Work Starts Again on the Airport at Gillies Depot
A despatch this week from Cobalt says:—"Once again, with the going of the snow, work has been recommenced at the airport at Gillies Depot. The work now consists mainly of grading the greater part of the 600-acre plot comprising the landing field, although two land strips are already graded and have already seen some little use. Starvation Feared from Ignoring Relief Orders

A despatch from Haileybury on Monday says:—"Milton Carleton, father of nine children, walked 16 miles into Haileybury and told authorities Hilliard Township relief officers had refused him relief although he presented signed orders from two government officials. Carleton, accompanied by James Rothwell, who also told of being refused relief, said unless something was done immediately his children would die of starvation. Carleton and his family have lived on potatoes and wild rabbit for the past two weeks, and now that the potatoes have run out nothing to eat remains in the house. The men said there were cases of privation in other parts of the township, and also that the families affected cannot hold out much longer. Carleton and Rothwell said they could not understand the township's failure to recognize the relief orders, accepted until two weeks ago. Rothwell declared he had presented an order signed by T. B. Ryan, Government official in charge of Northern Ontario relief, and it was cast aside by William Ward, township relief officer. He said Ward gave no reason for refusal. Another order signed by Adam Davis, government relief officer for the district, was also disregarded by the men maintained. They stated the township has been accepting government grants which provide 80 per cent. of the relief."

Two Men Made Escape from Jail at Rouyn Last Week

Police throughout the North have been notified by Rouyn authorities to be on the lookout for two prisoners who escaped from Rouyn municipal jail on Saturday afternoon. The men, Raoul Samiard and S. Demaires, both French-Canadians, are described as having lengthy records. Samiard is said to speak fairly good English, is about 38 years old, and has a stiff right thumb. Demaires, somewhat younger than Samiard, speaks no English and has a noticeable scar on his right temple. Neither man was dressed in prison garb.

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Clinic for Crippled Children Here May 18th

Dr. A. W. Farmer, of the Sick Children's Hospital, to Visit Here for Consultation, Under the Sponsorship of the Timmins Kiwanis Club.

Although a considerable number of cases have been reported, the Clinic committee of the Timmins Kiwanis Club believes that there are still some needy crippled children in Timmins who have not yet been reported either to J. R. Walker or P. T. Moisey, Dr. A. W. Farmer of the Sick Children's Hospital, who is co-operating with the Ontario Society for Crippled Children and the local Kiwanis Club, will be in Timmins on May 18th for the purpose of examining all cases that are brought to the attention of the officials named. Orthopaedic disabilities included in the list of those to be examined by Dr. Farmer are: congenital deformities such as club feet, hare lip, dislocated hips, arm palsy, wry neck, paralysed or deformed limbs resulting from infantile paralysis, spinal curvature, severe bow legs, tubercular bones or joints, diseased bones, and contractures resulting from burns. It is pointed out that the clinic here is to be for examination only. No operations or

Head-on Collision on the Ferguson Highway Sunday

A despatch from North Bay says that a head-on collision on the Ferguson highway three miles north of Martin River, Sunday afternoon, sent Jack Papernick, 23, and Garfield Cass, 22, young Toronto salesmen, to hospital suffering severe injuries and completely wrecked their car and one driven by Willard Christie, of Owen Sound.

A charge of reckless driving has been laid against Cass by Provincial Constable Bert Braney, Temagami, who investigated. Cass and Papernick are in St. Joseph's Hospital at North Bay and are being attended by Dr. G. W. Smith. Papernick, Dr. Smith stated to-day, is suffering facial and nasal injuries. Cass has a severe gash on his right thigh, and is also suffering from facial injuries and cuts. Christie, driver of the other car, was injured in the right leg, but an X-ray revealed no necessity of his going to hospital.

Two hitch hikers whom Christie had picked up were shaken but not severely injured. The accident occurred on the brow of a small hill. Christie, a middle-aged man, was driving south, while Cass and his companion were headed north. Both cars were last year's model and the same make.

Dr. Arnold, of Haileybury, on his way to Toronto, arrived at the scene of the accident a short time after it occurred and rendered first aid to Cass and Papernick, then took them to St. Joseph's hospital at North Bay.

Premier Bennett Fears Grave Danger in Sales Tax

Hon. R. B. Bennett, former premier of Canada, in the House of Commons this week made a forceful attack upon the increase in the sales tax brought forward by the new budget. "Pointing his finger at the treasury benches across the green-carpeted aisle," says one despatch, "he gave his opinion that Canada could not stand a sales tax at a level of eight per cent, and predicted it would hasten the end of the capitalistic system."

Premier Bennett also earnestly urged immediate action on the railway problems burdening Canada. He suggested that here too there was the gravest danger to the country and the people unless the appropriate action was taken and taken at once. He believed that unless the railway problem was given attention Canada's credit would suffer seriously, and there was danger of disaster to confederation itself.
