## Timmins Wins First Game on Road by Taking Kirkland 4-3

Last Period Hectic as Lake Shore Lads Score Twice in Dying Minutes. Moose Porter Has Shoulder Dislocated in Smash Against Boards.

Kirkland Lake, Jan. 27.—(Special to The Advance)—Falling short in a last-period drive of a victory which was within their grasp but for want of the wind-up scoring punch around the nets, Kirkland took it 4-3 from Timmins Blackshirts here Saturday night.

On territorial play it seemed the local blueshirts had an edge but the visitors had what it takes when they were working in past that blue stripe and even another of Lyola Porter's smart exhibitions of twine tending couldn't hold them out.

Lake Shore's best defence man, "Moose" Porter, went out for at least three weeks in the tilt when his shoulder was dislocated and the ligaments torn in a collision with the boards in a fight for the puck at the net side.

For Lake Shore the second line of Armstrong, Kenty and O'Connor were best as a unit. Wright showed well when he shifted back to the rear guard after Porter's injury and Campbell was good.

That second line had a hand in all the scores. Two of the goals came on straight Swastika sorties, Kenty finishing O'Connor's pass and Armstrong got a pretty assist on a goal to "Red" Wright, the wind-up of the marking for the night.

Former Lake Shore-Millinaire Sammy Fasano was quite a ball of fire for the black boys. He picked up a pair of pretty assists and only that perverse providence which makes a puck bobble and stop on the line kept him from another in the first period.

Fasano's pair of scoring points were matched by his wing-line mate, Lamoureux, who had two goals and by Timmins Captain Rene Lortie who got a pair himself, a tally and a help.

Tommy Westwick handled the game to the satisfaction of the fans, keeping the bell ringing to minimum possible with letting no major offences escape. It was a fast-played encounter.

**Lortie's Big Period**

The start-off frame was Lortie's big period. His pass to Lamoureux for the first count after four minutes passed was a perfect effort leaving Porter not an earthly.

The second goal was a to-the-minute execution of the old rebound play. Lortie fired on an angle just behind the net. Fasano flew in to get the ricochet and got it to his captain who poked it past Porter's feet.

O'Connor made the period's nicest play as he stuck his way in and passed to Kenty for the Lake's only tally of the canto.

Timmins went for rebounds in a large way in the game. Just before time clanged out on the clock in the middle frame Lamoureux got the third piece of a "play the boards" goal. Wilkes fired first. Fasano pecked a rebound at Porter and Lamoureux caught the bounding rubber off the goal tender's pads and with a "right back at you," counted.

After Carson Miller and Young combined for a tally at the three mark on the clock Kenty and O'Connor put on their same first-period act to even it and then before the period wound up Wright went down, sidled by the net, left Armstrong to battle for the puck and parked on Chevrier's doorstep. Army got the puck over for the assist. That was a nice goal.

Feature of the frame was the minute and a half Lake Shore kept the puck in a penalty-shortened Timmins team's defensive zone without scoring.

