## N. A. Timmins Invests in Only Chrome in Empire

An editorial article in The Sudbury Star on Monday last touches on an interesting point in regard to the investment of money made from mining in the North. The Star says:—

"A factor in the growth of Northern Ontario, which has been one of great importance in the country's progress, is the fact that money made by the early investors has been put back into development of the natural resources of the North Land. Men who have made millions from the mines have not retired to distant fields to live on their winnings, but have continued to invest in the chances that the North presents.

"Profits from Cobalt's early days and the original mining ventures of Porcupine, are finding their way now into the development of the North's chromium deposits, and the advent of N. A. Timmins, Inc., into the field provides solid backing to a new project. Incidentally Sault Ste. Marie is to benefit. The Timmins interests are reported to have invested in the Chromium Mining and Smelting Corporation and, besides expansion of the mine in Northwestern Ontario, the locks city is to see enlargement of the company's smelter, with a corresponding increase in the payroll.

"The chromium industry is not a large one, but the fact that the Timmins people have become interested in news. Northern Ontario has the only chrome mine in the British Empire, and the deposit is stated to be the largest in North America. It is fortunate for the province, and the North in particular, that the men who have become wealthy through their pioneering of mining in this country are content to stay with the game and, through reinvestment of their money, insure full dinner pails and prosperity in expanding the industry."

Timmins' new council, officially sworn in to office on Monday at eleven o'clock had a busy few hours after they had gone through the ceremony. Although no actual business was transacted at the inaugural meeting, some time was taken up in the discussion of important matters and in arrangements for the year. The meeting was just over at noon.

At 12:15 they were the guests of the Kiwanis club at the Legion hall and remained there for somewhat more than an hour. Each of them once more had to speak briefly.

In the evening, promptly at 6:30, the council arrived at the Green Apple Pie, to be guests of the Volunteer Firemen for dinner and to again say a few official words.

**Shift Places at Table**  
At the council board in the town hall, only Councillor Adfred Caron retained his seat, at the west end of the table. Councillor Dr. Day, chairman of the finance committee, moved over to the chair vacated by ex-Councillor J. E. H. Chateaufort, last year's chairman of finance. Councillor P. H. Laporte occupied that vacated by Mr. Bartleman, who moved up to the higher level on which mayors of Timmins are placed. Councillor W. McDermott moved one chair west into that formerly occupied by Dr. Day. Councillor J. E. Brunette took Mr. McDermott's place of last year; and Councillor L. Cousins is seated at the east end of the table, in the place vacated by ex-Councillor J. Morrison.

In Monday's issue of The Advance which contained a complete account of the inaugural meeting proceedings, the personnel of the finance committee was given incorrectly. The committee is: Dr. Day, chairman; P. Laporte and L. Cousins. It may be interesting to note in this connection that anyone familiar with town council practice would have suspected an error in the finance committee personnel in view of the fact that Councillor L. Cousins appeared on only two committees while Councillor A. Caron was on four. The usual plan is to have each councillor on three committees and as chairman of one. W. McDermott—Chairman of Waterworks committee, member of Contingency and Fire and Light committees.

Len. Cousins—Chairman of Board of Works, member of Contingency and Finance committees.

P. Laporte—Chairman of Fire and Light, member of Police and Finance committees.

J. E. Brunette—Chairman of Contingency (Relief), member of Waterworks and Board of Works committee.
