Better Schumacher Team Loses Out in Ninth Inning

Best Game of Season Attracts Small Crowd as Cold Weather Threatens to Spoil Sport. Schumacher Leads Local Team by Two Runs Until Eighth Inning when Studor Smashes Out Home Run.

After being down two runs to Schumacher for five innings, Studor for Friedmans softball team came through in the eighth with a home run, when Grant was on third, to tie the score; and in the next inning Morin smashed out a two-bagger to right field and scored after a high fly by O'Connor had been caught, to take the district championship.

In the meantime Studor had made the circuit and had chased Fox in to tie the score at 2-2. The softball president was appealed to, as well as the umpire, but since no ground rules had been laid down before the game, the hit was allowed for all the runner could make of it.

It was just one of those things that's likely to happen in the best managed softball leagues.

The winning run was scored as Schumacher let up for a minute. Morin deserved the two bases he made from the hit and no amount of perfect play could have prevented it. Sparks made his only wild pitch of the day to allow the runner to make third. O'Connor gave a high foul fly that looked like a sure out, but Neddo made his only error in a good many games by dropping the spinning ball. Terry lifted the next one high into left field, and Morin sprinted for home. He reached there long ahead of the fine peg by Phillips.

Wadsworth K.O.'s Bud Snyder in Eighth After Poor Show

Bad Match in Friday Night's Main Bout Makes Former Winnipeg Boxer Look Easy for Local Lad Just Returned from Successful Prolonged Tour. Belanger Loses One Round to Reno as he Bites Opponent's Shoulder.

Len Wadsworth, 155 pounds, battered Bud Snyder, 159, around the ring for seven three-minute rounds here on Friday night and finally finished the fight off with a knockout late in the eighth. Wadsworth had the heavier former Winnipeg boxer groggy in the third and put him to the canvas for a count of nine about half way through the round. The bell rang at the count of eight the next time Bud went down.

The fight should have ended right there, or at least early in the fourth round, but Wadsworth kept jabbing away, never scoring a really heavy blow to the head. Snyder stood up straight and took it until it looked as if he might fall down from sheer exhaustion. Wadsworth appeared to have some trouble in keeping Snyder's head still enough to land a haymaker on the chin. He started several from the floor but they were wild.

The bout was announced "for the middleweight championship of the Dominion." Wadsworth's jabbing left got in its effectiveness early in the fight. He won every round on points, showed the fans some nice feinting and a little slugging. If Len was really trying to finish the local lad off early, then Bud showed amazing stamina. At the close of some of the rounds he hardly knew which corner was his. The crowd liked it, up to the fourth, but after that it was just a matter of time.

Bit Opponent on Shoulder
The only other real fight of the evening was between Babe Belanger at 138 and Kid Reno at 135. Belanger won the scrap because of Reno's unethical tactics, but lost the last round, Art Leonard, the referee, announced, because he bit Reno on the shoulder.

The contestants developed a habit of rushing from their corners at the first sound of the bell and going at it hard and heavy. Reno had to be warned time and again for hitting while the referee was breaking the clinches. He was almost too powerful for Belanger and the Babe had to take some batterings. Reno looked less like a boxer about the fifth when he insisted on coming out with a stiff left, holding it so high that Belanger got in some hard ones to the heart. Even

Tommy Searle scored the only goal of the first half as Rodgers centred to a melee in front of the Dome net. Tommy carried the ball through and Jimmy Hendry feinted, throwing Baxter off his game. The goal then looked easy.

Richmond Gets Dome Counter

Late in the second half after many fruitless attempts in which Brockbank was the strong man of the Macs team, Dome evened it up on a pretty play. Paynter centred to Lone who tried to head the ball in. Brockbank batted it out, but the tall Richmond was there and headed it right back at him. Brockbank couldn't recover in time to take the second one.

A minute later the Macs, properly organized for the first time in the game, got back their single goal lead. Grassem made the play down the left wing, circled in toward centre and kicked in the general direction of Ed. Dunstan. Ed. couldn't get his head to it and it glanced off Paynter toward the net, where Jimmy Hendry drove hard to the cord.

Dome had the first scoring chance of the game as McCurdy took the ball from a McIntyre forward and got well in for a shot. Grassem had a chance as the play was removed to the other end of the field. He picked up a loose ball in front of the net and drove it hard to Baxter's stomach.

Macs Have Trouble at Centre

The Macs on the attack didn't appear to get into trouble until they got up past centre field when faulty passing and lack of position playing lost them the play time and again. The Dome on the other hand, got well in on Davis and McAdam often enough, but failed to get into scoring position before the backs would break it up.

After Searle's goal, the Dome did try hard to even it up. A foul on McAdam, dangerously close to the penalty area gave them a real break but they failed to make anything of it, even on a corner that followed.

The Macs opened the second half intent on scoring and carried the play down the field to keep it there for a few minutes. As the teams settled down to regular play, Dome began to look a shade better than the McIntyre. Richmond missed a grand opportunity to score the Dome's first goal when he took a well-timed cross from Paynter and shot wide of the net. The visitors kept the ball in the Macs defence area, but couldn't make an impression.

Brockbank had to save a good many times before the ball was really cleared. When the Macs did get going, it was Grassem who made the play again. He centred to Hendry for a perfect try, but the ball just grazed the bar.

Baxter Saves Many

Grassem crossed to Ed Dunstan for a nice opportunity but Baxter saved. The Dome goalie had a bad few minutes then, and proved his ability when he stopped a bullet-like shot from Hendry. He had to go down to knock it out. Ed Dunstan took the rebound, but Paynter blocked the kick.

Lone gave the Dome their next scoring chance as he passed over to Crawford at the net. From a few feet out, a freak kick sent the ball sailing up over the net. Brockbank had his troubles with a tricky one kicked by Lone that was just deflected by Davis. Another two inches and it would have been in.

The two goals near the end of the game provided a real finish. After that Mair, Searle and Reg Dunstan all had shots at Baxter within a few seconds, but all were well stopped.
