Bulk Sampling of Much Value in North

Government Laboratories at Cobalt Prove of Notable Service

Many prospectors and mining syndicates are making use of the Ontario government's offer of bulk sampling, it is reported. The only place in the North where this work is done is at the government-owned Temiskaming Testing Laboratories at Cobalt. It is also the only place through which a single ton of gold-bearing ore may be marketed.

The offer is not confined to Ontario but is a service offered the mining industry of Canada by the Ontario government," according to Arthur A. Cole, the manager.

A flat rate of \$11 a ton is charged for sampling and assaying each ton but there is no limit to the number of tons that may be sent. Ore must be bagged and may be shipped by special freight rates which are about half the usual, from any point on the T. & N.O., Nipissing Central, C.N.E. or C.P.R. Arrangements must be made through Cobalt for these rates.

The usual way in which prospectors find out what ore deposits are worth is by channel sampling; but in many discoveries, particularly recent ones, ore is spotty and erratic. This is where "bulk sampling" of ton lots is valuable and will give a fair result.

If the ore is of sufficiently high grade, the laboratory will send it to a mill or smelter, have the gold refined and return the proceeds to the person or company that sent it. In this way, the sampling is often done at a real profit.

Entire Underwriting Sold of the Numaque Mining Co.

It is announced by W. C. Pittfield and Company, Limited, and associates that the entire underwriting of the shares of Numaque Mining Co. (N.P.L.) has been sold. Books opened on Monday of this week and were almost immediately closed. Subscriptions to the shares, which were offered at 60c each, were well in excess of the offering which amounted to 575,000 shares.

Numaque Mining Co., which has taken over Block No. 2 of the Nu Sigma Gold Syndicate's holdings (now Aurac Mines Limited) is assured of adequate funds to carry out its entire diamond drilling and exploration campaign, preparatory to placing the property on a production basis. Associated in the company, in addition to Aurac Mines, which holds 40 p.c. or 1,200,000 of the 3,000,000 shares of \$1 par value of capital stock are representatives of some of the most important mining interests on this continent.

O.Olschuk Passed Away on Sunday at South Porcupine

The death of O. Olschuk, of 56 Golden avenue, South Porcupine, occurred yesterday, following a brief illness. He had been a miner in the district for some time but suffered an attack of pneumonia.

New Appointment at Employment Office

Miss G. Morin to Assist in Placing of Women in Positions.

There are not enough domestics in Timmins to fill the demand, the local office of the Employment Service of Canada told The Advance last week. With the monthly totals of those placed in this kind of employment rising steadily, a new peak was touched in June when 138 females found jobs through the government bureau. Jobs were available for 200 women.

June is always the month when the demand for cooks-general, houseworkers and hotel and restaurant help rises more sharply. June of last year was the previous high with 118 placed in jobs. This increase in the month is probably due to housecleaning.

Jobs were found through the service last month for 375, compared with 342 in May and 307 in the previous June. Of this number, 10 were farm jobs (four last June), 12 were in the logging and lumbering industry (16 last June), 128 in building and construction (103 last June), 30 in the mines (15 last June) and six men were sent out to other mining districts of Ontario, the same number as in June of 1935.

New Appointment Made

Miss G. Morin of Timmins has recently been appointed to the staff of the Employment service, to replace temporarily T. E. Dowse, who leaves on July 15th on the Vimy Pilgrimage. Miss Morin, in addition to doing stenographic work, will help in placing women in jobs. It is hoped that the appointment may later become a permanent one, since there is plenty of work to keep a third employee busy in the office. As it is, her appointment is to September 15th.

Changes in the Employment office have made it more convenient for employers, women, and D. P. Murphy, the superintendent. The office at the rear has been divided by a partition, to give Mr. Murphy a private office and making another in which interviews may take place.
