**Classy Exhibition Game at Week-end**

Timmins Juniors Win from Laflammas with a 4 to 3 Score in Interesting Game at Timmins Rink.

Putting on the pressure right at the start, Timmins juniors outplayed Laflammas, classy Commercial League outfit, and when the game was over they were on the heavy end of a 4-3 score. The play was kept fairly well in the juniors' end of the ice at the beginning, but toward the last Laflammas were kept well bottled up.  
From the first face-off Cook and Richard combined right in and almost scored. Lejambre was called on to stop plenty for the first five minutes. Renaud came very close on a lone rush for Laflammas but Barbie was playing heads-up hockey. Kendall and L. Renaud combined right in and Kendall scored for the first goal. Six minutes later Cook knocked in Marinacci's pass to tie the score.  
The second period started off very fast and inside of eight minutes the Juniors went ahead when Kalenchuck scored on Theriault's rebound. Kendall was chased for the first penalty for roughing at the Laflamme defence. Cook followed him when he tripped Villeneuve who was right on top of the goal. Theriault broke away and had only Lejambre to beat when Kennedy threw his stick and was penalized. The period ended with the Juniors trying hard to increase their lead.  
Villeneuve tried several rushes as the third period opened but was unsuccessful. Ellies was sent to the cooler for tripping Richard. Wallingford went through the entire team in a brilliant exhibition of stickhandling to score for Laflammas and even the score. Ellies duplicated two minutes later on a nice pass from Villeneuve. Cook tied it up again a minute and a half later on a pass from Richard. Kennedy was given a penalty for cross-checking Richard and the Juniors pressed hard with the one-man advantage. Richard and Delmonte broke away at their own blue line and went right through to score the last goal of the game. In the dying moments of the game Laflammas played four men up in an effort to get the equalizer. Wallingford again started on a dangerous rush and got through only to miss the net. When the game finished Laflammas had five men up but Barbie was just a little bit too good.

**J. H. Stovel Appointed General Manager of Dome**  
At the last meeting of the directors of the Dome Mines, Ltd., J. H. Stovel, who for the past two years has been assistant general manager, was appointed first vice-president and general manager of the Dome, succeeding the late H. P. DePencier.  
Mr. Stovel's appointment will be a very popular one and will no doubt prove eminently satisfactory, as he has had a long and successful experience in Northern mines. He joined the Dome staff in 1928 as general superintendent and his able work won him promotion to the place of assistant to the general manager in 1933. Previous to coming to the Dome Mr. Stovel was manager of the Central Manitoba Mines, Ltd. He spent a number of years with the E. J. Longyear Co. as superintendent of mining operations. While with that company he sank the first vertical shaft ever put down in Alabama. Mr. Stovel is a graduate of McGill University, and has also given satisfactory service as an Ontario Government mine inspector, so his experience has been varied as well as extended.  
At the same meeting of Dome directors that appointed Mr. Stovel as general manager, Simon Stern, of Rochester, N.Y., a prominent manufacturer of the U.S., and a large shareholder of the Dome for some ten years past, was elected to the Dome Mines board.

**New Liskeard Protesting Dismissal of Veteran**  
The dismissal of Malcolm Hendry, issuer of motor licenses at New Liskeard, has created much protest in that town and a formal protest will likely be forwarded to the Ontario Government in the matter. Mr. Hendry, who is a permanently disabled returned soldier, was able to make only a small commission from the sale of the motor licenses, but it was a help to him and the appointment in his place of a man of reasonable means is by no means popular in New Liskeard.

Mrs. Benecke was struck on the head and it is feared that she may have suffered a fractured skull. She is in the Lady Minto hospital at New Liskeard where all possible has been done for her. The baby escaped unhurt in the accident. The accident is being investigated by the provincial police to see whether or not any blame attaches to anyone for the accident.

**Hollinger Advances Work at Horwood Lake Claims**

The following paragraph is from the mining page of The Subury Star last week:—  
"Rapid progress is being made by Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines in its exploration programme on the Smith and Thirne groups of claims in the Horwood Lake area. According to word from the field the shaft is now down 100 feet. The properties were taken over by Hollinger in September, and permanent camps were constructed and a mining plant moved in. The claims had been subjected to a comprehensive diamond drilling campaign in the spring and summer by the original owners and Hollinger's underground work is designed to prove up the occurrences shown in the cores."
