# Presbyopia

At about forty-five years of age in normal eyes prolonged reading begins to get difficult without a convex lens to help.

The reason is this:—The lens in the eye become more solid with advancing years and thus having lost its elasticity will not change its shape to the same extent as before. The lens in the eye afterwards has to be assisted by another lens outside the eye to get the focus for close work like reading.

This condition is called presbyopia and is a natural accompaniment of age. At about fiftyfive the lens of the eyeball is almost solid. There is required therefore increasing reading assistance during this ten-year interval.
