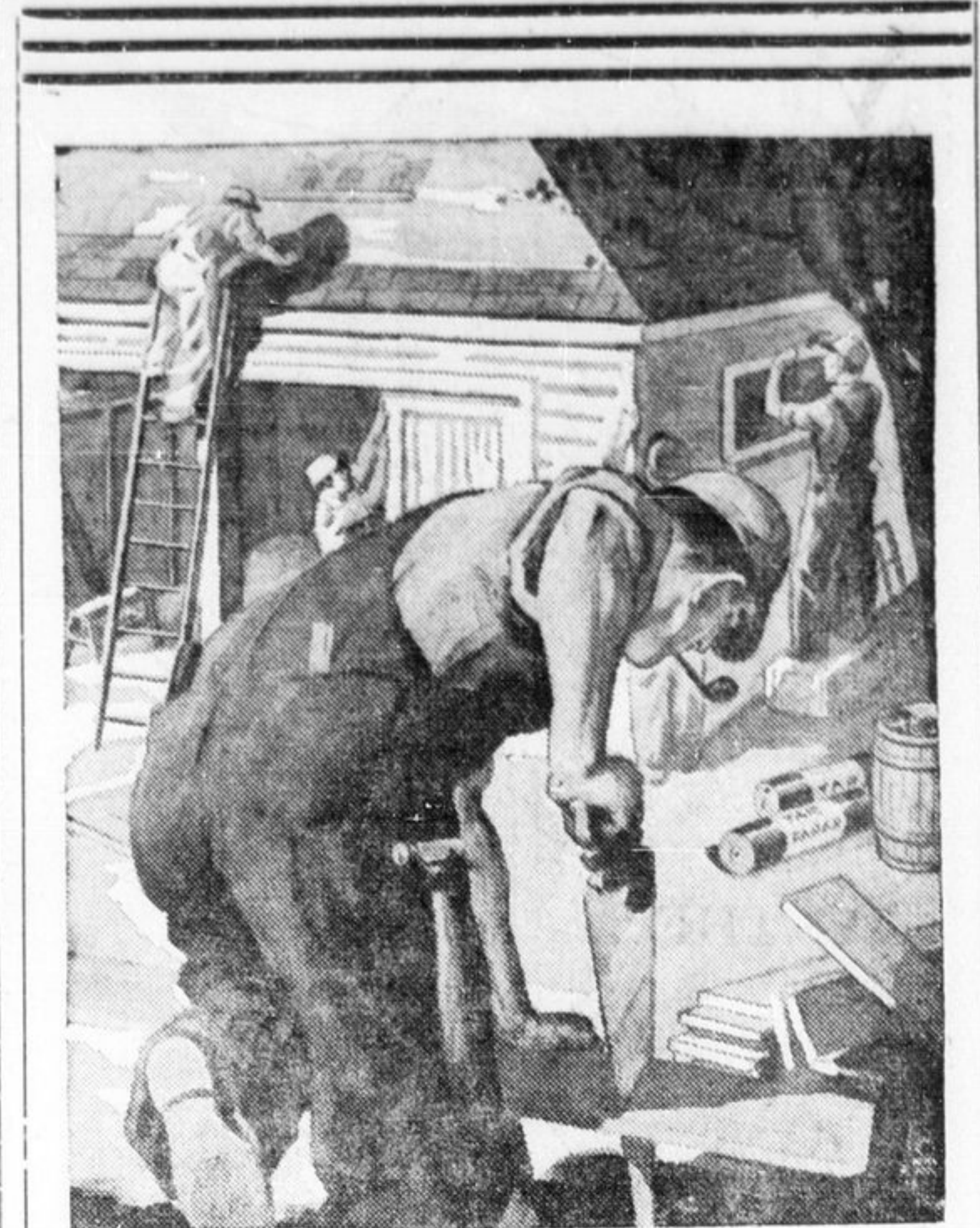
### Lukon Hits Homer

## New High Run Record Set as Thirty-Two Runners Score

McIntyre Keeps Record Clean by Defeating Westinghouse 17-15 in Week-end Softball Fixture. Home Runs and Errors are Plentiful.

In a record-breaking game at the cyanide yesterday, McIntyre pounded out a 17-15 victory over Westinghouse. The victory enabled McIntyre to keep in first place, tied with Palace. McIntyre and Palace have now each played three games and are undefeated.

Home runs and errors were in order in yesterday's game, since there were five circuits hammered out and a combined grand total of fifteen errors. Base hits totalled twenty-eight.

The Macs appeared for the first time in public in their brilliant new blue and gold sweaters.

McIntyre took an early lead and at the end of the third canto they were on the front end of a 4-0 score. Their first count came in the second inning when Peacock was given a free ticket to the initial sack. Stewart hit to centre sending Peacock to third and White singled to score him.
