

# McIntyre Takes Lead in Foster Cup Football Series

## Leo Campbell Pitches Win as Schumacher Loses 7 to 6

Friedmans Have No Trouble Hitting Sherry or Miller as Long Losing Streak is Broken.

Friedmans handed Schumacher their first loss since June 7th at the cyanide on Monday night and tightened up the race for playoff positions. A swift seven inning game, with Leo Campbell in top pitching form for Friedmans, found Schumacher on the wrong end of a 7-6 score. The winners, out of luck since June 21st when they edged Grads out by one run, came to life suddenly to look like a smart ball team. They had no difficulty hitting either Sherry or Miller.

Friedmans surprised even themselves by taking a two run lead in the second inning. Campbell let down in the third and three Schumacher runs came in. Friedmans went into the lead again in the third as Giallonardo came in and Neddow threw the ball away deliberately to let in the extra run. In the fourth it was Schumacher's turn to take the lead when persistent hitting brought in two runs. In their half Friedmans again took a one-run advantage and added another in the fifth. Schumacher got one in the sixth and the scoring was all over.

## McIntyre Takes Three Goal Lead in Foster Cup Series

Dome Defeated 4 to 1 as Porcupine Teams Play the First Round in T. and N. O. District Trophy.

McIntyre's soccer team took the lead in the first of the Foster Cup series on Tuesday night when they turned the Dome back 4-1 in a game which showed the Macs' forward line "clicking" better than it has for the last few games. Dome played good soccer but the continual breaking up of plays by the McIntyre backs and halves were them down in the first half and they were easy marks for flashing McIntyre forwards.

Three McIntyre goals in quick succession near the end of the first half made the Dome look easy. In the second half the visitors pepped up a bit and were able to hold the McIntyre to one more goal while they got one themselves.

Dome might have won the game in the first few minutes if the Macs had not been wide awake. The South Enders put all their power into the opening minutes of the game and kept up the pressure until it seemed almost certain they would take the lead. Through bad luck at the nets and good play on the part of the McIntyre defence and Brockbank in goal, the Dome had to retire without a point.

**Hampton Gets First Goal**  
Rodgers made a perfect cross to Hampton at centre for the Macs first goal. Dunstan had carried the ball down the inside right and had passed ahead to Rodgers as he met the Dome backs. Rodgers took his time on the cross and the ball came down at the mouth of the net where Hampton was standing in front of Baxter. He headed it away from the goalie to give the Macs the first goal.

It was Billy Rodgers again who started the play a minute or so later that gave McIntyre the second goal. The speedy wing centred again as he had the previous time but Dunstan was not able to reach the ball before he was carried out of play. Mair came in from his wing to reach the loose ball and drove one hard past Baxter.

Dome tried hard to get even one goal before the all ended but the Macs kept up the pressure and were able to make it 3-0 before the whistle. Mair drove the ball almost all the way across the field to Rodgers on the opposite wing. Rodgers came in on the net and let loose a hard, rising shot that deceived Baxter.

Chambers forced a corner before the half was over, but the Dome couldn't make it good for a goal.

**Dome Looks Better**  
In the second half Dome looked better but still had difficulty finding the net. Foster made a number of long kicks to the goal but each time the Macs were able to clear before any damage was done. Willie White had a couple of opportunities but in the hurry to get the ball away, shot high. Paynter was in close once or twice but did not get an open shot.

The fourth McIntyre goal looked lucky. Mair had kicked a corner shot and there had been a scramble several yards out from the net. George Boyd picked it up about 30 yards out, turned, and drove hard. It was a beautiful shot that went just under the bar.

Tierney started the play that gave the Dome's only goal. He picked up the ball after the Macs had made an attempt to clear the ball from their defence area. He put it to the net where Willie White and Chambers passed it around until Chambers got an open shot and put the ball past Brockbank.

The Dome, encouraged by this one goal, peppered Brockbank with shots after that and nearly scored several times. They put every ounce of energy into the last few minutes but had to leave the field with a three-goal deficit.

"That's all wrong," said a young man leaning on the north fence of the McIntyre football field the other day watching a couple of the district teams in action. "I see them once in Prague. They don't put in long like that. Just six, ten, twelve feet from one to the other."

He was a lad who came to Canada a few years ago from Czechoslovakia. This was the first game he had seen in Canada and he was greatly interested. His team was on the field, too, and he wanted them to win. Another young chap tried to tell him that the short passing game was one system and this long swinging business another, sometimes equally effective.

Before the game was over he, like all the rest of the people, was shouting for those deadly long kicks that made the game twice as spectacular as it would otherwise have been.

Football is a real international game now—one of the few that has taken a real hold in most countries of the world. And the type of football being played in the Porcupine to-day is a real surprise to those who come here from other parts of Canada. One recent addition to a Porcupine district team thought when he received an offer to come North that he was going to a place in which football was just beginning and they needed a few men to show them how to play. "It's me who has to learn," said he after his first game. "They play better football here than they do in Toronto."

**Softball Gets More Interesting**  
The Porcupine Men's Softball league is looking more interesting for the teams lower in the standing these days. The surprise win by Friedmans the other night over the league-leading Schumacher team tightened things up a whole lot.

