## When a Broiler May Take Care of a Complete Meal

That is When a Business Woman Housekeeper has a Small Kitchenette, and Must Make Good Use of All her Facilities. Some Recipes by Edith M. Barber.

The choice of dishes for the quick meal which demands simple cooking processes is of interest to the business woman housekeeper. Her kitchenette is often small and her stove does not always allow her to have many pots boiling at one time. Sometimes she may plan to make the broiler, the oven or one or two pots take care of the whole meal.

The other night at a supper where I was a guest the oven did the work. A mold of well-seasoned hamburger steak, combined with green peppers, mushrooms and onions, had been placed in the center of one of those large, oval brown pottery dishes. Around this placed par-boiled potatoes had been sliced onions. Melted butter, mixed with sugar, salt and paprika had been poured over all before the baking in a moderate oven.

For a broiler meal, thinly sliced ham, halved sweet potatoes and tomatoes and pineapple rings may be cooked together. The potatoes should be par-boiled before they are skinned and sliced and dipped in melted butter or salad oil. The pineapple should also be dipped in the same; the tomatoes may be sprinkled with sugar, salt and pepper, minced onion, if you like, and dotted with butter. The ham and the pineapple should be turned during the cooking. Instead of the ham, skewered chicken livers or scallops, alternating with pieces of bacon may be used.

For a top of the stove meal, rice may be fried with sliced onions in butter. The canned tomatoes, with a few cloves, a bit of bayleaf and salt and pepper may be added. Crisp, cooked bacon may be used as a garnish. If you prefer, the rice may be cooked with small pieces of salt pork.

Strawberry Ice-Cream Cake

Split sponge cake in half. Arrange ice cream on one layer, cover with other layer. Crush strawberries with as much sugar as desired and pour over cake.

### Toronto Sees Youths from North on Way to Guelph

Despatches from Toronto comment on the fact that fourteen young men from various parts of Northern Ontario passed through Toronto last week on their way to serve terms in the reformatory at Guelph. It is difficult to see the point of the Toronto despatches in the matter, some of them being lengthy ones and some shorter. Perhaps, it is because so few young men from the North are sent to the reformatory. It is to be hoped so. In that case the item would be news worthy of headlines. One despatch notes that the youths were joined in pairs by special handcuffs and two pairs were grouped together by means of chains which permitted sufficient room between the men to allow them to walk without stepping on the heels of the men ahead. Perhaps Toronto thought the young men should not be chained or shackled, which may be a point. The same despatch, however, says that the guards in charge of them apparently were not armed. Perhaps, the Toronto writers would arm the guards and unshackle the men. Maybe, that's the point. It doesn't seem to make sense, however. In concluding the despatch notes that the prisoners seemed to be happy, smiling and chatting together like old friends. That may be the point—how to be happy, though on the way to prison. The real point, however, seems to be that it is most regrettable that even from as large a territory as the North, over four times the area of all the rest of Ontario—as many as 14 young men should be on their way to the reformatory. If the Toronto despatches keep track of all the prisoners on their way to Guelph reformatory from the little fifth part of the province, they will have a number of items during the year.

### To Expropriate Land Near Hospital for Quintuplets

Expropriation proceedings have been started by the Ontario Government covering a parcel of land owned by Alex Legros in the vicinity of the Dufresne hospital for the Dionne Quintuplets to the south of the Callendar-Corbell road. The land is to be used as a parking space for visitors to the hospital, and sanitary facilities will be erected on it. This is the second expropriation in the neighbourhood, the first being of property owned by Oliva Dionne, for enlargement of the hospital grounds. The property covered by the second expropriation is a part of the Legros farm. It is required to carry out plans for parking and a sanitation scheme.

### Describes Radio Service as Being Still "Rotten"

For years past The New Liskeard speaker has been fighting for a square deal for radio owners in the North. It has been impossible to cajole or frighten the New Liskeard Speaker into keeping quiet about the poor deal given radio owners in the North. Even the threat that another newspaper might be started in New Liskeard did not tempt The Speaker to desert the interests of the people of his section of the North. The Speaker still apparently believes that what the North needs in the way of radio is a government radio relay station to make radio available in the North. Like the Advance, however, The Speaker would be quite satisfied if the power of leading Canadian stations were "boosted" so that programmes might be heard here first-hand.

