The magistrate held that the lodging for man and wife had been procured when Forst had been given a room, and even though he did not use it, an offence had been committed.

His Cheques Bounced
Dan J. Ross, of South Porcupine, was given two months hard labour when it was proven that he had passed a number of cheques on non-existent bank accounts. He had appeared in South Porcupine police court in the morning, but the charge had been altered and Chief McNinis, of the Township of Tisdale police, brought the case to Timmins for hearing.

One young man, with whom Ross claimed to have been in partnership on some mining claims, had been stung for \$100 on two cheques.

Drunk Driver Jailed
Jonas Senela ran over a bicycle on the street a few days ago. He got into a heated argument with the owner of the "bike" as to whose fault it was. Police happened along at the time and found Senela drunk. Two doctors, called to the police station at the time, confirmed this. He was sentenced to 10 days' hard labour for being intoxicated in charge of a car.

Mrs. Evelyn Peltomaki had been a "little fuddled," she claimed when police had made a raid on her place not long ago. She obstructed the officers in their duty, at any rate, and was fined \$25 and costs for not being more prompt when told to "open the door in the name of the King."

Five common drunks pleaded guilty

and were fined \$10 and costs each and Emella Haikala, second offender, paid \$50 and costs for the same offence. One man, found with liquor in his possession in a public place, contrary to the L.C.A., was fined \$10 and costs. A drunk charge against a man found in a kind of fit was withdrawn and he was released.

LaRose Charge Held Over
Willie LaRose, whose wife died in the cells this week from the effects of alcohol, was not able to answer a charge, against him of contributing to the delinquency of children by habitual drunkenness, since he had hardly recovered from the effects of a condition that the authorities considered due to alcohol.

An assault charge in which a man "fell" against a wood pile and got a black eye, was dismissed for lack of evidence. No one had seen him struck by the man he claimed was his assailant.

Used In-uting Language
George Blais applied to Relief Officer I. E. Dunn for relief. After the usual questions had been asked it was not considered a proper case for relief, whereupon Blais burst into a tirade of abuse. It cost him \$5.00 and costs in Tuesday's court.

Tondena Guisepe failed to return to the scene of an accident as promptly as he should have and paid \$25 and costs for "forgetting." His driving license was suspended for 30 days.

One speeder paid the usual \$10 and costs and another motorist paid the same for having defective brakes.

One Timmins citizen paid \$10 and costs for disorderly conduct.
