North Frontiers Pushed Back by the Lure of Gold

Second of a Series of Addresses on Canada's Mining Industry, Given by Hon. T. A. Crerar, Minister of Mines for the Dominion.

In the last issue of The Advance a review was given of the first of a series of addresses on Canada's mining industry by Hon. T. A. Crerar, Dominion Minister of Mines.

Hon. Mr. Crerar pointed out that last year the production of all mineral commodities in Canada reached a total of \$398,000,000, or a million dollars each working day.

"I have no apology to offer for dealing tonight with gold. Its output last year of \$116,000,000 represented 29 per cent of the total value of Canada's mineral production.

"The lure of gold and other metals has thus exerted a profound influence on life in Ontario. Cobalt and Haileybury blossomed as thriving mining towns shortly after the accidental uncovering of silver ore during the building of the railway in 1903.

"Gold in days gone by has played a prominent part in the early settlement of several regions in Canada.

"Thus, for 75 years and longer, it has been known that gold occurs in fairly wide distribution throughout the Dominion, its production coming from gold-bearing gravels and from lodes, or rock deposits.

examples on the influence of mining on the settlement of the country. Thirty years ago a small frontier town in a lumbering district, Sudbury is today a modern city of 20,000 inhabitants served by splendid motor highways.

"Those familiar with the mining camps, 100 miles farther along the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario railway, will recognize that the transformation wrought in the Sudbury district has been repeated there.

"The lure of gold and other metals has thus exerted a profound influence on life in Ontario. Cobalt and Haileybury blossomed as thriving mining towns shortly after the accidental uncovering of silver ore during the building of the railway in 1903.

"Prefacing the remarks I am going to make about the effect of to-day's widespread mining activity in pushing back the northern frontier, I want you to particularly note that Porcupine and Kirkland Lake were discovered when the prospector, using the canoe, could carry his necessary supplies only a limited distance from the railways.

their use such modern means of transport as the tractor-train and marine railway. Truly amazing is the recent progress in mining development—now that there is no longer the restriction of distance which prevailed but yesterday.

"Let us see how new gold mines nowadays come into existence in Canada. A small area in the Patricia district of Northwestern Ontario to which the name Pickle-Crow has become attached will serve as an illustration.

"The time arrived when a mining plant became necessary and the moving of one thousand tons of freight from Savant station to the property in the winter of 1932-33 stands as one of the North's epic stories of triumph over nature.

"Aviation has contributed in yet another and very useful way to the growth of mining activity in Canada. I refer to the aerial photography which in the last decade has made possible the supplying of information to prospectors at a very much faster rate than previously.

"Let us view, therefore, if we can, the new frontier which the lure of gold has given to Canada. Although my remarks this evening apply also in a measure to British Columbia and the Yukon, I would rather you pictured the Canadian Shield, that great mineral-bearing region of Canada approximately centred at Hudson Bay.

