Wanted to Change Dress Before Greeting Police

Women's Excuse for Not Letting Police in House at Once, Denied Using Brands of Face Cream and Gin Produced. Slot Machines Destroyed After Fine Imposed. Other Court Cases Tuesday

For having liquor in her possession without a permit, Mrs. Rachel Lievo paid a fine in police court on Tuesday of \$100 and costs. Her place at 51 Maple street north was made public for a year.

Sergeant Olson told of having visited the place on June 21st. Mrs. Lievo had come to the door "but when she saw it was the police turned and ran, slamming the kitchen door behind her." The police smashed the door and followed her to the bedroom where they found her leaning over a trunk with her hands on the sill of the bedroom window. "I asked if she had any liquor. She said no. I asked why she was so nervous then. She said 'I'm just excited. She was something some clothes behind the trunk. We searched for liquor, then Constable Culhane flashed his light out of the window where we saw a bottle of gin and a jar of face cream. In the kitchen we found two glasses that smelled very strongly the same as the bottle." While on their way to the bedroom they had heard a noise such as a window being slammed down, Sergeant Olson said. Constable Culhane verified this evidence all the way through.

Not Her Brand of Face Cream

Mrs. Lievo explained that she wanted to change her dress before letting the police in. She had no liquor in the house that day at all, she swore and knew nothing about the cold cream jar. She used another brand, she said. One of the roomers had had a bottle of gin that week-end.

The roomer came to the stand next and swore that he had had some gin and had used the two glasses that night.

Charles Kerr, who appeared for the defence, said that the liquor found was not in the woman's physical possession and held that suspicious was not enough in this case to make a conviction.

Mr. Yates held that Mrs. Lievo must have had something to conceal and that all the evidence pointed toward the belief that the woman tossed the

bottle out of the window.

Stanley Rawlinson, charged with having liquor in a public place, his building at Cook's lake, made public on December 10th last year, said he understood another charge had been laid against another man. He was not occupying the building and wasn't there at the time the liquor was, he said. The case was adjourned a week.

Slot Machines Destroyed

Tony Cinderelli, who had two slot machines at Cook's lake, pleaded guilty to keep a common gaming house. He was fined \$50 and costs, the machines were seized and destroyed and the money confiscated.

Four Vags Released

Four men, arrested on vagrancy charges, were given another chance. The first young chap said he had come up here from Toronto and was supposed to meet his brother at the railway station. He had fallen asleep and had no place to go. Sergeant Olson had found him staggering around like a drunk man, yet there was no smell of alcohol on his breath. The lad said he had been a dope fiend and had had no cocaine for three days. He was broke. Another claimed he had come from Iroquois Falls but had a job there to which he could go back.
