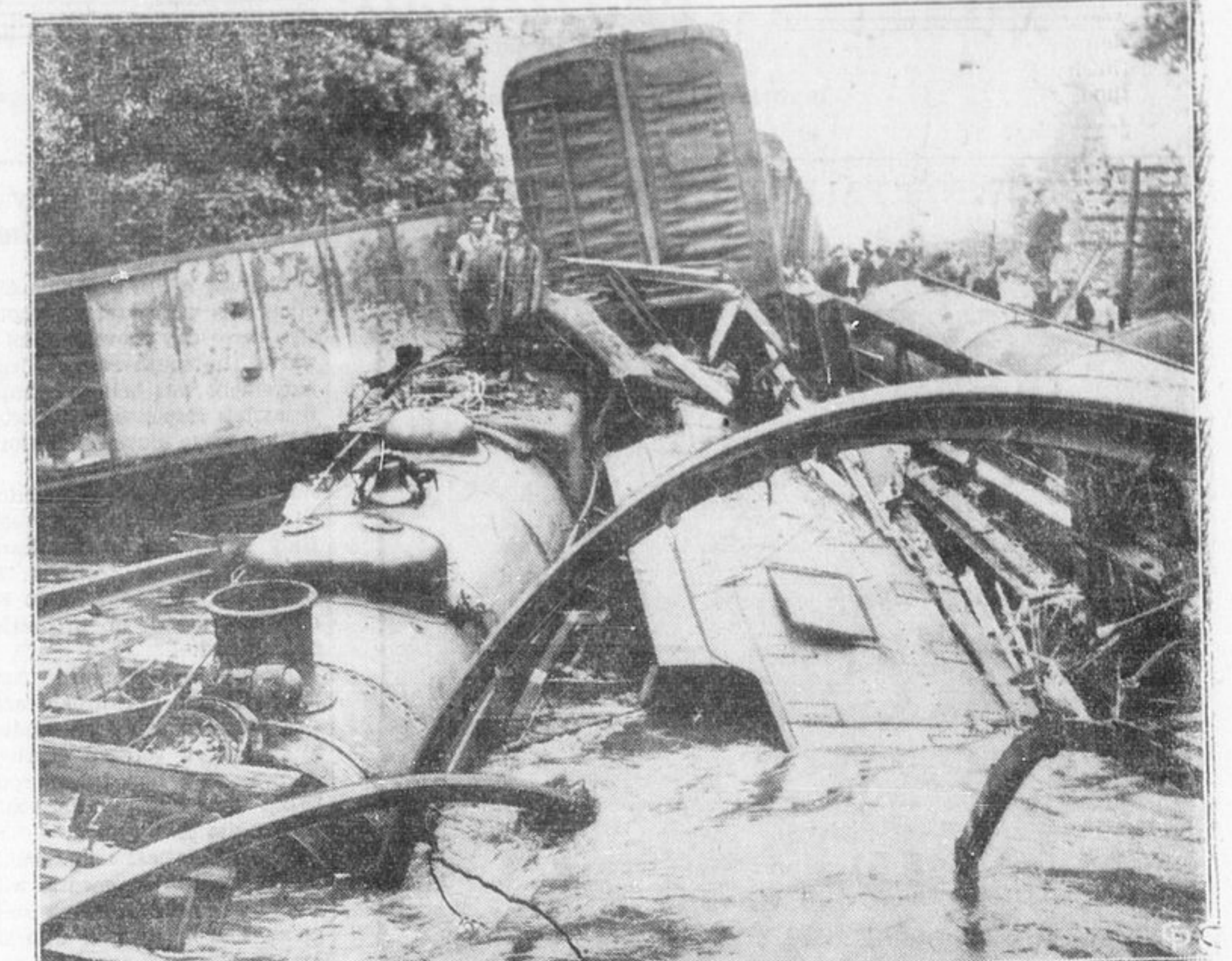

Washout Wreck Takes Lives of Three Trainmen in Delaware



Three trainmen were killed in this washout-wreck, and one was injured, as torrential rains swept through Delaware, Maryland and Virginia to leave conditions only slightly less chaotic than in the Florida hurricane belt. This wreck occurred a few miles north of Harrington, Delaware. The right-of-way had been examined by railway officials only a few hours before culvert crumbled and the oncoming locomotive, one tank car and two box cars plunged into the creek.

League Makes Final Effort to Stop War

Nations Large and Small to Back up Peace Covenant is To-day's Big News from Overseas.

The effort being put forward at Geneva to halt preparations for war between Italy and Ethiopia was this morning brought to a peak when a large number of nations, large and small, solemnly pledged their support of the peace covenant.

In the meantime Great Britain, after a hurried counsel at London of the cabinet, decided to send additional troops to fortify the garrison at Malta, one of the key positions in the eastern Mediterranean.

October 10th might be "zero" for the outbreak of hostilities in Africa, it was freely predicted at Rome as further details of the movements of the Italian fleet in the Red Sea, the Gulf of Aden and the Indian Ocean became known.

Ethiopian forces have been moved 18 miles inland from the border, it was stated at Addis Ababa, "to avoid any border incidents with Italian troops reported near the same area."

Egypt, not so far from the scene of Italy's attempt to gain a new colony, will add new airplanes to its air force. A loan of \$200,000 is being floated in Great Britain.

