Local Woman's Brother Dies from Ring Injuries

Fred Matieshin, Fighting Under Ring Name of Fred Matthews, Died After Operation. Mrs. Solobay in Toronto with Other Relatives. Ambition to be Fighter Leads to Tragedy.

Fred Matieshin, brother of Mrs. Dan Solobay, 75 Hemlock street, Timmins, is dead in Toronto, passing away 72 hours after he had been counted out in the Maple Leaf Gardens ring Wednesday night on a knockout blow delivered by Patrick Flannigan, of London, Ont. An operation failed to save the life of the young man. In the meantime his sister, Mrs. Solobay, had been summoned from Timmins, and his brother, Dan Matieshin, had arrived in Toronto from Amfield, Quebec, where Fred had also worked as a miner. They were heartbroken at the death of their brother, who passed away at 11:40 p.m. Saturday without fully regaining consciousness.

Fred Matieshin, who was known to many in Timmins, having visited his sister here last Christmas when a family reunion was held at the Solobay home, recently took a notion that he would like to be a fighter. He was a big man, six foot two inches in height, and weighing 205 pounds. Only 22 years old, he had no ring experience, but went to Toronto to take part in the "white hope" contest under the auspices of the Apex Club (Playfair Brown and Sammy Keller, promoters), who were putting on the bouts as part of Jack Dempsey's plan to secure a "white hope" to develop into an opponent for Joe Louis. Matieshin entered the tournament with the name of Fred Matthews. He won his first bout without much difficulty, and in his second bout he knocked out Roy Attwell, of North Bay. In the third bout he was knocked out himself by Flannigan. As he was found to be injured after removal from the ring he was hurried to St. Michael's hospital. There with the consent of his sister and brother an operation was performed in a last hope of saving his life. This proved unavailing. It is an odd insight into his hopes and plans that though he had only a small amount of money he purchased a single fare ticket to Toronto, so confident was he that he would win his way in the ring.

The dead man's father and mother reside at Gilbert Plains, Manitoba. Considerable criticism has been made of those in charge of the event because the fighters were not given full physical examination by a doctor before entering the ring in each bout. Also there is question of the fairness of the fighters getting around \$20 for maybe three bouts, while the promoters are supposed to have made thousands. It is also thought that men inexperienced in the ring should be guarded against their own inexperience.

There are to be several different investigations into the death, including the regular coroner's inquest. It is understood that the promoters defrayed the expenses of the relatives going to Toronto, as well as all the hospital, funeral and other expenses, but that the promoters expect refund of all this from the Ontario Athletic Commission.

Honours for Central Group Go to Cobalt

A despatch this week from Cobalt says that Englehart seniors, playing their home game of the two-contest series with Cobalt on local ice on Monday night sprang a surprise on the Miners by beating them four goals to three but lost out on the round nine to six. Cobalt, through their four-goal lead from Saturday's game, take Central Group honours and enter the N.O.H.A. semi-finals.

The visitors played a good game on heavy ice, and twice were two goals in arrears before they managed to stage a third period offensive that netted them three goals and victory. They were down by the odd goal in three at the end of the first period and Cobalt scored the only counter of the middle frame to hold a comfortable lead on game and round at the second bell.

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Schumacher Lions Discuss Education

Excellent Address on Intermediate Schools by P. A. Boyce, Principal Schumacher School.

Intermediate schools are finding a place now in the Ontario educational system. P. A. Boyce told the Schumacher Lions last night when he addressed them on the subject of education. These new schools take pupils through from Junior IV grade to a first form high school and provide a different sort of training for boys and girls while they are in the periods of their lives where the greatest physical change occurs. These schools have already been begun in some places.

Modern education places the child before the subject and the examination. Mr. Boyce told the club members, whereas in former ideas the subject and the "exam" had been primary factors. The aims of education are to prepare the child for future life, to make possible the more full enjoyment of life, to teach the use of leisure time in a profitable manner. One of the great aims of modern teaching should be to encourage an international outlook, he said, and in this part of life service clubs such as the Lions are doing their bit.

A more practical education is badly needed in Canada, Mr. Boyce said. Children should be taught how to do the ordinary things of life well.

At a smoker, arranged by Dr. J. Stiles following the regular meeting, prizes were given for bridge and cribbage. Dr. Stiles won the bridge prize, while Chas. Butler received honourable mention. At cribbage Chas. Juekisch and Chas. Arnett won the prizes. The evening was brought to a close by the showing of travel pictures by J. P. Kitchen, the motion picture films being supplied by the Cunard Anchor Donaldson line. Supper was served by E. H. Morissette.

X-RAY REVEALS PORTRAIT OF SIR GEORGE ROSS



While walking through the dark corridors of the Ontario parliament buildings in Toronto, an artist made a remark about a painting of Laura Secord hanging on the walls. He recalled for the benefit of a Toronto newspaperman the legend of the painting which was said to have originally been a portrait of Sir George Ross, once premier of Ontario. The legend has been known for years, but not until this week was it investigated. The legend was that Sir George Ross' portrait was painted by Miss V. Peel, a sister of the Paul Iseel. But when the Ontario legislature refused to pass the expenditure the picture was sent back. Later, Sir George succeeded in having the government purchase a painting of Laura Secord. For 31 years the legend that the picture of the famed heroine of Niagara had been painted over Sir George's figure has been known. This week the painting was taken down and an X-ray photo made. Sure enough, there was revealed the portrait of Sir George Ross with Laura Secord's cap on his head. "The painting as it looks to the naked eye and as it appears under the searching X-rays are shown (Above). Mr. Frank Worrall, the X-ray specialist says the painting of Sir George is a much finer piece of art and has offered to remove the Laura Secord superimposition.
