Mining Major Industry in Dominion of Canada

An editorial article in The Toronto Mail and Empire yesterday says:-

"Canada's million-dollar geological survey programme, which was launched in June last, has succeeded in making several important disclosures. Dr. Chas. Camsell, Federal Deputy-Minister of Mines, so informed the Canadian In-Country Before Dec. 3rd stitute of Mining and Metallurgy in Vancouver recently.
