Report Says a New Manager for Quints

New Manager Said to Have Started Fight to Recover the Dionne Children. Other Reports.

The recent visit of the Dionnes to New York seem to have started a number of reports, some with foundation, and others without. One report is to the effect that Mr. and Mrs. Dionne, parents of the quintuplets have a new manager. Another report says that the new manager is responsible for Iapa Dionne writing to the King and to the Pope in the hopes of securing their influence to help him get his children. The letters are also reported to be the first shot in a campaign for the release of the five babies.

It is said that the parents' new manager is Lillian Barker, an American freelance newspaper writer, who is a frequent contributor to the New York News and the Chicago Tribune. It appears that Leo Kerwin is completely out of the managership picture, reported having been "paid off" and receiving in the neighbourhood of \$2,400 for releasing any claim he had on the parents. Kerwin promoted the first U.S. tour of the Dionne parents. The Telegram's informant, who has been closely connected with the affairs of the Dionne quintuplets, was unable to say who had paid Kerwin.

At the present time, it is said, Lillian Barker has Mrs. Dionne and the five older children under picture contract. Before this contract was made, Mr. Dionne was offered \$14,000 for the same rights, the offer emanating from Toronto, but he turned it down. A

subsequent offer was made, but it was also rejected. The picture contract, which would have expired in May, has now been renewed with the new manager, it is claimed.

Dr. Dafoe, physician to the quintuplets was in Toronto this week and was interviewed by the newspapers, but flatly refused to comment on any of the rumours, except one. "Ask Hon. Mr. Croll," he replied to questions. The one matter on which he did comment: in the way of flat denial was the report that Marie Dionne was dead. "There wasn't a word of truth in such a report," Dr. Dafoe said. He suggested, however, that the report must have gained considerable currency, as he was flooded with calls from all over the country in regard to this report. He said that all the quintuplets were just great.

The quintuplets are learning to dance. One of the nurses sings the lullabies and the babies do the rest. Dr. Dafoe says their sense of rhythm is excellent. But right now a good piano is needed, as well as a gramophone and good records in both French and English.

The babies are being taught French at the moment and are able to say a few words, including their prayers. Dr. Dafoe believes if they learn French first, they will pick up English easier later on, whereas if English were taught first he is told they would have difficulty with French.

Owing to the intense activity of the babies, Dr. Dafoe is considering engaging a helper for the two nurses. They are attempting every manner of escape from the hospital, climbing everything in sight.

CAPS FOR THE COIFFURE

As if you need proof of the fact that woman's crowning glory in general and the coiffure, in particular, are all-important this season—witness the two caps designed to prolong the life of a setting.

All the snug-fitting sureness of an aviator flying helmet is contained in a coiffure cap made of French net. You are a restless sleeper. You shouldn't be, of course. You should take exercises and night caps and try ever so hard to get a full measure of sound, restful sleep. But that's not part of the lesson to-

day. Anyway, until you snap out of it, since you are a restless sleeper and your curls have a way of doing a disappearing act the morning after a setting, you should know about this coiffure-retaining cap. Keep it on while you are sleeping or trying to, and while you are changing your clothes. It will keep your curls intact and a mere stroke of the comb through your locks will put them blissfully in their place.

The cap comes in just one size, but it is adjustable, because of the elastic in the back, fits a nineteen headsize as well as a 23. You catch hold at each end, stretch the elastic to put it on. Forehead first, then the rest of the head and then streamers tled under chin or back at the nape of the neck. Twin seams at the top make the cap fit better and make it easy to grasp for removal. You slip it backward, and it's off, with not a single little lock of that lovely coiffure out of place. In black, white, brown and pastel shades. Inexpensive too.

Shower Cap

The other cap is for shower addicts whose song rides the crest of the wave and dies with it. Without cap there's the water and steam to contend with. With the cap, that is the tight rubber cap of yesterday, the coiffure flattens and goes haywire anyway. But the modern version of the shower cap is a rubberized silk cap, ties like a good old-fashioned Easter bonnet under your chin. It does the trick without being tight. If sister prefers tub baths, particularly the very hot—Turkish bath variety, we warn you, she'll borrow your cap for keeping out the steam.
