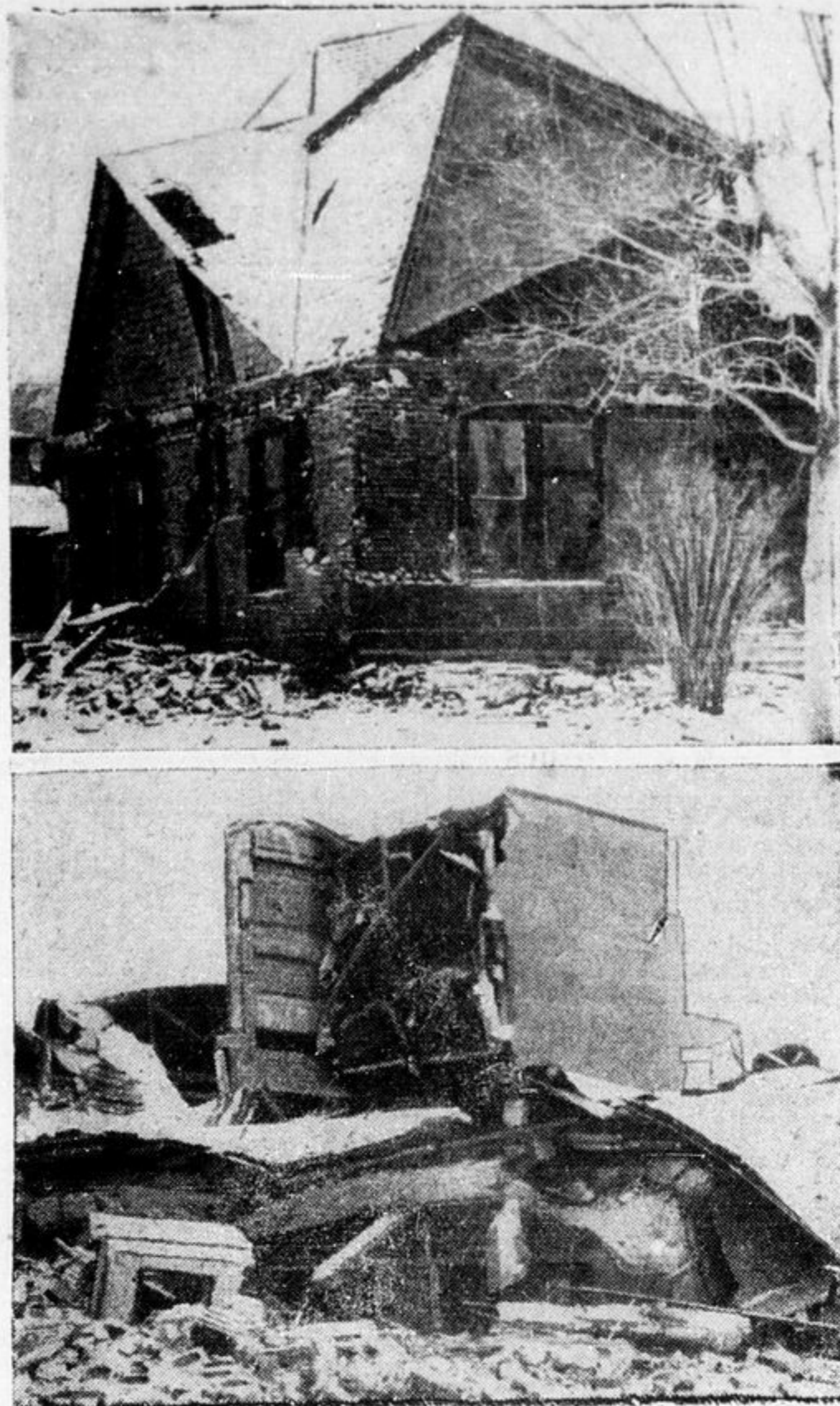

Shawkey, Gold Mine Bears Manager Fired

Will Probably Spend More Time in Northern Quebec from Now on.

