Safe Milk Supply on the Summer Vacation

Health League of Canada Points out Dangers in Milk and Gives a Safe System.

Summer cottage life may be a paradise for father and mother, but for the children, precautions are not taken their health may be seriously jeopardized. The Health League of Canada points out. There is, for instance, the question of milk. In the country and summer resorts the milk supply is always unpasteurized and consumers frequently do not realize the danger to which their raw milk feeds their children. Milk may carry diseases which include: diphtheria, scarlet fever, dysentery, tuberculosis, septic sore throat, and fever and others. However, the condition need not be as fearful as it sounds, because every mother who feeds her children by taking the necessary precaution of pasteurizing milk in the home. It is better if arrangements can be made to supply of pasteurized milk than to buy it, as raw milk is not obtainable, raw milk is not easily pasteurized in the home.

can be done, according to the Health League of Canada, by rapidly heating the raw milk in a double boiler at 140 or 145 degrees F. and holding it at this temperature for 30 minutes. This can be done by placing a double boiler over a fire and when the water in the boiler has reached the boiling point, the milk can be poured into the inner boiler. The temperature is also an important factor in the process and after 30 minutes the hot water from the boiler should be poured out and replaced with chilled ice water. The boiler should then be

Permission Refused for New Town Hall this Year

Municipal Board Says Project Should be Deferred to 1937. Mayor Suggests Alternative, but Council Not Favourable. Gray's Shows Granted Permission to Show in Town Next Week. Radio Question Discussed.

The Ontario Railway and Municipal board won't let the town of Timmins build a town hall this year. That was made clear at Monday's council meeting when a letter was read from E. W. Cross, chairman of the board. "In view of the capital expenditure of Timmins already authorized for 1936," said Mr. Cross, "we feel that this should be deferred until 1937." The council had asked for permission to issue \$90,000 debentures for the municipal building. "Are you willing to consider any alternative?" asked Mayor J. P. Bartleman, "or do you want to wait until next year?"

"I don't see that there is any alternative," replied Councillor P. H. Laporte. The mayor reminded him that there was the possibility of turning Central school into a town hall. "We'd have to go to the people on that question anyway," Mr. Laporte said. "I think we might go on discussing the thing. If we could only have an architect give us the value of the school," the mayor concluded.

Nine Blocks Annexed in North

Timmins was made a little larger last week and this week another nine blocks of territory were annexed. This time the town grew northward into Timmins Heights Extension. At the north end of Stoke street, Patricia Boulevard, and Cherry, a section of land already partly built upon was brought within the limits of the town. Gordon Gauthier presented the plan to the council.

"I would point out that we are taking on a liability, at least if we annex it," Mayor Bartleman said, after the resolution was read. "But just as the council wishes."

New Mountjoy Townsite

Another townsite may be developed in the district, it was learned. A piece of land out in Mountjoy has been cut up into lots and will be used for gardens and residences. The "townsite" will be located along the road about three-quarters of a mile across the Mattagami bridge. Arch Gillies presented a plan to the council for approval, since according to law, the approval of a municipality within five miles must be secured.

Grant Gray's Permission

The council passed a motion granting permission to Gray's Shows to play in the ball park here from July 4th to July 11th, provided they remain closed on Wednesday, July 8th, and also provided that Gray's make formal application for those dates.

W. O. Langdon, on behalf of the Kiwanis club who are holding a street carnival on the 8th, said he had been advised that Gray's had been granted permission to give their show in the ball park for the week from July 6th-11th, including the 8th.

"We didn't give permission for the same day or even the same week," the mayor retorted. "We gave permission for a week but it wasn't stated what week."
