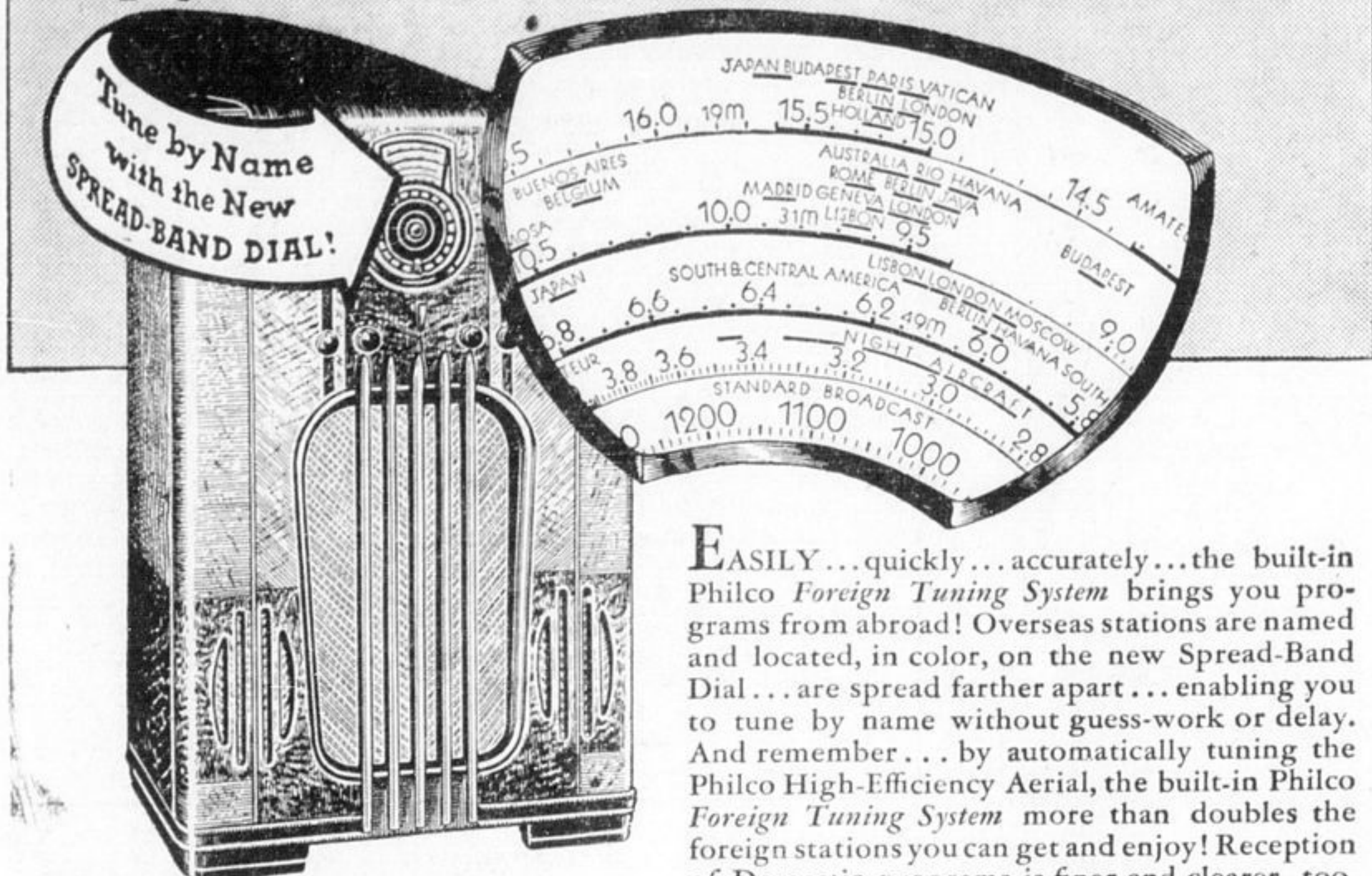

## Sees Danger of Fire at South Porcupine

Real Old-Timer Writes Once More on Danger at Outskirts of South End.

South Porcupine, Ont., Aug. 20th, 1936  
To the Editor of The Advance, Timmins.

Dear Sir:—Last week I drew attention to the dangerous condition of the west, north and south ends of South Porcupine, as far as fire is concerned. If that standing timber were cut into

stove wood, it would be quite a help and if the slash were burned and all that ugly stuff along the creek were removed, it would make things much safer. Say, clear a space on the far side of the creek and then in case of fire the firemen and rangers would have easy access to the creek where the water could be pumped, and in case a bucket brigade might be hired they would have no trouble to get water. But now, as it is, it's a lot of barbed wire you may say. Right between the town and Connaught Hill is a bad spot that should be removed. Just please remember Halleybury went up in smoke, and whoever thought it would, to look at how the country to the west of the

town was cleared. We don't want to see South Porcupine have the same experience, therefore it should be made as safe as possible, and that can be done in a very short time and at very little cost.

## Falls-Monteith Road Now Passable in Dry Weather

The Ansonville-Monteith road, closed since spring despite protests of motorists, has been repaired to the extent where it is passable in dry weather. The big holes have been filled with gravel, and although the road has not yet been graded it is no longer necessary for the motoring public to detour via the rough, hilly and much longer Porquis Junction road. During wet weather the condition of the road is still highly unsatisfactory since clay is being laid on the surface, making it very slippery. One car turned around on the dangerous Meadow Creek hill Tuesday evening during the rain.
