Third Period Rally Gives Locals Win Over Kirkland

Jojo Tremblay Ties Score Within Ten Seconds of Regular Game Time. Red Wright Gets Winning Counter to Make Score 5-4 in Kirkland Saturday Night.

With the breaks of the game against them for the first two periods and Lyola Porter in the Kirkland Lake net too good for them, Timmins seniors came through in a fine third-period rally to hand the visitors a 7-2 defeat here on Thursday night.

It was Jo Jo Tremblay's night out. The former Kapuskasing lad, much improved over last year, found a regular place on the second forward line, due to the absence from the first line of Leo Lamoureux. Joe accounted for three of the locals' seven goals. His best effort came in the second period. Kirkland had made a couple in the first and Vail, Fasano and Wilkes had given the locals one about the middle of the second period. With only 15 seconds of play left in the period, Jo Jo got through alone, drew Porter and tied the score. Three counters in the first half of the third gave Timmins the edge they needed.

Shiny at Times

At times the game looked more like shinny, but about the middle of the third period both teams got working nicely on combination plays and made it look like real hockey.

Although Timmins had the better of the play in the first period, it was the visitors who did the scoring. Scott made the team look easy when he went around the defence and in to take his own rebound for the first one. Half a minute later Moore, heavy Kirkland defenceman, took the puck from his own blue line, crashed the Timmins defence and passed to Wright at the side of the net for what looked like another easy one. While Greatrex was off for boarding Cook, Kirkland moved in to make the lead safer. But while they were in Lortie broke away no one occasion and Fasano on another. Both times it was Lyola Porter who saved goals. He came well out of his net to meet the forwards. Scott joined Greatrex in the box and the Timmins edge was more noticeable. Everybody went up, but still Porter kept his goal clear.

Play Nice Defence

With the opening of the second, Fasano and Wilkes combined on a play that looked like a sure goal getter. Wilkes shot went over the net. O'Connor went to the box and while he was off the ice, pucks came like hail around young Porter, but he stopped them all. Greatrex evened the teams by slashing, before any damage could be done. When O'Connor came back, the visitors put on all the pressure they could and the Timmins defence excelled itself in withstanding the attack.

Chevier had all he could do to keep the score sheet clean.

Cook was sent to the box but it was not until after he returned that Vail made the first impression of the evening on Porter. Then it looked very much as if his shot from near the corner bounded in off Porter's back. Fasano and Wilkes were up on the play. That goal pepped up the whole team. They fought hard to tie the score. The climax came just before the bell rang when Tremblay tied the score. From the press-box it looked very much as if the puck glanced off Wright's stick before hitting the twine behind Porter.

Third Had Everything

The third period gave the fans all the scoring and all the excitement they wanted. While Wright was in the penalty box for giving Wilkes the boards, Fasano started a play on which he drew Porter a good ten feet out of the crease, and passed over to Wilkes who was unguarded.

Fasano evened the teams up when his stick grazed Dudgeon's head just as the two were getting ready to face off. Greatrex put Timmins in a worse position when he boarded O'Connor and was sent off. Armstrong, Dudgeon, Moore and O'Connor moved in on the attack, but couldn't beat the three Timmins men left in play. Wright returned to give the visitors a two-man advantage. It was then Lortie, Vail and Wilkes and Chevier really did have to work. The whole Kirkland team moved in. The local lads were nearly frantic but were able to hold off a score as the crowd cheered them on.

Young Makes Play

When Fasano and Greatrex returned, the game was much faster and was at its best during the following five minutes. Young started a play that looked like a sure goal-getter. He passed to Carson Miller who shot hard. Young came in, took the rebound and forced a face-off at the side of the net. He took the puck from the face-off and passed over to Tremblay who had a clear road to the goal.

Campbell went to the box for tripping Fasano and Tremblay tried again. This time Porter came out 20 feet to meet him and save a score. Wright tripped Fasano and joined Campbell in the box. Cook, Armstrong and Moore were left to guard Porter against the five Timmins men who refused to let up on the pressure. Cook looked particularly good in the scrambles that followed. Vail finally made Timmins lead three when he took a pass out from Wilkes in the corner on a slow, careful play. Vail was shot out in front of the net when he shot through a mess of legs and sticks to pick the vulnerable spot.

