Another Appeal by the Chief Justice

Hon. F. R. Latchford Gives Notice of Appeal in Cobalt Tax Case.

Cobalt, Ont., Sept. 16th, 1936. Special to The Advance.—Claiming among other grounds that, "in point of fact, the town of Cobalt has been insolvent for years and that no real assessment based upon value could be made without disclosing a state of bankruptcy in the town," Hon. Francis R. Latchford, Chief Justice of the Court of Appeals in Ontario, is carrying to his brethren of the Appellate Division bench his dispute with the town of Cobalt over taxes allegedly owing by him to the corporation on property his Lordship is said to have owned here since the camp's pioneer days. The municipality has a judgment, dated August 12 last, of Mr. Justice Makins, in which it is held that the Chief Justice is liable for approximately \$1150, being taxes for the years 1928-1933 inclusive, with the exception of 1929, for which year the town's claim was disallowed.

The case was heard before Mrs. Justice Makins at the Temiskaming Spring Assizes last April and an appeal against the judgment of Mr. Justice Makins now has been entered by the Chief Justice through his solicitors. Notice of appeal, received here by Joseph A. Legris, K.C., solicitor for the corporation, gives the grounds of the appeal as follows:—

- 1. That the learned judge at the trial erred in law in holding that the assessment forming the basis of the plaintiff's claim was a valid one.
2. That upon the evidence adduced the learned judge should have found that the alleged assessment was a nullity in that:
(a) The assessor failed to make diligent inquiries as required by Section 24 of The Assessment Act.
(b) The assessor failed to value the premises at their "actual value" pursuant to section 40 of the said act.
(c) The assessor did not act independently, but was influenced by the instructions of others.
(d) The assessor acted arbitrarily and did not use his own judgment.
(e) The assessment was entirely out

Auto Plates to be Ready November 1

No Change in Registration Fees, Says Premier Hepburn.

According to an announcement made at Toronto this week by Premier Hepburn, Ontario motor vehicle permits for 1937 will be available to the public on Nov. 1st this year. Motorists in the North will twist their faces a little at the premier's statement that the new policy will save motorists several thousand dollars in transfer fees and will also stimulate the motor business during the early winter months. Even the new plates do not take attention from the old roads.

The premier says there will be no change in the present schedule of fees. In honour of the coronation year, the 1937 plates in addition to white letters and figures will display white crowns on a military scarlet background. The numbering system uses a maximum of five characters, only one letter appearing on any plate, the variation in numbers being accomplished by changing the position of the letter among the figures.

New District Board of Trade for North

Delegates from Kapuskasing, Smooth Rock Falls, Hearst and Cochrane to Organize.

Kapuskasing, Hearst, Smooth Rock Falls and Cochrane are arranging to form a District Board of Trade to deal with matters of general interest in the area along the Transcontinental Railway west of Cochrane. The procedure follows a meeting of representatives from the four towns a month or so ago. Thos. Moore, of Smooth Rock Falls, was appointed as convener of the committee to go ahead with the plan, and an organization meeting has been called to be held in the Community hall, Kapuskasing, on the afternoon and evening of Wednesday, September 23rd to complete the organization. The new District Board of Trade arises from the many local problems common to the towns in the northern part of Cochrane and the need felt for concerted action. It has been felt that these local problems do not come under the full notice of the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade, and also that the cost of attending many meetings of the Associated Boards is too high in time and money for the Northern towns.

Plans for Building Nurses' Residence

Committee Appointed to Deal with the Question.

If the sum of \$55,000 can be raised from the town and the mines, a new nurses' residence will be built in Timmins. A hospital board, formed at a joint meeting of the council with those interested in seeing that St. Mary's hospital has the increased facilities it needs, is now at work making a survey to see how much money can be raised here.

The town has agreed to provide \$7,300 for the work and this amount was set aside in the estimates for this year. It is hoped that the mines in the district, and other sources, will make it possible to raise the \$55,000. Mayor J. P. Bartleman is chairman, with Councilor Dr. E. A. F. Day, E. L. Longmore, D. E. Keeley and Walter Ecclestone the members.
