Noisy Last Inning Rally Puts Palace at League Top

McIntyre Team, Two Runs up at Beginning of Seventh, Goes to Pieces and Allows Five Palace Runs in for First Defeat of Season.

Turning on the steam in one of the most effective rallies ever seen in the local softball league, Palace Theatres managed to keep their record clear with a victory over the powerful Macs. Neither team had yet tasted defeat when they met and the large crowd of supporters that turned out to see a bang-up game were not disappointed. It was one of the season's largest crowds and they were treated to one of the most exciting games to date.

Palace Theatres first took the lead in the first inning and held an advantage of one run till the third canto when the Macs kicked across two counters to lead by one run. Palace knotted the count in the fourth only to lose their grip when they went to pieces in the fifth. Romualdi arrived from the baseball game and was put in at short and Lamoureux in the box. The Moneta machine then tightened up not yielding a single run. A last

period rally saw the Palace outfit score five times when they combined their "noise play" with a few hits. The game was very late in starting owing to the fact that two of Palace's best players were at the baseball game playing for Parkies and the boys were stalling for time. Romualdi showed up in the fifth inning when he was badly needed but Dorcy didn't appear at all.

Lukon's Double First Hit
Lukon, lead-off man for the Palace, started the game off right when he doubled through second. Barardini went out unassisted at first. Lukon stole third and an error by Vail allowed Wilkes to be safe at first and Lukon in with the game's first run. Lamoureux went out unassisted to first while Wilkes went down to third. McMahon relieved the situation for McIntyre by hitting a drive to Vail that "Sparky" handled very nicely.

In the third inning McIntyre lam-

ed an attack that netted them two runs. White, lead-off man, fanned. Fox walked and Hicks struck out. With two out and a man on third, Vail placed one deep in right field for a three-bagger, scoring Fox. Vail came in on Delmonte's error. George Walsh walked and Stewart drove one to third. McMahon let the throw to first drop and Stewart was safe with Walsh on third. Peacock fled out weakly to Wilkes to retire the side.

Tie Score in Fourth
Palace tied the score in the fourth when Wilkes got on through an error at third and went to second on the bad throw. On a passed ball Wilkes went down to third. Lamoureux fled out to George Walsh while McMahon fled out to Fox. Delmonte hammered a two-bagger through short, scoring Wilkes and went down to third on White's error only to be caught at the plate to retire the side.

A determined drive by the Macs almost ruined the Palace chances of victory. This inning saw Rodney leave the game and Romualdi take up the shortstop position. Hicks started it when he was passed. Vail fanned. George Walsh doubled to left field scoring Hicks and he went to third when Guidolin made a bad throw in. Stewart's single to second scored Walsh. Peacock was thrown out at first when Lamoureux went into the box. Jimmy Walsh singled to third sending Stewart around to the hot corner and on Barardini's bad throw to first Walsh went to second while Stewart came in. The Palace machine then tightened up and really went to work. Shippam struck out to finish the inning.

The sixth inning saw Palace draw up within two runs of the leading Macs. Wilkes first man up went out when he bunted on his last strike and the ball rolled foul. Lamoureux doubled to left field and stole third. McMahon fanned. Delmonte doubled to right and scored Lamoureux only to be caught trying to stretch the hit to a three-bagger.

Well Planned Attack
The Palace rally in the seventh was really a well-planned attack. As the boys started to bat a terrific noise started to roll from the east grandstand and the effect was disastrous to the Macs. Romualdi doubled to left field with a hit that looked foul. It looked so bad that Louie stopped running but he started again when the umpire yelled to him that the hit was fair. He went to third and home on Vail's error at third. Bararie, batting for Guidolin, went out at first. Delmonte walked and on two passed balls went to second and third. Lukon was safe when an attempt to catch Delmonte at the plate fell through. Lukon stole second and went to third on a passed ball. George Walsh's error left Barardini safe at first and Lukon in with another run. Wilkes was safe at first when another unsuccessful play made to catch Barardini. On a passed ball Barardini and Wilkes each advanced a base. Lamoureux's fly to deep centre scored Barardini and left Wilkes at third. The catch on that fly was made by Jimmy Walsh and was ticketed for a home run. Jimmy jumped high in the air and snagged the ball with one hand. Wilkes came in on a passed ball and McMahon fled out to the catcher, finishing the inning. In their half of the seventh McIntyre's first three men were out.

