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## Communists Order World-wide Trouble

### Campaign to Overthrow the Capitalistic System and also Destroy the Middle Classes.

According to United Press despatches from Moscow the recent session of the Communist International held in that city ordered world-wide co-operation of communists and other "true left elements" to establish revolutionary governments in all countries and to continue the policy of creating trouble in all lands except the Soviet. Resolutions along this line were passed at the Moscow gathering which was attended by several of the leaders in the Soviet autocracy.

Fascism and capitalism must be crushed as the worst enemies of Communism, the resolution said, and this will be accomplished by the substitution of offensive for defensive tactics. While the proletariat can overthrow Fascism, it is dangerous to think that Fascism will fall automatically, and "therefore a struggle is necessary."

#### Program Is Special

Basic aims of Communism, as outlined in the resolutions, include:

1. Control of all banks and industry.
2. Weakening of the economic and political power of the middle class.
3. Assumption of leadership by workers.

4. Dismissal of police and substitution of a workers' militia.
5. Eventual seizure of all governments.

The Comintern ordered establishment of a united front by the working class of every country in preparation for future "great struggles in the second phase of the proletarian revolutionary."

"Only the combining of the proletariat into a mass political army will assure victory in the struggle against Fascism and capitalism for creation of Soviet governments," the resolutions said.

Communists were empowered to support Liberal, non-Communist governments if they oppose capitalism and Fascism and do not hamper the Communist party, but participation in such regimes must be determined in accordance with local conditions.

Conditions necessary for creation of a government by the united front of the proletariat were defined as follows: "When the middle class state apparatus is so paralyzed it can no longer interfere with the united front, when the masses of workers vigorously react against Fascism even though they are not yet ready to fight for a Soviet government, and when the greater part of the organization of social democracy struggle against Fascism and other reactionaries and are ready to co-operate with Communists."

To Organize Masses

Condemning German Fascism as the "first of a counter-revolutionary movement," the resolutions set forth specific means for combating enemies of Communism and strengthening the hands of the proletariat through the co-operation of existing left parties and organization of the non-political masses.

The orders include:

1. Establishment of a united front against Fascism, and the awakening of the masses through slogans adjusted to local conditions.
2. Inform the masses of means of defending themselves against Fascists and capitalists, complicate preparation of imperialist wars, weaken the middle classes and strengthen the proletariat.
3. Use offensive tactics against capitalism, aiming toward an ultimate mass political strike.
4. Refuse to give up the principles of the Communist party, but at the same time abide by working agreements made with other groups and reveal immediately to the masses any attempts made by others to sabotage the united front.
5. Oppose state sale of peasants' property, struggle for state aid for impoverished peasants and oppose state salary cuts and cultural reaction.

## Will Net \$5,000,000 from the Quintuplets

### Dr. Dafeo Says that Ontario will Profit Very Largely from Tourist Trade to See the Famous Five.

Dr. Dafeo, medical adviser for the famous Dionne quintuplets, and one of the guardians of the babies, was in Toronto last week attending the Canadian National Exhibition. While the father and mother of the famous five passed almost unnoticed, Dr. Dafeo seemed to attract very general notice. It seemed almost as if when he was not being photographed he was being questioned as to the quintuplets, their present, future and past. He is supposed to have said that Ontario would be the richer this year by at least five million dollars on account of the famous quintuplets.

Five million dollars is a lot of money. Few men acquire such a fortune in a lifetime of effort, but this is the sum that will be amassed for the people of Ontario in four short months by five wriggling baby girls in Northern Ontario.

There is no need to name the infants. The whole world knows who they are. Their father cannot "preach a better sermon" or "build a better mousetrap than his neighbour," but he did build his house in the woods, and in spectacular fashion the world has "made a beaten path to his door."

This path has become a highway to the home of the Dionne quintuplets at Callander—a road that leads to a tourist attraction unparalleled as yet, in Ontario. And there are no signs of waning interest.

Dr. Allan R. Dafeo, the genial country doctor who brought the famous five into the world, was a guest at the Canadian National Exhibition. He made the trip from Callander to take part in the Fleischman Yeast Hour broadcast under the direction of Rudy Valle. The famous showman, Valle, will interview the equally famous physician—what about no one knows—not even Dr. Dafeo.

But to get back to cold figures—Dr. Dafeo himself has admitted that he is a bit amazed at the earning power of his charming charges as far as the province generally is concerned. Since the first of June there has been a steady stream of cars to the Dionne Hospital totalling on a conservative estimate 500 a day. They have risen to over 1,000 a day.

By the end of September the total will reach approximately 60,000 vehicles. Seventy-five per cent. Dr. Dafeo declared are American cars. He believes it fair to say that every car from the U.S. carries four passengers—many more than this—and figuring each car leaves \$100 in Ontario from the time it crosses the border until its return the figure reached the staggering total of nearly \$5,000,000. The province, it is estimated, will derive \$70,000 in gasoline tax from the American visitors during the same period.

With this flood of new wealth pouring into Ontario, hotels at North Bay and numerous centres in that area are enjoying record business. As to future business, Dr. Dafeo is not prepared to venture a guess, but he did say that 25 per cent. of the American visitors had never been in Canada and they assured him they were going home to tell their friends to go north to the "Land of the Quintuplets."

"Wonderful," Dr. Dafeo declared as he talked of the great impetus to tourist traffic. But his face became serious and he wagged a finger, saying: "It must not be forgotten that the health of the quints comes first."

"I realize fully," he said, "that the birth of these children in Ontario is a great drawing card. It is a fine thing for the North and a fine thing for the province as a whole, but the health of the babies will not be impaired or endangered."

Dr. Dafeo is one of the official guardians of the Dionne babies, under provincial legislation. He was asked to forget this fact for a moment and say, from the standpoint of a physician, when the quintuplets could go on public view in an exhibition or show.

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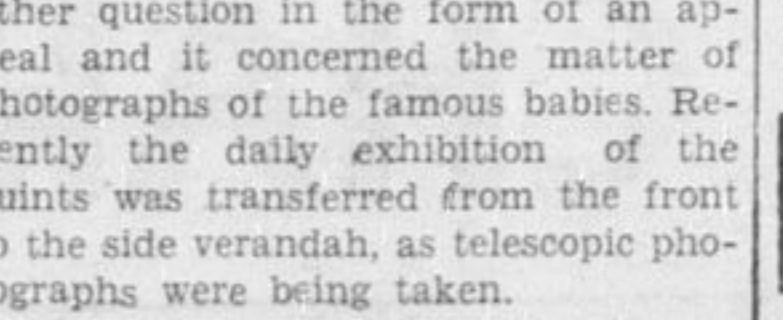
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