All the Kirkland players went up on the attack after Wright and Campbell

returned. Fasano broke away from his own blue line and got well out ahead of everybody else. Porter beat him by diving up the ice for the puck as Sammy shot.

Timmins was unable to take advantage of Wright's absence from the ice, but a few seconds after he returned Young picked up the puck from a melee near the Timmins goal and had only Moore to get through. He succeeded in that but was forced into the corner. He passed out to Tremblay who shot at Porter and came in to take the rebound for Timmins' sixth goal.

Fastest Goal of Year

Young scored the fastest goal of the league this year just five seconds after Tremblay's. He took the puck from the face-off, skated through the whole Kirkland team to make the tally 7-2.

Kirkland tried desperately hard in the last few minutes to make the score look better but couldn't do it. Timmins did not ease up even a little but kept pounding the puck in on Porter at every opportunity.

Kirkland Wins from Timmins in Exciting Overtime Game

Breaks Count in Thursday Night N.O.F.A. Fixture Here When Timmins Seniors Show Real Form to Take 7-2 Victory from Lake Shore Team.

Kirkland Lake, Feb. 10.—(Special to The Advance)—With nothing depending on the outcome in a playoff way and only 200-odd in the crowd, a sprinkling only in the big winter sports barn, Lake Shore and Timmins Blackhawks turned in one of the season's most thrilling games here Saturday night as Kirkland won by a 5-4 count in overtime.

The engagement had the highlights of real drama, for after a dull first period Lake Shore went ahead in each of the next two frames, only to have the visitors pop in a tying goal each time just as the clock hand wavered before "20" and the strident clang ended the play.

"Red" Wright was the local scoring star with a "hat" in nice markers, the results of a boring-in style which featured the engagement, "Army" Armstrong and "Eunny" Cook, both of whom played standout games on local front lines, had a pair of assists apiece, each of them laying down perfect passes for the big torch-head.

Tremblay the Tie
Jo Jo Tremblay, second-string winger for the visitors, was the files in the soup on both the goals which notched the count in second and third periods.

At 19 minutes in the middle frame he laid a perfect scoring chance on Carson (Racehorse) Miller's stick and Miller caged it. The goal which sent the tilt into extra minutes was also a Tremblay try. He zoomed local blood pressure on that one as he picked a spot 10 seconds from time to nestle the tying score beyond young Lyola Porter who played a smart game all night. Young was next to JoJo in effectiveness, with an assist and a goal, his help being for the time Sammy Fasano, ex-Lake Shore-Millonaire, got into the summary.

Wright Doubled Up
Wright went into his scoring act in a bunch in the second period right after Timmins rubbed it in by scoring a goal when Wilkes was serving time. It was Young's goal on a Greatrex assist.

"Army" Armstrong started Wright down hat trick trail at 11 minutes, just after the red head got out of the "gow" for a 5-minute stretch. It was a net-side scramble and the pass came out for a perfect one which never left the ice.

It was all Titan tint in the next one when "Red" Scott made the play for "Red" Wright, almost exactly a duplicate of the first one.

Tremblay started his Timmins detour just at the end of the period when he flipped one to Carson Miller to knot the score. Lake Shore appeared to have it cinched in the final frame as they climbed all over the visitors in the first half of play. Armstrong got the assistant start again as he passed to "Ace" Dudgeon and Cook laid one on Campbell's stick for the second.

Blackshirts ganged from then on but it looked like a lost cause with the locals apparently equal to the pressure till Fasano potted a perfect one on Young's pass at 17 minutes.

Three minutes to go didn't seem so long even then for the old shoot-the-puck-down-the-ice game was working when combination tries tangled in the defensive zone. Then Tremblay came in, gave no chance for a pass to go astray by lugging the rubber himself till it was safely nestled in Kirkland cordage with only 10 seconds to go.

