Quarrel of Families in Juvenile Court

Juvenile Court Judge Warns Both Families and Children. Destruction of Property Not to be Allowed.

Trying to get to the bottom of a quarrel between two local families, Magistrate Atkinson spent some time in juvenile court on Tuesday taking evidence on both sides. In the end, though he did not reach the bottom of the trouble, one young lad will report to Mr. Carson once a week for three months.

One family accused the other's children of having thrown stones through the windows. A seven-foot board fence was erected but still the trouble did not stop, so another three feet and a half was added. Still another window was smashed so one family laid a complaint. All appeared in police court

with varying stories. The children denied ever having thrown rocks at their neighbours' windows, though they admitted there was some bad feeling. The magistrate warned both parties that there was to be no more destruction.

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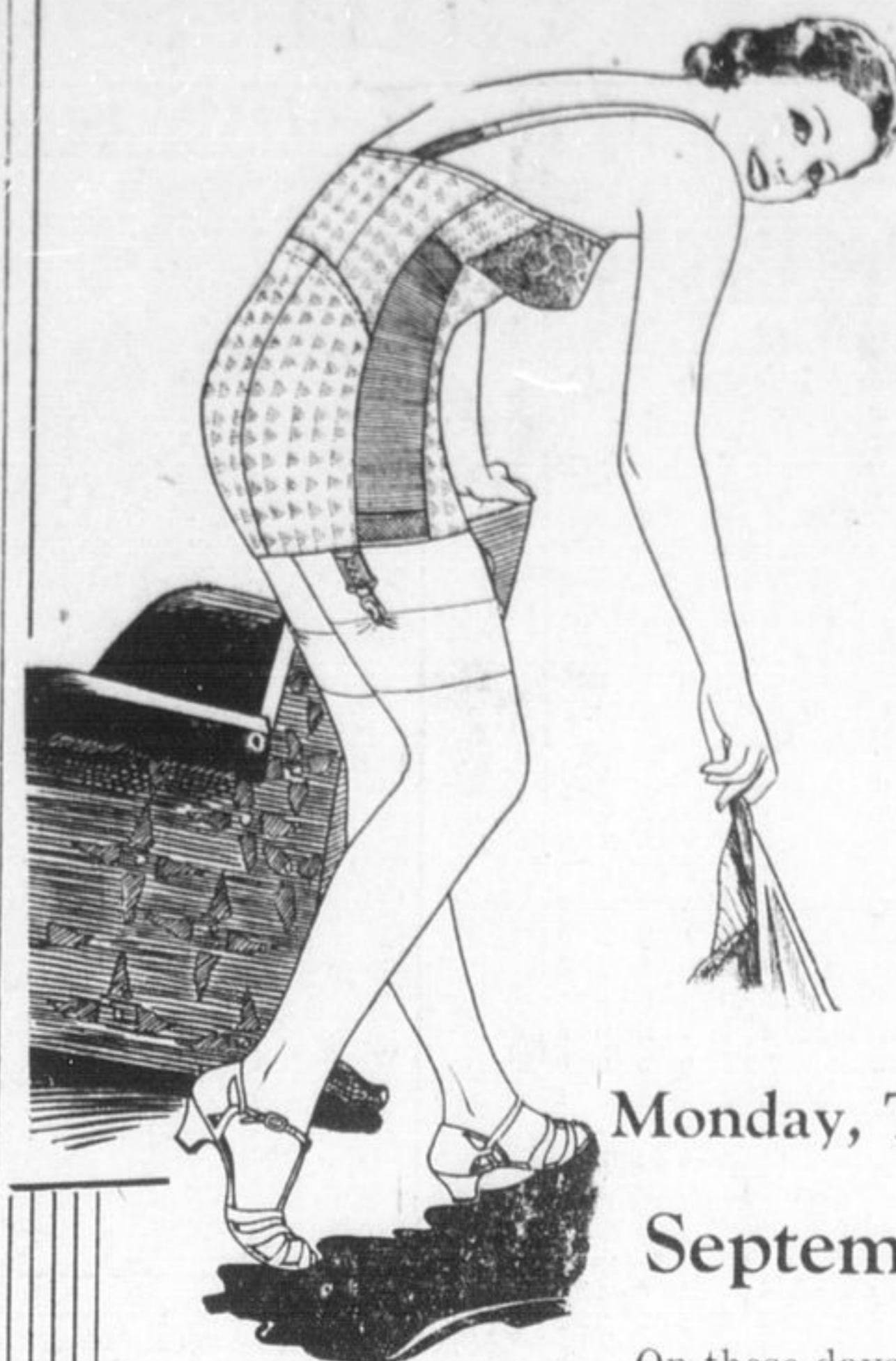
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Representative Southwestern Ontario men to Tour the North This Month. At Timmins Sept. 24th.
