

Kirkland Again Takes Lead in Baseball Final Series

McIntyre Has Many Errors as Hargreaves Wins Here 5-2

Teams Meet Again To-Night at McIntyre Park in Fourth T. B. L. Final. Sam Currie Most Important of Winners' Players.

Wright Hargreaves ball team from Kirkland Lake took a second step toward the championship of the Temiskaming Baseball League yesterday at McIntyre park when they won a 5-2 game from a McIntyre team that made more errors in nine innings than it has in any other game this season.

To-night at five o'clock the two teams meet in the fourth of a best-three-out-of-five series, the standing in which is now Wright Hargreaves 2, McIntyre 1. Six hundred fans saw yesterday's game.

The trouble wasn't with the pitchers' pitching. It was in their fielding. Inky Wood started on the mound for the Maes and erred twice. George McShane, who replaced him in the third inning, made it possible for the visitors to score two runs when he overthrew first base. In earned runs, the teams were tied at two each.

Currie Did Plenty Sam Currie, manager of the Kirkland team, was probably the most important man of the game. He pitched nice steady ball all the time, allowed only five hits, struck out an even half dozen McIntyre men, hit a double in the sixth inning that brought in two runs, argued umpires' decisions and showed good leadership. His team backed him up nicely and made only one error, that in the ninth inning when it was too late for the Maes to start a rally anyway.

It was Currie's double that really won the game. Going into the sixth, the Maes had plenty of hope, for the score was 3-2 and both teams seemed to be working at top form. McIlroy had got on by driving hard through second. Fries tried to sacrifice him to second but McShane threw so wide of first that the ball landed in foul territory just outside right field. Both runners took two bases and would have come home had Umpire Tich let them. Currie swung hard on one of McShane's fast pitches and the ball went sailing into centre field. It looked like a three-bagger. Both runners came across the plate but McDonald pegged to Hann at short who got the ball to Osborn at third in time to catch Currie coming down the baseline. Currie was inclined to argue the decision but from the bench it looked as though Osborn went out with the ball to meet him. It was a nice play. Price fanned to finish off the inning and the scoring.

Had Lead From Start Hargreaves held a lead right from the beginning. Don Price, first batter, walked and went to second as Wood fumbled Rodney's grounder. Little filed out to Joe MacDonald at the plate and Schonfeldt drove one to centre field, allowing Price a base. Lora's single to centre drove Price. McIlroy gave a fielder's choice that caught Lora at second.

A double play prevented any scoring threat by the Maes in their first. Malloy had given Lora in left field a fly when Hann was hit on the wrist with a pitched ball and took his base. Quinn

and Currie threw to McIlroy at second to catch Hann coming down. McIlroy got the ball to Fries at first in time for the double.

The victors added two more in the second. Even a neatly executed double play couldn't stop it. Fries singled to short left and Gallipeau made first as Wood fumbled again. Currie hit into the double by grounding to Norm Hann near second. Hann tossed to Jack Quinn on second and Quinn threw to Cybulski at first for two outs. Fries reached third while this was going on. Price accepted his second walk. Rodney picked out one he liked and drove it just over third base. Fries and Price scored. Little was out at first.

Malloy Gets Best Hit The Maes had their best hitting in the third. With two out, "Brother" McShane hit safely to short left. Malloy leaned on the ball, driving way back to centre field for an easy triple. McShane scored. Hann kept the rally going by grounding between first and second and Malloy scored. Hann stole second but was left there as Quinn fanned. That was the only inning in which the Maes had more than one hit. Not another man got as far as third base. During the rest of the game only Cybulski, who doubled in the fourth and got on through Little's wild peg in the ninth, reached second base.

