but Not Annexed to Town**

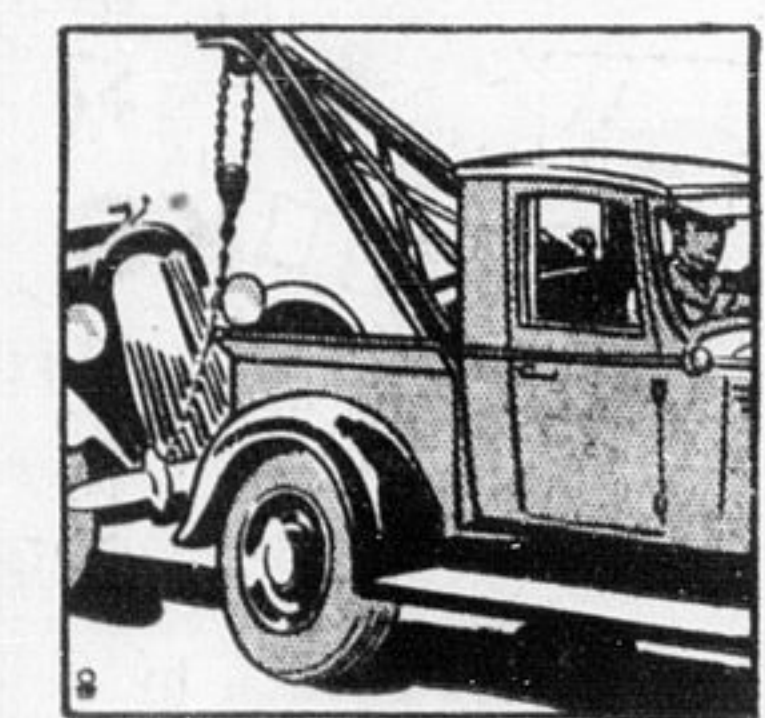
