To Attend the Jubilee of Johannesburg South Africa

This year Johannesburg, South Africa, will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary, the city having been founded in 1886 on the Witwatersrand, after the discovery of gold there. In its 50 years Johannesburg has grown to a city well over 310,000. Reference works give the population as 170,543 white and about 140,000 Negro. One description of the city says:—"Johannesburg is the seat of Witwatersrand University, and has a cathedral, an observatory, a museum, parks, and sports and recreation grounds. Buses and street cars furnish transportation within the city and to and from the many attractive residential suburbs."

The programme for Johannesburg's Jubilee is reported as an outstanding one and likely to attract former residents from the four corners of the world.

In Timmins and district there are many former residents of South Africa who would like to attend the Johannesburg Jubilee. Some of them are planning to go. Among these is W. W. White, a pioneer of the Porcupine mining camp, but a former resident in the South African mining field.

From South Africa comes a very kindly and hearty invitation from Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Roberts, formerly of Timmins, to any from this part of the North who may visit Johannesburg to call on them and renew old times and acquaintanceship. Mr. and Mrs. Roberts were for years residents of Timmins. Mr. Roberts was on the Hollinger staff here, while Mrs. Roberts was formerly Miss Fearn McCarthy, among the town's most popular and esteemed young ladies here.

May Cancel Convictions of Young Men at Cobalt

There is a rather unusual situation in Cobalt in regard to some connected police court cases there. Recently a number of boys were convicted on the charge of stealing a quantity of goods, said to be the property of a gentleman named Adelman. The goods were in the form of old Mining Corporation property. The young men pleaded guilty to the charge, and were given suspended sentence on condition that they pay for the goods alleged to have been stolen and give bonds for future good behaviour, all of which the boys were preparing to do. In the meantime, however, in connection with the same goods, a driver of a fruit truck is charged with receiving stolen goods. When his case came up at Cobalt court, a letter was presented to the court from the man alleged to have lost the goods.

The letter said that the goods had been abandoned by Mr. Adelman and so could hardly be classed as stolen. If the goods were not stolen, then the truck driver could hardly have received stolen goods. If the goods were not stolen but abandoned then the boys were hardly guilty of theft. The fact that the boys pleaded guilty showed that they realized that the goods did not belong to them and that they felt they had no right to take them. However, the magistrate may be depended upon to straighten out the matter with common sense and kindness to all, as well as with justice and the law. The facts of the case will be gone into thoroughly and if investigation shows that the goods were openly abandoned, the boys will likely find even the suspended sentence will be lifted in their case and that they will have a clean sheet again as far as this particular case is concerned.
