Alberta's Premier Gets Federal Loan

Two and a Quarter Million Will Carry Western Province Until New Government Elected.

Premier Aberhart, Social Credit premier of Alberta, succeeded yesterday in obtaining a loan from the Dominion treasury of \$2,250,000, it is reported today from Ottawa. The premier came east with the pur-

pose of borrowing about \$12,000,000, but the present arrangement will carry the province through until the end of October, when negotiations for a further loan of \$18,389,000 will be opened with the new government.