Dome Beats Holly 2-1 to Take Lead in District Football

Two Goals Scored Off Free Kicks in Saturday Night P. D. F.L. Game. Dome Has Best of Play Through Most of Slow Hour and a Half.

It was not an exciting football match on Saturday when Dome defeated Hollinger 2-1 to step out in front of the football league. Slow from the opening neither team seemed able most of the time to carry play into the other goal area. Plenty of high kicking kept the ball passing quickly from the control of one team to the other, though Dome had it in possession for more of the time.

Two of the goals were scored on free kicks—one for each team. The other Dome goal was one of the prettiest and most quickly executed of the season. It was the first tally, well into the first half. Galbraith, who played a fine game all evening at half passed over to Tierney, fast and tricky Dome out-side left. Tierney carried the ball down the field, waiting an opportunity to pass. It came just as Chambers came through the centre. The ball came down just at the right of the net and Chambers headed it in. It was the kind of goal that drew applause from both sides.

The field had a good deal to do with the manner of play. Most of the recent games have been at the softer McIntyre pitch and the hard gravel and sand surface of the Timmins park made it difficult for the players to judge how and where the ball would bounce.

Dome carried the play through most of the first half, though Hollinger did break away nicely a couple of times. Crawford made a hand ball near his own goal area line and Welsh took the kick. It was hard but high.

Dome Has Scottish Forward
George Witherspoon, Dome inside right, who has just arrived in the Porcupine from Scotland fell in right away with the Dome's style of play. Al-

though he didn't score, he showed a hard shot and is adept at placing the ball overhead.

Dome's second opportunity to score came near the end of the first half. Billy Boyd handled the ball in the Hollinger goal area and Joe White took the free kick that was given. Bannerman didn't have a chance to stop the shot.

Things looked up for Hollinger in the second half. They succeeded in getting the ball down the field a good deal more often, but they were still weak at the net. Callaghan and Lawrence Morley combined nicely for a few plays but Foster and Crawford held off the attack well.

Crawford gave Hollinger a real chance when he handled the ball in his own penalty area. Welsh took the free kick but his foot touched the ground and the ball rolled along the field to Rowe in the Dome net.

Wishart had a nice try for a goal but Nee broke up the play. Tierney was in more than once but shot narrow.

"Cally" Scores on Free Kick
Callaghan took the Hollinger's second free kick from a hand ball and made sure of the shot. There were just five minutes of play left and in that time Hollinger tried hard to make it a draw. Tierney centred to Chambers for what looked like a sure goal just as the whistle blew.

Two men are involved in a charge of "assault, causing bodily harm," while another is charged with threatening to injure a child.

Breaking and entering charges, preferred against five Timmins boys and adjourned from last week, will be heard on Wednesday.

A number of accidents occurred over the week-end, but in none of them, police said this morning, was there anyone seriously injured and in no case have charges been laid.

Victims of Explosion at Kirkland Lake May Die

Two men, Henry Patterson, formerly of Toronto, and Robt. Hetherington, whose home is in St. Catharines, suffered serious and likely fatal injuries in a gasoline explosion last Thursday night at Boyd's radio shop at Kirkland Lake where they were employed. It is thought that gasoline being used by Hetherington caught fire from a nearby oil stove. Both are in the hospital in serious condition. Hetherington had planned to bring his wife to Kirkland Lake and was carrying round with him all the money he had in the world. This was burned up in the flames that enveloped him. He was drawn back into the burning building by the reflex of the explosion while Patterson was tossed through the window. The flames did considerable damage to the stock and fixtures of the building. Separated only by a beaverboard partition from the radio shop was the jewelry store of Fred Whitford, formerly of Timmins.