Bob Shawkey, manager of the New-ark Bears in the International Baseball League, has been fired, it was announced following a meeting of the minor leagues at St. Louis yesterday. But Shawkey doesn't need to worry about the future. He's president of the Shawkey Gold Mining Company operating in the Siscoe area of Northern Quebec and, according to reports, a real comer. One of the reasons given for his dismissal from the New-ark club is that he didn't have any too much time free from the gold mining business.

Mining Men Think Peace Best for Metal Producers

While the disturbed situation in Europe has caused a slight flurry, especially in base metals, mining men want peace. The general feeling among big mining men is that producers will profit more by peace and the obvious swing toward economic recovery now evident than by any temporary stimulation which war might provide, says a recent issue of The Ottawa Citizen.

This was the statement of E. J. Carlyle, general secretary of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy, who spent a day in Ottawa before continuing his journey, on to Vancouver for the western meeting of the Institute.

Plans now under way indicate the annual meeting of the mining men's

organization to be held in Ottawa next April will be the biggest and most important in the history of mining industry in any of the history of Canada. Mr. Carlyle told The Citizen on his arrival in that city. He would not elaborate until further arrangements have been completed.

Progress is so rapid in all industry and manufacturing that he could not venture a guess as to what even the next ten years might bring forth for the mining industry in the way of new uses for various metals and alloys. Every year new uses were being found, and one of the latest and most interesting, brought out at the Century of Progress exhibits in Chicago, was that of metallic housing construction.

"There's no limit, either to the uses which science may find for metals, or for the development which may take place in the mining fields of Canada," Mr. Carlyle declared.

"The Northwest Territories is a potential new mining empire in itself, beyond the shadow of a doubt," he asserted.

Speaking of the mining areas of Northern Ontario, Mr. Carlyle paid a tribute to the work of the ex-minister of mines, W. A. Gordon, for instituting the survey of unmapped territory for the use of prospectors.

The recent flurry in the mining industry due to the war scare in Europe had resulted in many of the older base metal mines in Ontario resuming active operations. This might continue for a temporary period, depending on developments in Europe in the immediate future.

Trade Agreement to Aid Lumber Industry

Hon. Peter Heenan Expresses his Opinion on the Value of the New Reciprocity Pact.

The lumber industry in Northern Ontario will benefit greatly by the reduced import duties charged by the United States as a result of the trade pact, Hon. Peter Heenan, minister of lands and forests, said at Toronto this week.

"The duty on Ontario lumber has been cut from \$1.00 per thousand feet plus \$3.00 excise tax, to a straight duty of \$2.00 per thousand board feet, a reduction of 50 per cent.

"Ontario lumber is bound to benefit," said Mr. Heenan. "When they put the duty up to \$4 in 1930 or '31 the lumber business in Ontario went to pieces. The lumber business here has always directed its market right across the line. This is going to be quite a big help in the North, for the sawmills there have suffered badly.

"Our reduced dues in 1934 have brought our revenue up over a million dollars from the year before, but this new tariff is going to help even more."

Adjourned Suit Against Chief Justice Latchford

Action against Chief Justice Latchford, who is being sued by the City of Cobalt for \$1381 in back taxes plus penalty and interest on three lots the Chief Justice owns, was adjourned to the spring sitting of the Assize Court, when the Temiskaming Fall Assizes concluded at Halleybury on Saturday. The case had been held over from the last court and J. A. Legris, K.C., for the town, protested further delay.

JUDGE CARON RECOVERED FROM RECENT ILLNESS

His wide circles of friends in the North will be pleased to know that His Honour Judge J. B. T. Carson is recovered from his recent illness sufficiently to be able to resume his duties. It was feared that he would not be well enough to preside at the general sessions of the peace at Cochrane next week, but his health has improved enough to allow him to take his place in the court sessions next week.
