steamers and black flags formed a somber passageway along the whole route of the procession.

In contrast to the funeral just 18 months ago of the ill-fated King Albert, when the military note was dominant in tribute to a great leader, Tuesday's tragic sequel was a nation's even more impressive tribute to its beautiful young Queen.