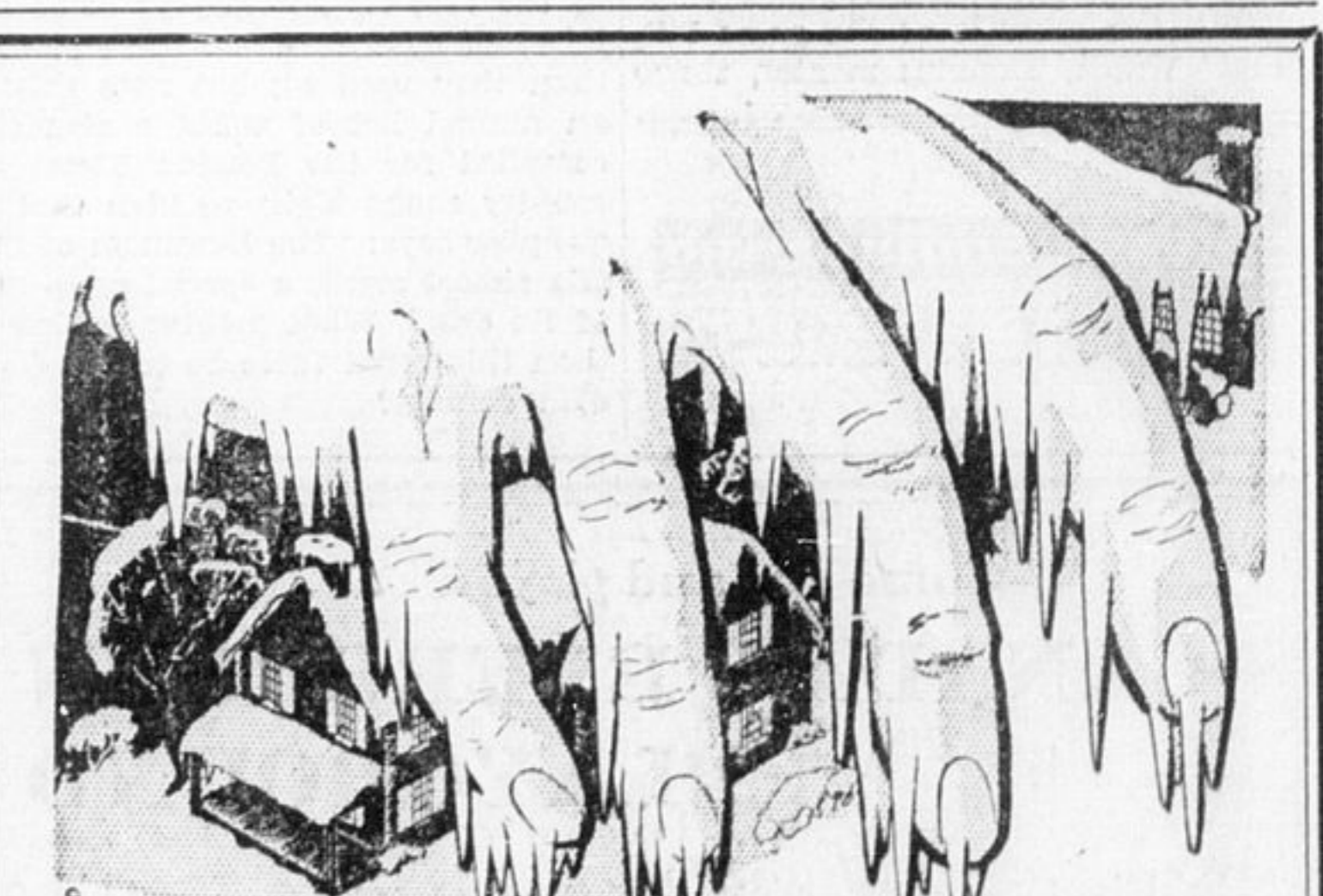

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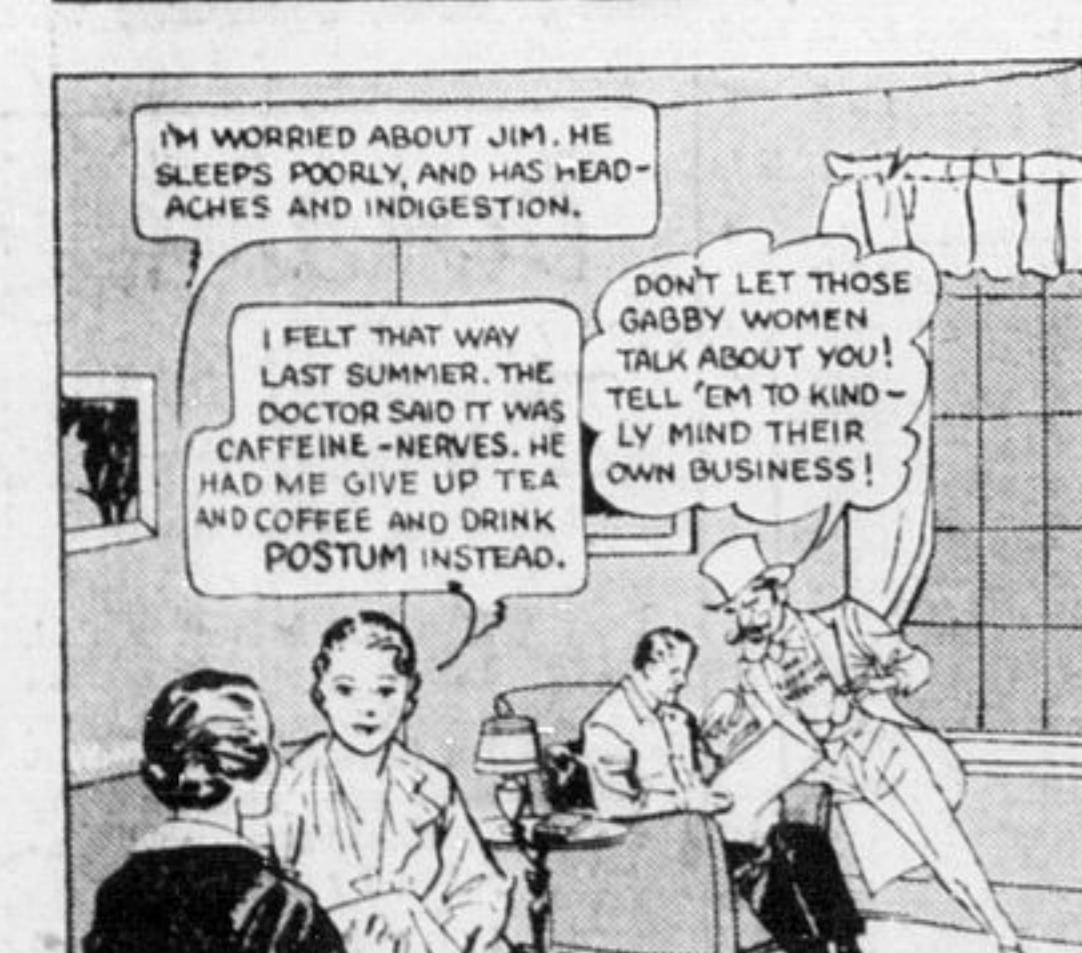
