

Kirkland Ties Noranda in Overtime Game Last Night

Noranda Loses First Game to Powerful Porkies 2 to 0

First Period Scoreless, Then Dent and Huggins Break Away to Get Single. Dent Scores Second Tally Alone.

South Porcupine, Jan. 3.—(Special to The Advance)—Noranda's senior hockey team suffered its first defeat of the season here to-night when the Porkies turned the copper miners away 2-0.

It was fast hockey throughout and only the fine back-checking of the Porcupine forwards and the hard hitting defence held the sensational Noranda forward line in check.

A scoreless first period showed the big crowd how evenly matched the two teams were and it was not until half way through the second that Huggins and Dent paired up for the first scoring play of the night. The second goal was scored in the third by Dent.

The Porkies opened the game with a swift attack that almost resulted in a goal by Cattarello. Play swept back and forth with great speed, neither team seeming able to make any headway against the hard checking of the other.

About midway through the period Kirby MacDonald got right in on Esseltine only to have the Porcupine goalie pull off a brilliant save to keep his nets clear.

Porkies Break Deadlock
At the opening of the second period both teams tried hard to break the deadlock and both goalies had their troubles in keeping the score down. Porkies outlasted the Noranda team in the effort to get the advantage and about half way through the frame Dent broke away from his own blue line and was flanked on the way down by Huggins. Dent carried the puck down past centre ice, drew the defence and passed to Huggins who with only Evans to beat, made no mistake and the red light flashed to put Porkies one up.

The goal stirred Noranda into action

again and they played great hockey to try to even the score. The Porkies' checking was hard to beat. When they did get through, Esseltine was invulnerable.

Noranda set the pace at the beginning of the last period and their first line of the two MacDonalds and Chipman made some fine plays.

Dent's lone effort that ended with a score was the high point of the period. Just previous to Dent's goal that gave the Porkies a more comfortable edge, Dunn and Maki combined on a beautiful passing play only to be out-guessed by the Noranda net guardian.

Timmins Loses Again to Noranda After Hard Game

Copper Miners' Teams Adds Fourth Win of the Season. Timmins Made a Brilliant Opening and a Gallant Close, Registering Three Quick Goals in Last Part of Game.

Chalking up their fourth win of the season, Noranda's senior hockey club came up to the Porcupine on Thursday and trimmed the locals 6-4. In their third successive defeat, the Timmins team did not look anywhere nearly as good as it did in the opening games of the season.

A brilliant opening, when the Wilkes, Fasano and Lamoureux line went through to get the first goal; and a brilliant close when they registered three quick goals made the only bright spots for the locals through the 60 minutes. Half way through the first period, the smooth-working forward lines became disorganized and the defence fell open long enough to let the MacDonald brothers through to score a couple.

The locals showed their gameness in the third when, after being down four goals, they made rush after rush on the Noranda nets and succeeded in making the score 5-4 with still three minutes of play left. Lajoie canned their hopes of forcing overtime when he slipped through to give the copper miners a two-goal lead. Then, despite a five-man attack, the locals were held off by a real stone wall defence.

Ice Slows Play
Soft ice slowed up both teams but probably left the teams about even in the end. Timmins' flashy first line was easily balanced by Noranda's. The visitors had a big edge on the weight which made their defence a tough one and gave the Timmins blue line men plenty of weary and bruises.

One of the biggest crowds of the season turned out to see the match. For half an hour before the fun started, Timmins fans were jammed around the entrance to the rink 20-deep.

After turning back the copper miners on several good combination plays, Timmins went in on the attack. Wilkes snared a Noranda pass at the visitors' blue line, fought his way in to get a backhand shot at Evans. He missed, but Lamoureux recovered and passed across the rink to Fasano. Sammy led Wilkes have it right at the goal mouth and the light Timmins forward slammed the puck home for the first (funter).

Kib MacDonald Scores

one of the plays that made him a favourite with the crowd all through the game.

No sooner was the puck dropped at centre ice to start play than Ab MacDonald, not to be outdone by his brother, went down the ice with Chipman and before the Timmins defence was organized, he had skated around them, in on top of Chrvrier, and scored. The red light flashed just eight seconds of play after Kib's goal. That sets some sort of a record for quick scoring in the N.O.H.A.

Mulligan and Kib MacDonald drew penalties in quick succession and Timmins played all up in a frantic effort to even the score. But Chipman, Horner and Genois did marvelous work in clearing the puck over the blue line and forcing all the Timmins men out again. Lortie, Fasano, Lamoureux and Wilkes all had shots at Evans.

Second Slow at Start
The second period opened with play much slower than in the first. While Vall was off the ice serving a five-minute penalty for asking Jerry Lagrave a question, Fortin and Genois slipped through to the Timmins net and scored Noranda's third goal. They kept up the pressure while Timmins was short-handed but failed to score again. The Noranda forwards' trick of playing a two-man combination, with the third man following up to take care of the puck in case of a poke check, worked to perfection several times.

About the middle of the period Noranda moved in to bottle Timmins up behind the blue line and the pressure was only lifted after Kib MacDonald picked up a loose puck, drifted in on top of Chevrier and lifted it into the corner of the net.

Mulligan was in the penalty box when the third period opened, and Timmins staged a mass attack on the Noranda goal. Lortie rushed time and again, only to be stopped by defence. Immediately after Mulligan re-appeared, Ab MacDonald, starting from his own blue line, got right in to give Noranda a four-goal lead. They weren't content with that and kept on peppering the Timmins goal. Once Chevrier came 20 feet out of his net to stop Lajoie.

Third Period Rally
Then the rally began. Timmins defence tightened up suddenly and began checking the local forwards had been taking all night. What really gave them heart to go on was a long drive by Lortie from centre ice that sailed by Evans before he could prepare for it. Kib MacDonald drew a minor and all five of the Timmins players moved into Noranda defence area. Even then they couldn't keep the puck inside the blue line long enough to score. Ab MacDonald joined his brother in the box when he tripped Lortie, who seemed to be well away for the net. Before Timmins could take advantage of Noranda being two men short, Kib MacDonald was back. With one more man to beat, Timmins seemed to do better. Vall, Wilkes, Lamoureux and Fasano all had shots at Evans, but it was Vall who finally got the counter on a pass from Fasano. Wilkes did much to start the play as he careened through the Noranda defence.

Less than three minutes later Jo-Jo Tremblay and Jack Young paired up for one of the nicest plays of the night. Young carried the puck deep into enemy territory and passed to Tremblay, who took up his position in front of the goal.

The crowd roared for the timing goal and the players gave every bit of energy they had in a desperate attempt to get just one more. The ice was sticky and every man had to put every ounce of strength into that final effort. But it was no go. A minute after Tremblay's goal, Lajoie hooked a pass and carried the puck right through. He gave Noranda a two-goal lead. During part of the time that was left, Timmins was short one man, Lortie, who was sent off for charging. Lamoureux and Wilkes made the final fruitless efforts.
