

# Dome and Macs in Dominion Cup Series This Week

## Ten Inning Softball Battle Sees League Race Narrowing

### Palace Theatre Doubles Score on Visiting Schumacher Team as Extra Inning Necessary. Endurance Contest Ends Suddenly as Visitors Crack.

Playing almost errorless, but until the tenth inning, no better ball than Schumacher, Palace theatre took a 10-5 win from the neighbouring town in yesterday's softball match at the cyanide. With the score tied at 5-all at the end of the ninth inning, Palace took first batting in the tenth and completely disorganized the Schumacher team for long enough to score five runs after two men were out. Schumacher failed to turn the trick in their half of the extra inning. The result leaves McIntyre and Palace tied for first place in the league.

After a scoreless first inning, each team made a pair of runs in the second and the tally stayed right there until the last half of the sixth when the visitors stepped into the lead with a couple more runs. Palace went on a batting spree in the seventh, to get three runs and make the score 5-4 for them. Schumacher evend it up in the last of the eighth.

#### Four Clean Innings

Four innings passed without an error on either side. Palace's smooth working aggregation came through the whole game with a single mistake. Sherry pitched the whole game for Schumacher and although the Moneta boys collected 15 hits during the ten innings, he was well backed up most of the time. ## Twenty-Seven-Run Softball Gives Fans Plenty to Watch

### Westinghouse Gets One-Run Victory Over Grads as 24 Hits, 13 Errors, Two Home Runs and Two Double Plays Made.

What was without doubt the most exciting game of the softball season and at the same time one that brought the most laughs from the spectators, was played on Friday night when Westinghouse took a one-run victory from Grads. The winning run was scored in the last inning with two men out, to make the score 14-13. There were 24 hits all told, 12 errors, two home runs, 16 walks, 9 wild pitches—in fact there was every reason why the game should have been considered the worst of the year. But the fans probably enjoyed it more than any two of the others together.

#### The Wild Seventh

The seventh inning opened with the score at 11-6 for Westinghouse. Then the fun began. Feeling, probably, that the game was in the bag, the Dome lads began to get careless and really went the limit. A total of five errors, combined with five good hits by the Grads, made the score at the beginning of the last of the seventh 13-11 for the Grads. Hammill singled, went to third on wild pitches and scored as Murray tapped one out over short, leaving Westinghouse just one run down. McKay fanned. Bucknam singled, scoring Murray to tie the tally. Cook walked to put two on bases. Then things brightened a little for the Grads and they were full of hopes of stretching the game another inning. Cattarello hit to Greatrix, just off first, and he touched Cook out. Two down, two on base and the score tied.

Thomas looked at a couple then and picked out one for a clean single between third and short. Bucknam had plenty of time to cross the plate with the winning run.

#### Pitching on a Par

The pitching was not of the best and although Bucknam had more strikeouts than Lejambre, he threw more wild pitches and so put the mound work just about on a par. Fielding for the most part was poor, although there were, particularly on the part of the Grads, some smart plays pulled. The two doubles, one in the first inning when Copps touched third to put out Cook and threw to Hass at second to catch Cattarello, helped a lot. Hass nearly made it a tripple but Thomas beat the ball to first by a foot or so. The second double, in the fourth, was a fly to McKinnon from Murray's bat. He pegged to Hass at second to catch Huggins off the bag.

Cattarello's homer in the second was the most valuable hit of the day for it scored Cook and Bucknam to make three runs. Copps' long hit in the third was made when he was first to bat. Ray Wallingford could easily have had a home run in the seventh when he hit one into deep right field near the curling rink. But he forgot to touch first on his way around and came back from second to do so. As it was he was safe at third.

#### Grads Go to Town

Eggest inning of the day was the Grads' seventh batting when Westinghouse went almost completely haywire. Wallingford led off with his tripple, and scored as Morrison singled. Hass went out at first but a bad error at third let Porter be safe at first. ## Dome Eliminates Hollinger from Dominion Cup Series

### One Goal Victory Thursday Night Gives Dome Right to Meet Winner of McIntyre-Lake Shore Series for the Right to Represent District in Playdowns.

Twice the Hollinger soccer team led Dome in the second game of the Dominion cup first round on Thursday, and twice the Dome came up to snatch the lead from them. The outcome of the game, undecided until the final whistle had blown, gave Dome the right to meet the winners of the McIntyre-Lake Shore series for the right to represent the district in the playdowns.

Five goals during the evening gave the small crowd plenty to cheer about. The first half found the teams deadlocked at one-all, but the final score was 3-2 for Dome.

A high south-westerly wind made control of the ball or long or high kicks difficult and after the first 15 or 20 minutes of play both teams saw the futility of making plays of that type. The result was that a great deal of the game was played at centre field.

Dome had the wind for the first half but slowed play up considerably by long kicks toward the goal line that carried the ball out of play and made many delays. The play that gave Holly the first goal of the game came as a surprise to the Dome backs and found them unprepared to meet the attack. Gibby carried the ball down the left wing, went in close to the net and took his time in passing to Jimmy Johnston, rather than shooting himself. Johnston found the corner of the net while Baxter was trying hastily to cover.

As the Dome put on all their power in an effort to get the score even again, Munroe dropped the ball in front of the net. McWhinnie was there to take it out, but before he could do so Chambers came rushing in, took one kick and scored. From the time of that score until the end of the half, the ball was in Hollinger's defence area most of the time.
