At St. Matthew's Church on Sunday last at the memorial service for the late King George V. Rev. Canon Cushing in his sermon spoke of the manner in which the late king won the hearts of all his people. Three factors were illustrated—Honoured, Reverenced and Loved. A new king has ascended the throne, King Edward VIII. Does he commence his reign where his dearly loved father ended—namely, "Loved by All?" The answer with the deepest of sincerity is "Yes." He was part of the Canadian army in its victorious closing days of the war and entered into Germany with them, as part of the army of occupation. It was perhaps in these days that the lads got to know him better and his surprise visits to various activities such as Y.M.C.A. concerts, concert party events and similar entertainments and his happy addresses, brief but full of reverence and feeling for those whom he and his comrades would leave behind when they were on their way home, helped to build stronger the tie of man to monarch. Expressions of the love developed were evidenced by the demonstrations of the people when he visited parts of the Empire in the years after the war. It is doubtful in the years of British history if there was ever a ruler who has seen so many of his subjects. King Edward VIII has seen the people of his Empire in all spheres of their lives. He has talked with high and those of lowly birth, and his happy manner placed them on an equal standing; his one characteristic being never to make his presence appear superior. King Edward VIII in latter years has intensely studied the position which it became inevitable he would be called on to fill. With his vast knowledge of humanity, born of his days in France and his Empire travels, he enters his arduous duties with the respect and deeper love of his subjects supporting him. We have lost a great King, but in King Edward VIII may be said when his duties are completed on this earth "That he was a greater ruler than his beloved father, King George V." 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South Porcupine Pays Tribute to King George

Community Memorial Service at South End on Tuesday. Impressive Addresses by Archdeacon Woodall and Dr. Fraser. Large Attendance at Event.

South Porcupine, Jan. 29th. Special services at the South Porcupine Community Memorial Service in memory of our late beloved monarch, King George V. were held on Tuesday in the High School auditorium and was a tribute indeed of South Porcupine's love and loyalty. The hall was filled to capacity with our best citizens—united in one common purpose, young and old, high and low, rich and poor—one with another.

At 10:30 a.m. after most of us had 'listened in' to the actual funeral service in St. George's Chapel, with full hearts, we met collectively to join together as a community and express as one people with all true Britishers, our love and sorrow.

With Archdeacon Woodall and Dr. Fraser conducting the simple service, the National Anthem opened the proceedings. A simple prayer for our King, the King's family, and the Empire was followed by the singing of "O God Our Help in Ages Past." Psalm 91, beginning—"Whoso dwelleth under the defence of the Most High," was read responsively. Dr. Fraser read the lesson from 1 Peter, Chapter 2, verses 11 to 17, which finishes thus—"Honour all men, Love the brotherhood. Fear God, Honour the king." Then after the Lord's Prayer, said by all, the King's own hymn, "Abide with me" was sung. Archdeacon Woodall then spoke in essence as follows:—"Fellow Citizens, as a loyal community we meet to-day to show our great love and devotion to our late King George V. and our sympathy with the sorrowing family. It is an expression of our loyalty to our throne, our constitution and our King—it is more—it is an expression of our thanksgiving to God for giving us the example of our late beloved king's great, noble, courageous character and for the work which he did. There is an old saying "A sailor who dies ashore, waits for the ebb of the tide." Our king was a sailor and at London Bridge on January 20th full tide was at 40 minutes past 10 p.m. An hour after our Salor King went peacefully out with the ebb tide. He departed at the close of a full life—he had reached man's allotted span of three score years and ten, and we look back at the past twenty-five years, amazed that he should have done such great things—he conquered difficulties unprecedented—his splendid leadership to the nation through the war, and the more difficult years that followed, leading his kingdom to recovery after catastrophe. Thank God for his life! He wrought his life into the fibres of the British people. I doubt if ever there was such a demonstration of personal love as was shown to him by his people on the occasion of his Jubilee. The love of his people was begotten by the love which he showed his people. The words spoken on the eve of his anniversary—"I can only say to you, my very dear people, that the Queen and I thank you from the depth of our hearts for all the loyalty and love with which this day and always you have surrounded us." He shed all troubles and difficulties with his people. When salaries were cut, during the depression he voluntarily cut his expenses. He made himself beloved by the labouring classes by going into their homes and cheering them in times of trouble and stress. He bore in his soul their sufferings. When on Christmas Day he spoke to his people—"I dedicate myself anew to your service for the years that may still be given me"—he did not know how short that time would be. Crushed by the burdens of Empire he showed that the "Highest mark is that of service." "Follow the King, who followed the Christ." The secret of his power was his devotion to others. Let us dedicate ourselves afresh now to the Service of God. "God bless you all."

Dr. Fraser then spoke:—"Friends and fellow-citizens: this service is part of a world wide service passing with the sun around to all lands, all nations, all