Death of Woman in Cell from Acute Alcoholism

Mrs. Willie LaRose, who with her husband was Under Arrest for Neglect of Children, Died in her Sleep on Tuesday Morning at Town Jail.

Mrs. Agnes LaRose, wife of Willie LaRose, was found dead in her cell in the Timmins police station on Tuesday morning about 4:30. The doctors give the cause of death as acute alcoholism. The woman had been taken in charge of the previous morning on account of conditions at her home. As the woman appeared suffering from the effects of alcohol the police were keeping special watch on her. About 4:30 Constable Culhane looked in her cell to see if she was all right, and found that she had passed away in her sleep. Less than half an hour before the police had looked in the cell and Mrs. LaRose had been sleeping quietly. Apparently she was not troubled with any pain or discomfort.

Found on Floor, Drunk
Monday morning about four o'clock the police were called to 16 Columbus Avenue, some of the LaRose children being outside at that time seeking medical aid for the parents. Both Willie LaRose and his wife, Agnes, were found in very intoxicated condition, lying on the floor below the bed. There were seven children in the family, the youngest, 10 months old, and the only beds they had were on the floor with old blankets and coats for bed and clothing. A doctor was called and attended the couple and under his authority they were removed to the jail. Three weeks ago they had been released on bonds to stop drinking and look after their family, at that time being charged with contributing to juvenile delinquency through neglect and drunkenness. Similar charges again were preferred against the couple on Monday, while the children were taken to the Shelter for proper care.

"Acute alcoholism" was given as the cause of Mrs. LaRose's death in the death certificate. The funeral was held this morning to St. Anthony's Church, the husband being shaved and dressed and taken to the funeral by the police. An inquest will be held into the death at 5 p.m. to-day.

Mrs. LaRose was 35 years of age and the mother of nine children.

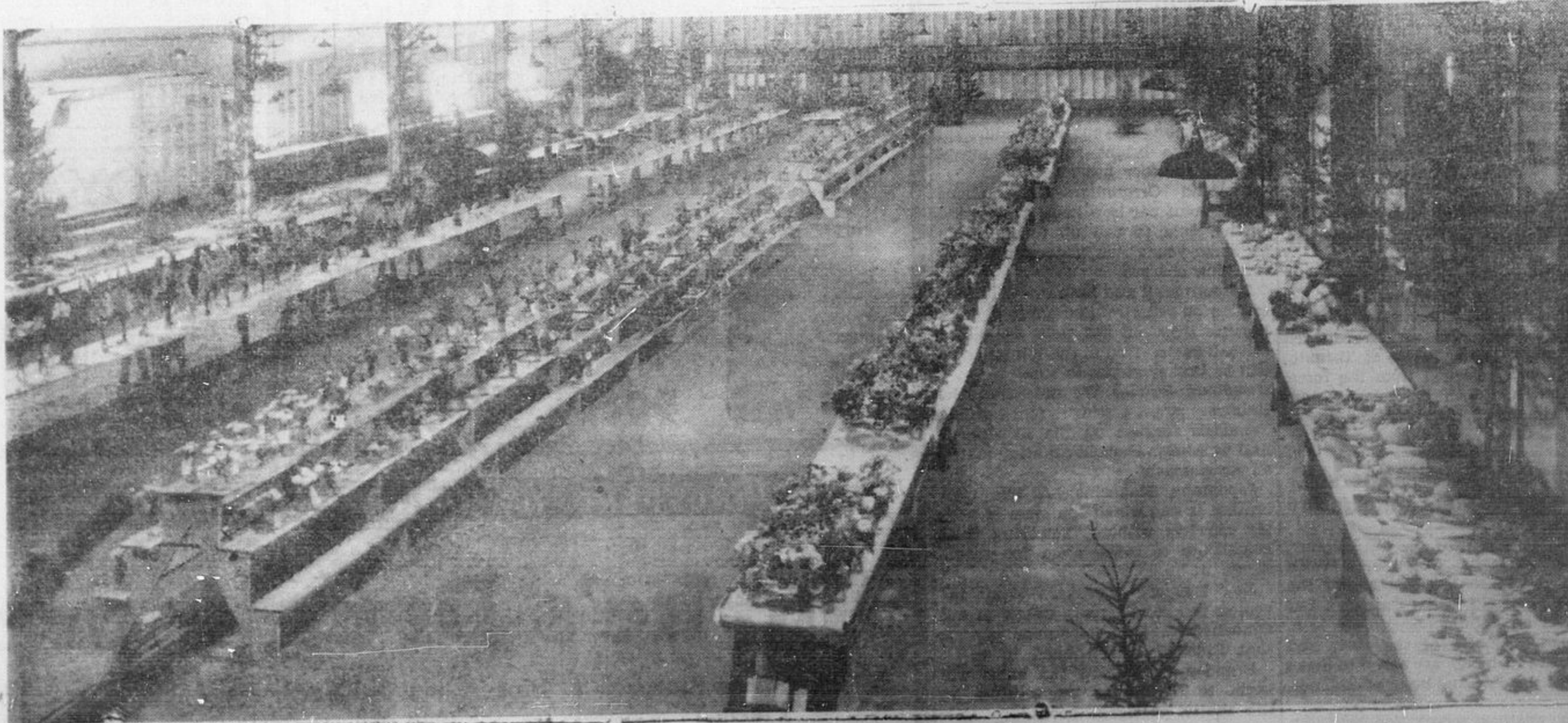
Opening Meeting of Daughters England
