Burglaries at Kussner's Dept. Store and Falls Freight Shed Added to Number of Recent Robberies in District. Meeting of the Iroquois Falls Council. Other Iroquois Falls News.

The total of district robberies and attempted robberies already great, was increased by two following burglaries at Kussner's Department Store and the local freight shed offices Friday night. This is the second time this year entry has been made at Kussner's. On this occasion entry was made by a trap door in the roof and after an abortive attempt to get into the safe the aspiring thieves took a number of trinkets. At the freight shed the marauders entered by means of an unlocked window and rifled a drawer containing silver, Allan Stringer, Provincial Police, Chief Ed. Olaverson, Iroquois Falls and Chief Art Groulx, Ansonville, are investigating.

Cars driven by Hillage Adams, Timmins and Leonard Heil, Timmins, figured in a crash at Val Gagne Monday, in which the Heil car was badly damaged. Adams had gone to Val Gagne to pick up passengers and was allegedly moving slowly, in front of the hotel when the car driven by Heil crashed into the rear of Adams' car. In the Heil car, in addition to Heil, were Bernard Peters and John Jones, Sarnia. No one was injured. No charges have been laid. The accident was investigated by Provincial Officer, Allan Stringer, Iroquois Falls.

North Bay Business Men Deny Charges by Hon. Croll

At Toronto this week Hon. D. Croll was quoted as saying that tourists going to North Bay on their way to see the quintuplets were being overcharged at hotels, restaurants, etc. As soon as the despatch was received in North Bay the board of trade there made a speedy check-up of all hotels, cafes, etc., and are very firm in their denial of the charges made by the Minister of Welfare. The rates at all places in the North Bay district are claimed to be fair and reasonable and it is emphatically asserted that there is no exploitation of this kind. The North Bay Board of Trade telegraphed Hon. Mr. Croll inviting the closest investigation and offering full co-operation in any such enquiry. The businessmen of North Bay, however, are said to greatly resent Hon. David Croll's charges, not only because they are not true but also because they believe they are prompted by his dislike for North Bay rather than any reasonable grounds. Visitors to North Bay from this part of the North are inclined to discount the charges as they have not noted any attempt at exploitation. It may be, however, that the people of North Bay can tell a tourist who intends to see the quintuplets from other visitors and so make difference in the rates.
