Hon. Thos. A. Crerar Pays Tribute to Noah Timmins

Hon. T. A. Crerar, Minister of Mines, Ottawa, paid a warm tribute to N. A. Timmins who died in Florida yesterday describing him as one of the pioneers whose contribution to mineral development in Canada was outstanding. On learning of the death of the Montreal mine executive, Mr. Crerar issued the following statement:

"The death of N. A. Timmins removes from the Canadian business world one of its most forceful personalities. He had in no small degree the vision and imagination of the great builders, the men who have pioneered and have seen their work come to full success. His contribution to mining development in Canada was outstanding, and of great value to the country as a whole.

"To those who knew him in private life he was a fine, honorable, kindly gentleman. Though success came to him in large measure, he never lost touch with his early associations in Northern Ontario where he searched the rocks as a prospector. His passing so far from home but increases the shock of his multitude of friends, and it is a distinct loss not only to them but to his country."

Largest Air Freighting Contract Ever Awarded

The biggest single air freighting contract ever let in the world has been made between Argosy Gold Mines and Canadian Airways, according to The Northern Miner. Starting immediately after the break-up, Canadian Airways is to handle 500 tons, 1,000,000 pounds, of miscellaneous freight, largely fuel oil, from Gold Pines on Lac Seul to Casumit Lake, the location of Argosy. The distance is 70 miles. Freight will be transported from Hudson to Gold Pines by water.
