MEETING OF SISCOE TO FINISH TO-MORROW

Annual Meeting Sees Lively Battle Between Opposing Interest. Vote Being Counted.

According to word from Montreal this week the annual general meeting of Siscoe Gold Mines, Ltd., was adjourned on Monday until Friday, March 20, after a lengthy session in which votes were recorded for two opposing slates of directors.

The present board is headed by President J. B. Lynch, supported by J. E. Bolvin, William I. Gear, Thomas Guerin, T. H. Higginson, Leon Lajoie, K.C., and Stewart McDougall, K.C.

It was announced 563,533 shares were represented in person at the gathering with 3,648,909 shares by proxy.

Opposition to the present board developed early in the meeting when a show of hands was necessary before the minutes of last year's gathering were adopted.

Mr. Ranger, for the opposition, took exception to all proxies received in the name of Mr. Lynch on technical objections.

ONTARIO'S OUTPUT OF MINERALS AT NEW HIGH

Gold Mining and the Nickel-Copper Industry Account for Most of the Increase

Ontario's 1935 mineral production valued at \$159,044,887, reached a new high, the provincial department of mines announced in a preliminary report.

The precious and base metal group advanced 10.5 per cent, from \$129,273,033 in 1934 to \$142,919,462 last year.

Gold totalled 2,220,171 fine ounces, valued at \$78,062,330 in Canadian funds, compared with 2,105,341 fine ounces worth \$72,808,688 in 1934.

The nickel-copper industry eclipsed all records. Production of copper was 239,483,488 pounds, valued at \$18,668,743, compared with 191,676,060 pounds worth \$14,220,477 in 1934.

Silver mining brightened, due in part to the improved price of the metal and more stable industrial conditions.

Non-metallic minerals rose in value from \$7,553,571 to \$7,772,723 last year, but the group failed to regain its 1930 position, when production was valued at more than \$8,000,000.

The Porcupine camp, with 11 mines, led in gold production with value of \$34,199,065. Production in Kirkland Lake area was \$33,437,428; in Matachewan \$1,510,729.

Value of gold production in other areas: Sudbury, \$270,372; Algoma, \$613,023; Thunder Bay, \$245,316; Kenora and Rainy River, \$98,974; Patricia, \$3,946,611.
