But it's the first time in many moons that there's been a knockout scored; the first time stalling boxers have been called properly; and the first time the programme has gone the way the announcements read. Had it not been for someone stealing the bag of resin the bouts would probably all have been run off with as little delay as possible.

Entries for Northern Ontario's first properly sanctioned boxing championship event were arriving at Sudbury last week in daily increasing numbers. This boxing championship event is to be held at Sudbury on Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 24th and 25th, under the auspices of the Canadian Legion. It will be held in the Palace rink, Sudbury, under the blessing and approval of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Association. Unlike so many events of the kind that have barded the boxing sports of the North the event is under proper auspices and not a private venture for gold-diggers for financial gain, irrespective of what may happen to the public or the sport.

From the entries received last week there promises to be a representative gathering of all outstanding leather pushers from this section of the province. Two boys have already entered from Toronto, while Kapuskasing, that hustling little newsprint town, is sending a team of contestants with representatives in five of the nine classes. Others will be at Sudbury from Timmins, Kirkland Lake, North Bay, Sudbury and probably one or two from Sault Ste. Marie and the likelihood of an entry or two from Quebec.

The championships won at this meet will entitle winners to enter all-Ontario bouts with the prestige of "Northern Ontario champion" and suitably engraved medals will be presented by the Legion to all winners.

Last night brought the first real frost of the fall to Timmins. The thermometer dropped to 29 degrees during the early hours of the morning. By eight o'clock it had risen to 33 and the warm sunshine of the morning brought it up still farther.

The first snow of the season fell early Sunday morning with the light cold rain but it was not in large enough

quantities to remain on the ground.

It will be generally fine with moderately cool temperatures during the next few days, the weatherman predicted this morning. More frost will likely be felt during the next day or so. Rain or snow may be expected at almost any time.

Rain fell during the period on Thursday, .03 inches; on Friday, .02 inches, and on Saturday and Sunday, .30 inches.

Miss Kathleen Weir, of Montreal, Que., was the guest for a few days last week of friends and relatives in Timmins and district.

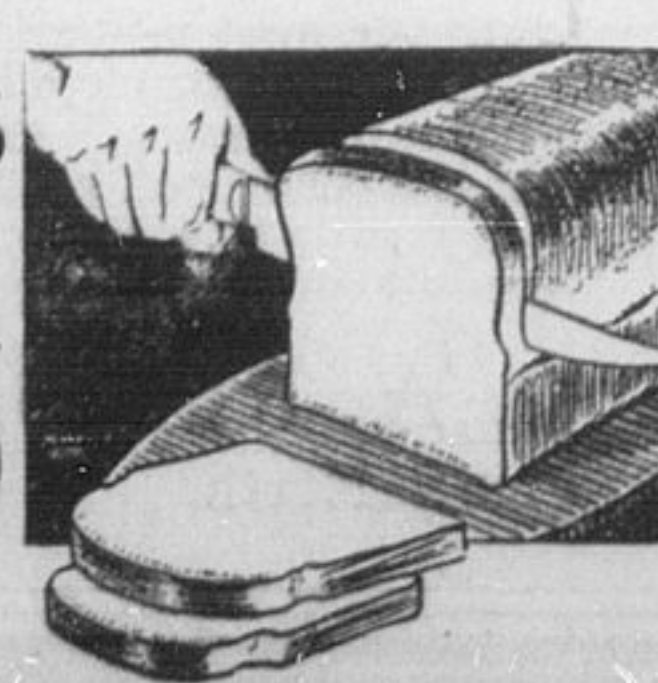


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