There are still six games to be played: McIntyre vs Palace, Grads vs Friedmans, Westinghouse vs Schumacher, Palace vs Grads and McIntyre vs Friedmans. That gives every team but Westinghouse two games, and Palace three.

Friedmans have a chance to get into the playoffs and here's what has to happen: They must defeat McIntyre and Grads, and Westinghouse must lose to Schumacher. Then, if McIntyre won from Palace there would be a three-corner tie for third place between McIntyre, Westinghouse and Friedmans.

Westinghouse can cinch a chance in the playoffs by defeating Schumacher. McIntyre can tie them by defeating Friedmans and Palace.

And then again, if Schumacher loses the next two games to Palace and Westinghouse, that will make them eligible for the third place race.

Even Palace can drop down plenty in the standing and would get into third place by losing their three games.

It's a nice close race. To-morrow night's game, when McIntyre meets Palace will help to clear the situation and the week-end game between Grads and Friedmans may help. But it's probable that the game between Friedmans and McIntyre, postponed from June 28th will be the deciding one.

The baseball feature of the day will be between McIntyre and one of the Kirk-

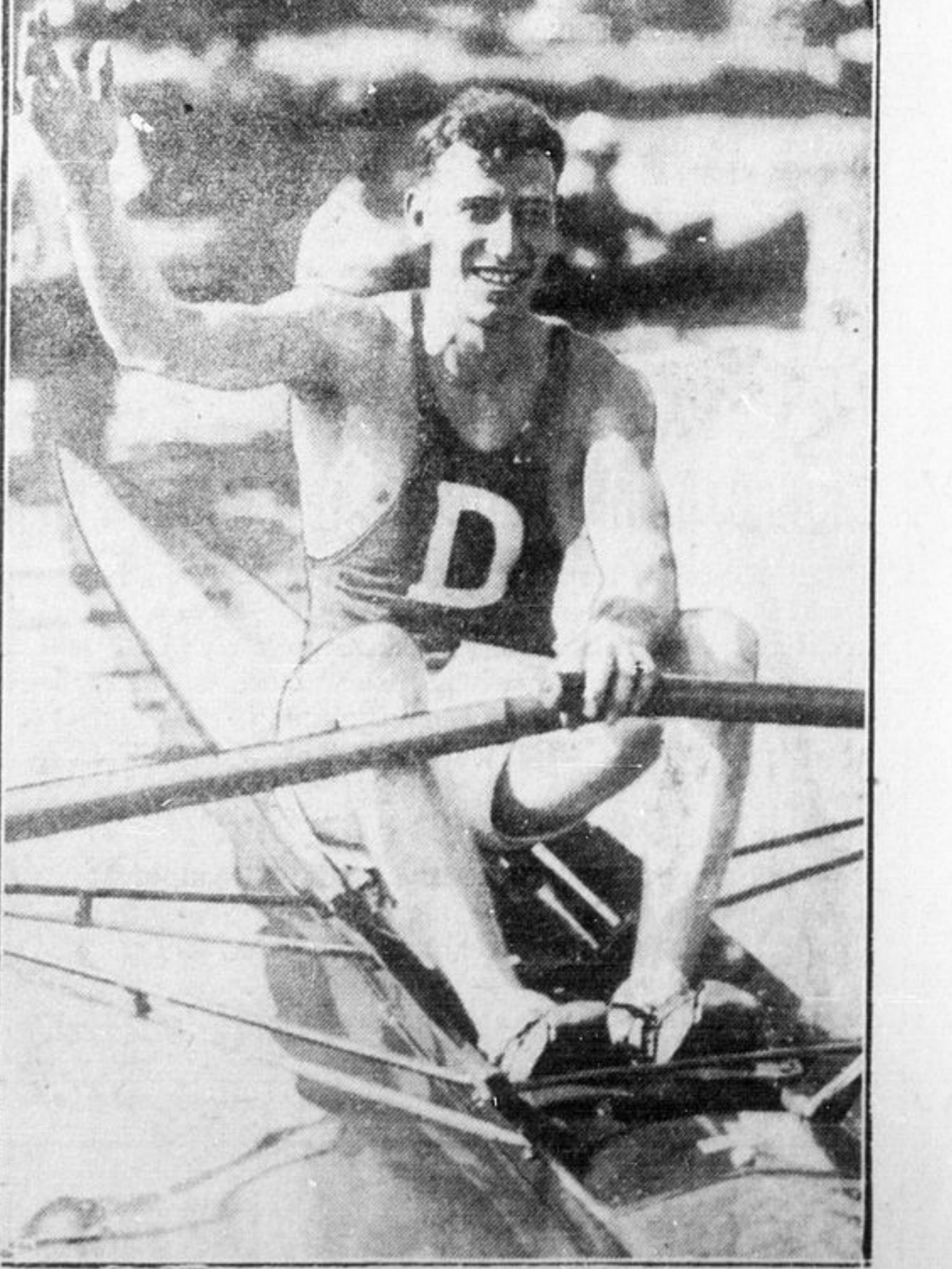
## Macs Meet Porkies At Ball Park Friday