Last week The New Liskeard Speaker had the following—

"The Speaker has refrained from referring to the Northern Ontario radio service for some weeks. In the meantime we wonder how many owners of radios throughout the North have written to either Mr. Bradets, M.P., or Mr. Little, M.P., complaining of the service. We do know that if all the language indulged in could be passed on to the men who are supposed to be representing Temiskaming and Cochrane Districts at Ottawa, they would certainly have an awful. Living at Kirkland Lake where there is said to be a station 'giving district-wide service' (?), we suppose Mr. Little thinks the rest of us are getting all we are paying for. We assure him we are not. The service is still 'rotten,' and the majority of the people of the district are beginning to wonder if the Federal representatives care a hang what we are getting. Nor have we heard that any Northern member has been added to the committee which is said to have been formed for taking over the 'broadcasting service.'"

CONCERNING SUMMERTIME FURNITURE, ESPECIALLY CHAIRS



Two luxurious Chinese hour-glass chairs, delightful pieces for summer furnishings

Chairs that are cool either from their construction to permit circulation of air, or from their covers which are cool to the touch, are welcome in summertime. It is noticeable, the difference between chairs built for use in torrid countries, and those for use in cold

lands. Rattan, rush, cane, grass, willow, cane-seated chairs with slat or ladder backs, or which have cane introduced in wooden frame backs, and even in arms of easy chairs, are examples of materials from which the furniture is made, and hints of how they are used.

**Other Types**  
Wooden chairs are cool to the touch, and cool to use when strips are of the wood are separated and perforations are numerous or rungs and slats are introduced. In cold countries over-stuffed and other upholstered pieces are in demand. The same is true of winter furniture, while the lighter and cooler styles are sought for summer furnishings. Metal furniture is in high favour. However metal is a conductor of heat.

**Cool Slip Covers**  
For winter furniture to suit summertime demands, slip covers are needed. These supply a welcome change from the heavy upholstery. Let me suggest some excellent slip cover fabrics. Linen is cool. It can be in plain natural colour, or light with traceries of self-colored designs. Piping with a decidedly contrasting colour is smart. Glazed chintz and mercerized cotton, both with or without pattern, are in high favour. The covers should stress coolness to the eye as well as to the touch. When slip covers have these two features they perform the function of protection of upholstery in gratifying ways.

**Coolness and Comfort**  
It is when new pieces of furniture, such as those enumerated, are to be bought for summer homes, that the purchaser can pick them because they promote coolness. There are some things to consider apart from this one element, coolness. Comfort is essential in chairs and lounges, and a comfort that is an inherent feature of the furniture. Cane and plaited split reeds are softer and more pliable than solid wood for seats, although these are in demand for dining-room chairs. Avoid semi-upholstered chairs, etc. Cushions can be used for extra softness is wanted. The Chinese hour-glass chairs are luxurious while grass furniture is the simplest. A wide variety ranges between these two extremes.

### Victor has Custom-Built Drive Started Against Control Head for Every Car Transients at Cochrane

With the popularity of auto radio steadily increasing to the point where it will shortly be looked upon as a commodity approaching equality with radio in the home, much interest attaches to the news that RCA Victor has equipped its two new auto radio models with control panels custom-built especially to fit almost every modern car on the Canadian roads this year. A concerted drive has been started against transients at Cochrane. In previous years Cochrane has suffered particularly from the influx of the transients on account of being a railway centre. If North Bay would carry through a similar plan the rest of the North would be rid of an influx, most of whom are not desirable. In some previous years the T. & N. O. has helped the North by this plan and it is hoped that it would be carried through again this year. In view of the fact that there are a large number of men out of work here already, and the same is true in greater or less degree of all the towns of the North, there is little use in any influx of those seeking work. Those who are not desirous of working are still less desirable.

The plan adopted at Cochrane this year is to have two R.C.M.P. officers take up quarters in Cochrane for the summer with a plan of co-operating with the Canadian National police in keeping transients from free use of the trains. Along with C.N.R. police they will travel on trains east and west of Cochrane, as well as watching trains leaving Cochrane. It does not take long for the word to get out that transients get short shift at Cochrane and in a very short time these deadhead passengers will be avoiding the place as if it had a plague. While the plan will be of advantage to Cochrane and the North, it will also benefit the railway, the accidents that seem inevitably to be happening to the "side-door pullman" travellers being a serious source of loss, cost and worry to the railways.