**Delmonte Scores From Centre Ice**

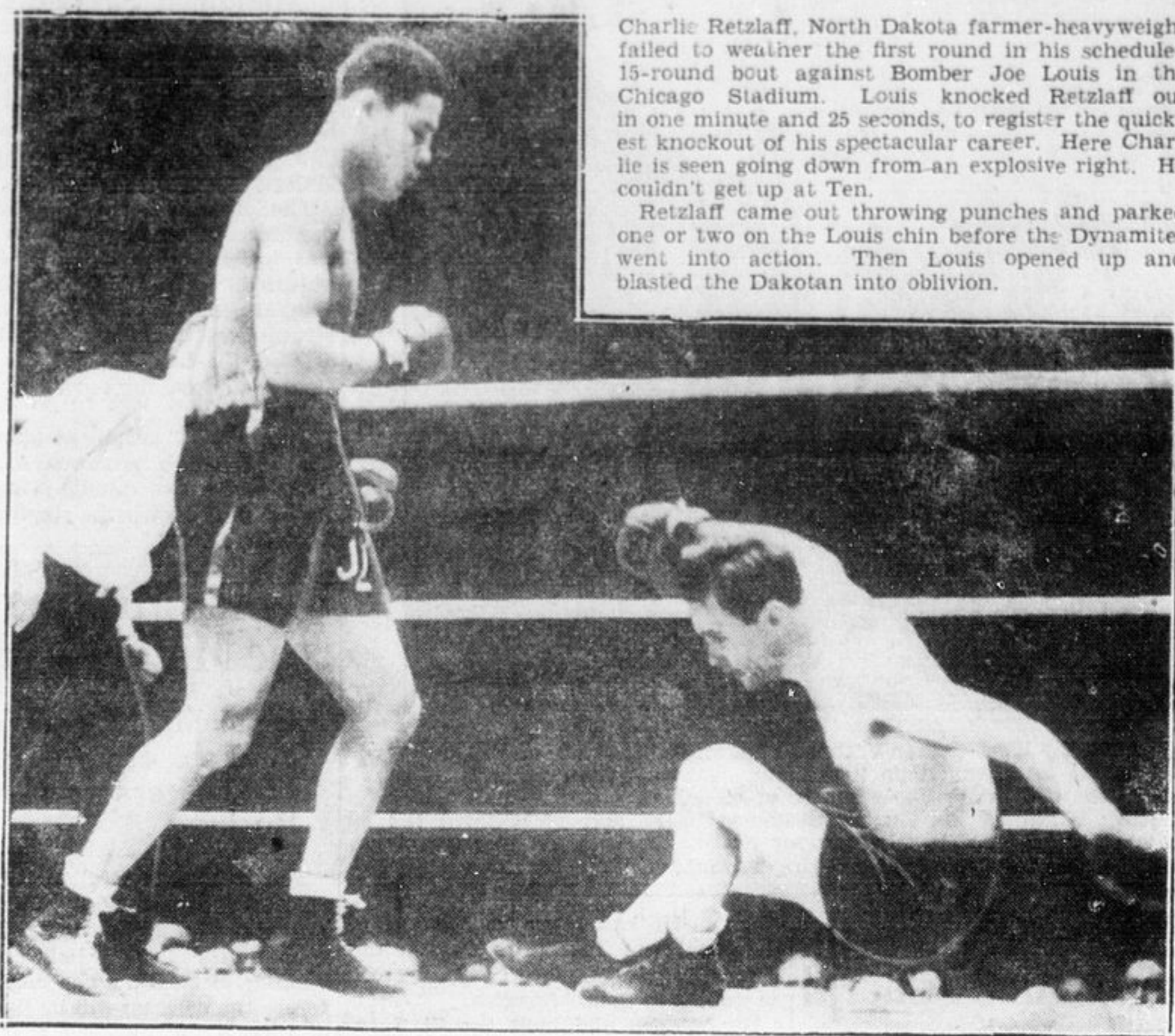

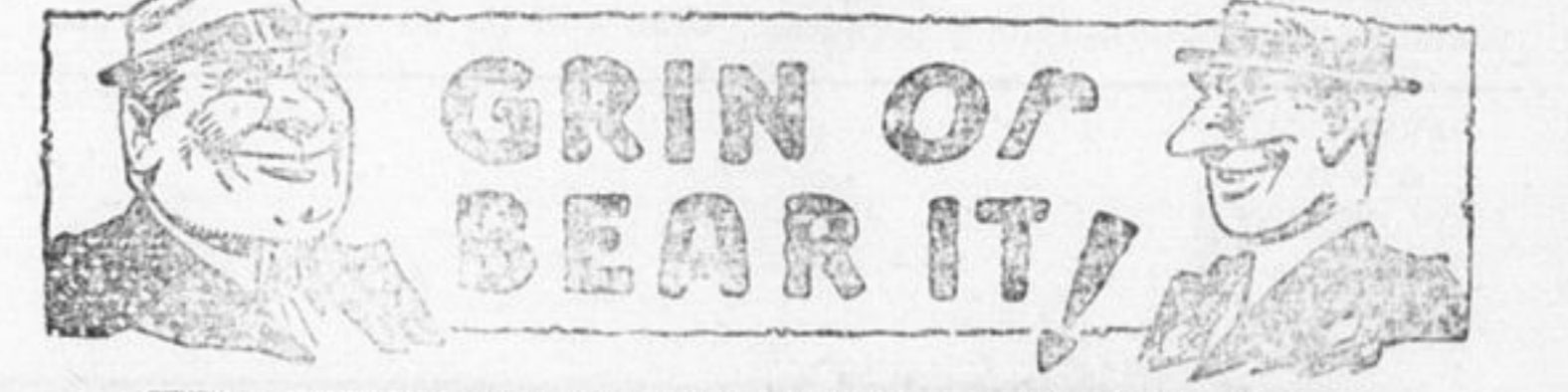