When they changed ends for the overtime it was "Red" Wright, scoring and spirit tops for the game, who got the decider on a pass from Cook. It

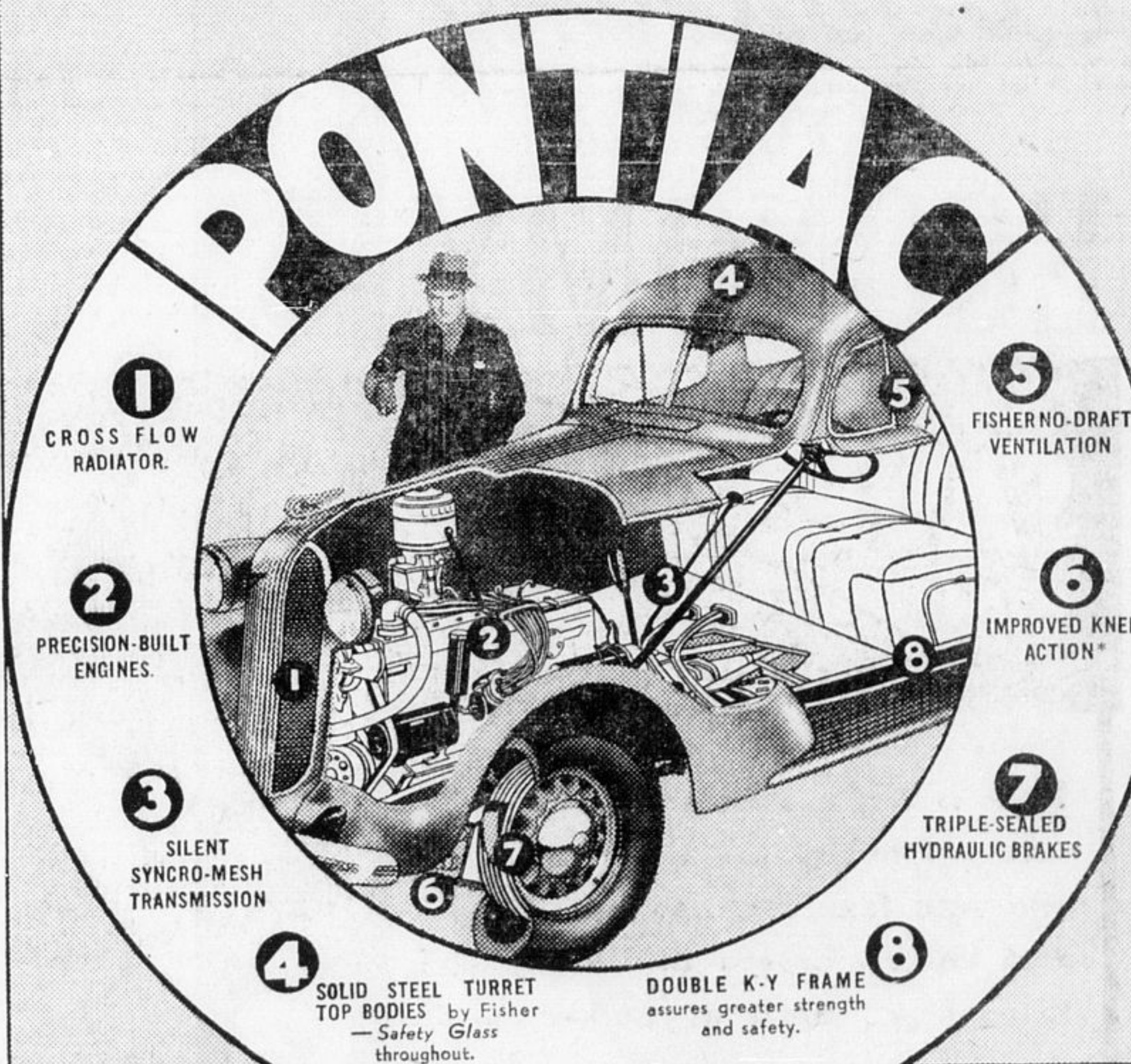
