Winter frolics open at the Riverside pavilion on Wednesday of next week, November 27th, it was announced this morning. The big revolving crystal ball will be set up for that night and in celebration of the event, souvenirs will be presented to all those attending. On November 30th, the winter schedule of dancing will go into effect, with new low prices.

Says Practice Needed by the Speed Skaters

Working 3000 feet underground at the Froot Mine, Frank Stack, formerly of Winnipeg, champion skater of Canada, practices speed skating every day at Stanley Stadium, Copper Cliff. If Frank goes to the Olympic races in Germany this year, it will be under Sudbury colours. But Frank stated he may not go to Germany—even if the Canadian Amateur Athletic Association sends him over he may refuse to go if they don't send him in ample time and give him a chance to practise on German ice. The 30-year-old flash doesn't want a repetition of what happened at the Olympic games at Lake Placid, New York, in 1932, when he failed to come in first, second or third in the speed skating races.

"We got to New York two days before the races and then they expected us to win," Frank said. "We were supposed to have practised in Toronto six weeks before the Olympics. The truth was we didn't practise in Toronto at all, because the weather was mild and the natural ice was too soft. Officials of the Maple Leaf Gardens wouldn't let us practise there—there were too many of us.

"Under such handicaps we went to New York, but even at that we got four points for Canada," he said. "When we came home people didn't understand. All we heard on the streets was 'Canada's speed skaters didn't come through.' Rather than have that happen again I don't want to go to Germany," he said. "If they send us over in time like all the other countries, all good and well, then they can complain if we don't come through."

Frank complained that Canada doesn't appreciate her athletes. For several years he skated under Chicago colours and was offered positions with large firms there. Because of immigration laws he was unable to take them. During the last Olympics he had to spend his own money on expenses.

"I came back to Canada and had to practically starve," he said. "Then I went up north and got a job at Kirkland Lake. After that I came to Froot because it was close to the artificial rink."

Mining Major Industry in Dominion of Canada

An editorial article in The Toronto Mail and Empire yesterday says:—

"Canada's million-dollar geological survey programme, which was launched in June last, has succeeded in making several important disclosures. Dr. Chas. Camsell, Federal Deputy-Minister of Mines, so informed the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy in Vancouver recently. Although the complete reports of the geological survey parties have not yet been compiled, Dr. Camsell said hitherto unclassified regions for gold production in the West and copper-nickel and gas-petroleum areas in the East had been explored.

"The programme embodied 63 projects spread over the Yukon, the Northwest Territories and every Canadian province with the exception of Prince Edward Island. Close to 1000 persons were employed in 188 field parties, on geological and topographical surveys.

"While one major object of the programme was to discover and outline attractive gold prospecting areas," Dr. Camsell urged that the practical value of negative results be not regarded lightly. "It is only by geological exploration that we can hope to keep the prospectors out of the 90 or 95 per cent. of barren country and effectively mobilize them in the search of the remaining 5 to 10 per cent. from which the nation's future mineral wealth will come," he declared.

"The importance to Canada of the mining industry from coast to coast may easily be gathered when it is said that Canada this year produced \$300,000,000, according to the estimate given the Institute by John McLeish, director of the Mines Branch, Department of the Interior, Ottawa, as compared with \$278,000,000 last year. This year's figure has been surpassed in the history of the Canadian industry only once, and that was in 1929, when the total reached \$311,000,000. Canada has become the world's leading producer of the platinum group of metals, with a production last year of \$6,190,000."
