Car Destroyed but Driver Escapes Without Injury

The story of a man's miraculous escape from injury in an accident that wrecked his car comes from Kirkland Lake. John Swreogos, of Kirkland Lake, was driving on the Rouyn road about a mile from Kirkland when his car turned over in the ditch. The car, a large sedan, is a total loss, so badly was it smashed up. Indeed the car appeared as if it had been struck by a couple of locomotives so thoroughly was it wrecked. The miracle was in the fact that the driver, Swreogos, and two men with him in the car at the time, escaped any injury of any account. They have one or two bruises and scratches, but were so little the worse for the accident that they may well be said to have escaped unhurt. The car appeared to take all the force of the accident and while the turnover certainly wrecked the car, the men inside appeared to be protected from any injury of any moment.

Britain Prepares for Stern Measures

Downing Street Considers Four-Point Programme of Economic Penalties Proposed Against Italy.

Great Britain is considering economic penalties against Italy as the aggressor in the Ethiopian conflict, it was learned on good authority on Tuesday, according to London, Eng., despatches.

While awaiting the result of negotiations at Geneva, the following sanctions were understood to be under consideration:

1. Shutting out all Italian exports to Britain.
2. An embargo on loans to Italy.
3. An embargo on all British exports to Italy which could be employed by Premier Mussolini for war uses.
4. Lifting of the arms embargo against Ethiopia.

Italy's exports to Britain and France alone constitute 20 per cent. of its total trade, while Italian exports to the countries which are members of the League of Nations reach 70 per cent of total exports.

Will Not Withdraw Fleet
Precautionary measures taken in the Mediterranean area will not be withdrawn until Italian troops on the border of Libya and Egypt are withdrawn a high authority said.

A conference between Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, secretary for air, and Prime Minister Baldwin, was followed by a meeting of the prime minister and Walter Runciman, president of the board of trade.

United States Ambassador Robert Bingham had a long conference with Sir Samuel Hoare, foreign secretary, today. He is said to have outlined the United States' attitude in the Italo-Ethiopian conflict and to have explained the exact meaning of President Roosevelt's neutrality proclamation.

Amery Warns of Consequences
Britain was warned against steps which may lead to war with Italy by L. S. Amery, former secretary for colonies, in a speech at Birmingham.

"There is only one way in which we can stop war in Abyssinia," he said. "That is by declaring war on Italy ourselves or by taking such measures, as, for instance, a blockade or the seizure of ships, as will force Italy in desperation to make war on us."

"A complete economic boycott against Italy might be effective if the whole world joined in, but so long as the United States, Germany and Japan are outside the League of Nations and neutral, Italy can still get anything that really matters and carry on."

The Home Office announced Tuesday that measures to protect the people of London from an air bombardment would be discussed at a special meeting called for Friday.

SURPRISE WHEN PLEA OF GUILTY GIVEN TO CHARGE

A despatch from Cobalt says that Magistrate Atkinson got the surprise of his many years on the bench on Saturday when Henry Makins, charged with selling liquor, pleaded "Guilty." According to Provincial Constable Stromberg, who laid the charge, he had seen two parties, one of five and the other of two, drinking in the house occupied by Makins, and had seen money changing hands. He had also seized 34 pints of beer. Makins lost his liberty for the next three months, had the house declared a public place for the next year, and what is worse, lost his beer.