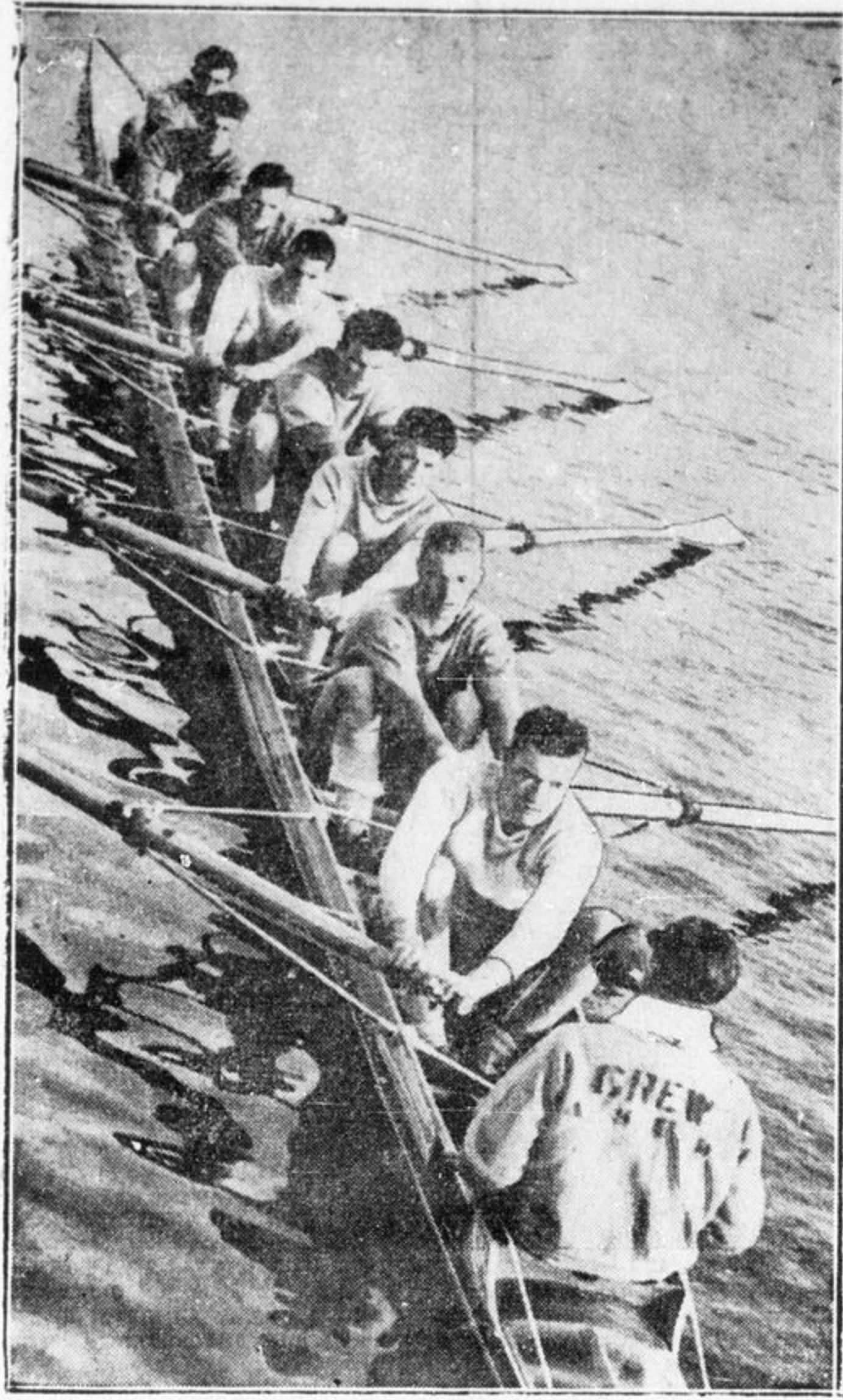

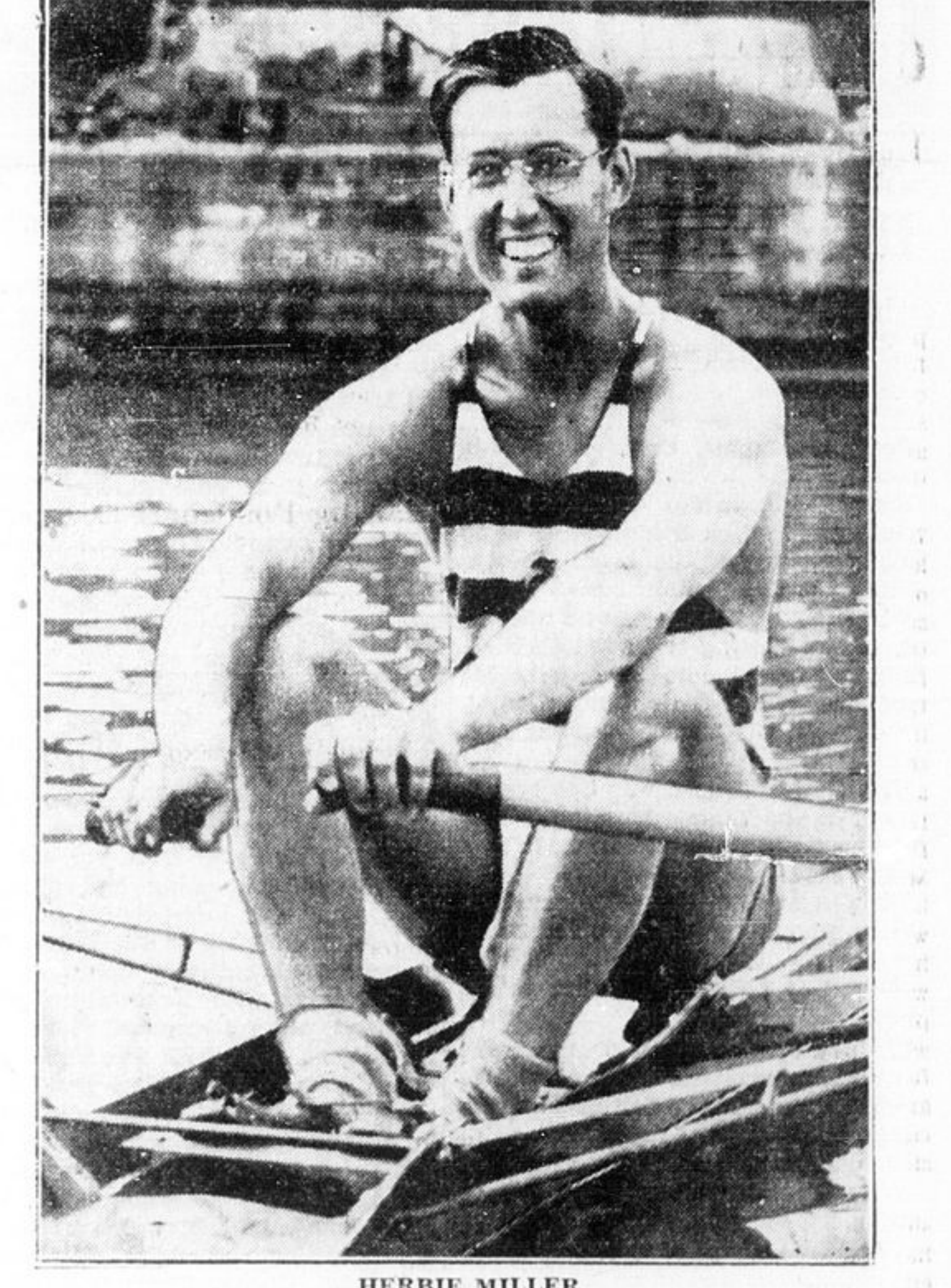
No More Porcupine League Softball
