Cataract

This is an opaque lens in the eyeball just behind the pupil. The normal lens is clear like high quality glass. When it becomes cloudy and coloured it does not let light rays pass through it, and the eye is more or less blind.

The only thing to do is to take it out. Remember take it out, not off, as it is inside the eyeball.

It is rare in early life except through injury, but is fairly common in advanced life.

After removal the eye requires a strong lens in front of the eye to compensate for the lens taken out from the inside.
