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### Hint for This Province re Gold Industry Here

An editorial in The Mail and Empire on Tuesday of this week says:— "Johannesburg's Empire Exhibition, already spoken of as 'South Africa's Wembley,' by which the golden city is commemorating its Golden Jubilee, will be formally opened to-day and will last till January 15th. Before the discovery of gold, the annual output of which is to-day worth £70,000,000, there were probably not 50 people in the village on the spot that now carries a magnificent city of 500,000. The British government has marked its sense of the importance not only of the commemoration but of the position which the Rand has made for South Africa in the economy of the Empire and the whole world, by erecting a pavilion second only in size to that of the South African government. The magnificent display of gems at the Exhibition is described by a correspondent in another column.

### Thinks Ogoki River Scheme Impractical

M.P. for Davenport Thinks it "Fanciful," and Likely to Cost \$155,000,000.

Newspapers in the North have consistently condemned the Ogoki River dam scheme as impractical and harmful. In an editorial article this week The Sudbury Star has the following:—"A fanciful scheme," says J. F. MacNicol, M.P. for Davenport, Toronto, in referring to the scheme of the Ontario government and Hydro-Electric Commission to divert the waters of the Ogoki River from their natural flow into the Albany River and thence to James Bay, to Lake Nipigon and the Great Lakes, in order to provide more electric power.

"And as to the cost, Mr. MacNicol believes that the estimates of the Chicago engineers made in 1925 amounting to \$155,000,000, would come nearer to the mark than the figures of Hydro engineers, who say the cost will be approximately \$5,000,000.

"Then the question of submerging thousands of square miles of territory of great potential value, as brought up by The Sudbury Star and other newspapers, is something about which the Toronto M.P. issues warning. 'Wouldn't the proposed Ogoki Lake submerge thousands of square miles of valuable mineral, timber, hunting and other lands?' asks Mr. MacNicol. 'Wouldn't the Ogoki diversion destroy the present potential power possibilities of the Ogoki at several fine power sites? Who can predict what magnificent developments may take place in that great area north of the height of land for which Ogoki power will be required in the future.'

'Great Lakes levels could be adequately raised and maintained by the creation of storage lakes through the placing at strategic points of compensating gates similar to those at Sault Ste. Marie that maintain the level of Lake Superior, Mr. MacNicol claims. He urges strongly that the government inaugurate reforestation of all waste lands, especially along the St. Lawrence watershed, to retard the too speedy flow of waters at present going to waste from the storage standpoint. Reforestation is calculated to bring about a greater rainfall that would also fill natural reservoirs.

"Above all, the suggestion that the province go slow on the projected scheme is a timely one. Not all men are engineers, but there are many well qualified observers who claim that the estimates made by Hydro of the probable cost of the Ogoki River diversion are far too conservative. This factor alone should make the authorities hesitate before launching the province into the scheme that has many bad features and uncertainties."

### Production at the Dome for the Month of August

Dome Mines, for the month of August treated 47,200 tons of ore and produced bullion to the value of \$636,493, according to official estimate received Tuesday night. For the month immediately preceding the company milled 45,300 tons of ore with bullion recovery of \$625,000. For the eight months ending with August, production has a total estimated value of \$4,651,496.

### Visit to Timmins Essential to See Mines and North

Ottawa Board of Trade is planning to visit the North to see the country and especially the mining area. The plan as outlined provides only for a visit to Kirkland Lake and Noranda. This is a mistake. No proper appreciation of the North and the mines of Ontario is possible without a visit to Timmins and Porcupine. This point is very aptly and ably stressed by The Ottawa Journal yesterday in the following editorial:—

"Ottawa Board of Trade is planning for 50 of its members a visit to certain mining areas in Northern Ontario and Northern Quebec. The tour is to include the Kirkland Lake and Noranda regions, Taschereau and Amos. 'This is splendid. It is important that Ottawa business men should increase their knowledge of the North, more especially by the personal contacts that mean so much in commercial affairs. A visit to the mining areas is a revelation of their wealth, their relative prosperity, and brings some appreciation of their place in the national scheme. 'But the proposed tour, while good,

does not go far enough. It should be extended to the rich Porcupine area, of which Timmins is the centre, where Hollinger and other great gold mines pour out day by day their contribution to Canadian wealth. No visit to Northern Ontario's mining country can be called complete if the Porcupine camps are to be overlooked. 'The trip has to be confined within brief limits, but even so The Journal thinks it would be unfortunate to pass up the Timmins district.'

### Definite Policy on Timber Limits Now

Premier and Cabinet Seeking Settled Plan of Procedure.

Yesterday there was a special meeting of Premier Hepburn and his Cabinet, the chief purpose being, it is understood, to formulate a definite policy in reference to the allocation of pulpwood and timber limits in Ontario. Some settled policy in Ontario, absolutely necessary in view of the continued and pressing requests for new areas from operators who have found increasing markets in the United States. Premier Hepburn is quoted as saying that the increased markets are due to the government's action in lifting the export embargo a year ago, as well as in reducing the stumpage dues. Some of it he also credited to the fear on the part of the United States newspaper makers that another European war would seriously embarrass, if not eliminate altogether, their sources of supply. The United States pulp buyers, according to Premier Hepburn, were quite reluctant to tie up with European sources when pulp could be obtained in Ontario.

### Penn Porcupine Mine Doing Further Work

Trenching and Surface Work Carried on. Diamond Drilling to be Done This Winter.

Jos. H. Thomas, one of the old-time prospectors of the Porcupine, who has been resident in Detroit for 16 years or more, was back in Timmins last week and called on many old friends here. Mr. Thomas will be remembered by all the old-timers in the district. While coming here chiefly on a holiday trip, Mr. Thomas combined business with pleasure, taking opportunity to overlook the work on one of the mining properties in which he has chief interest. This is the Penn Porcupine Mines in Ogden township. Recent work on this property including considerable trenching and other surface work has brought very encouraging results. It is the intention to do diamond drilling on the Penn Porcupine during the coming winter and the present work has been carried out with the plan of preparing for the diamond drilling which it is expected will prove up the property and warrant an extended programme of development.

### Drilling Started on the North Whitney Mines Ltd.

Diamond drilling on the property of North Whitney Mines Ltd. has started and two holes have been completed on the No. 1 vein. The Northern Miner learned in a telephone conversation with G. R. Rainville, at Montreal, president of Quebec Gold Mining Corporation, which company is financing the current exploratory campaign. No vein material at all was intersected in the first hole, but the No. 2 hole drilled below No. 1 intersected values from 272 to 293 ft. The intersection cannot really be considered commercial but one five-foot section gave values of 69 oz. and a second section of four feet assayed 13 oz. A second drill has been ordered and is to go into operation next week.

The North Whitney Mines property is an amalgamation of claims formerly held by the Keora, South Keora Mines and North Whitney Syndicate. The property adjoins the west boundary of Pamour. Diamond drilling done several years ago and surface exploration indicated some interesting values over good widths on the No. 1 vein. Two holes spaced 100 ft. apart are stated to have yielded intersections of \$10.40 across nine feet and \$10.95 across 16 ft.

### Installing Diesel Plant at the Wascanna Mines

Officials of Wascanna Gold Mines, Ltd., announce that preparations are proceeding for the early commencement of the proposed extensive underground development campaign. In this connection it is stated that a new 750 cubic foot compressor and diesel engine have been ordered and will be delivered to the property within the next few weeks. Foundations are now being laid for the new diesel power plant. A new hoist capable of carrying operations to a depth of 600 feet has been purchased and will be delivered without delay.

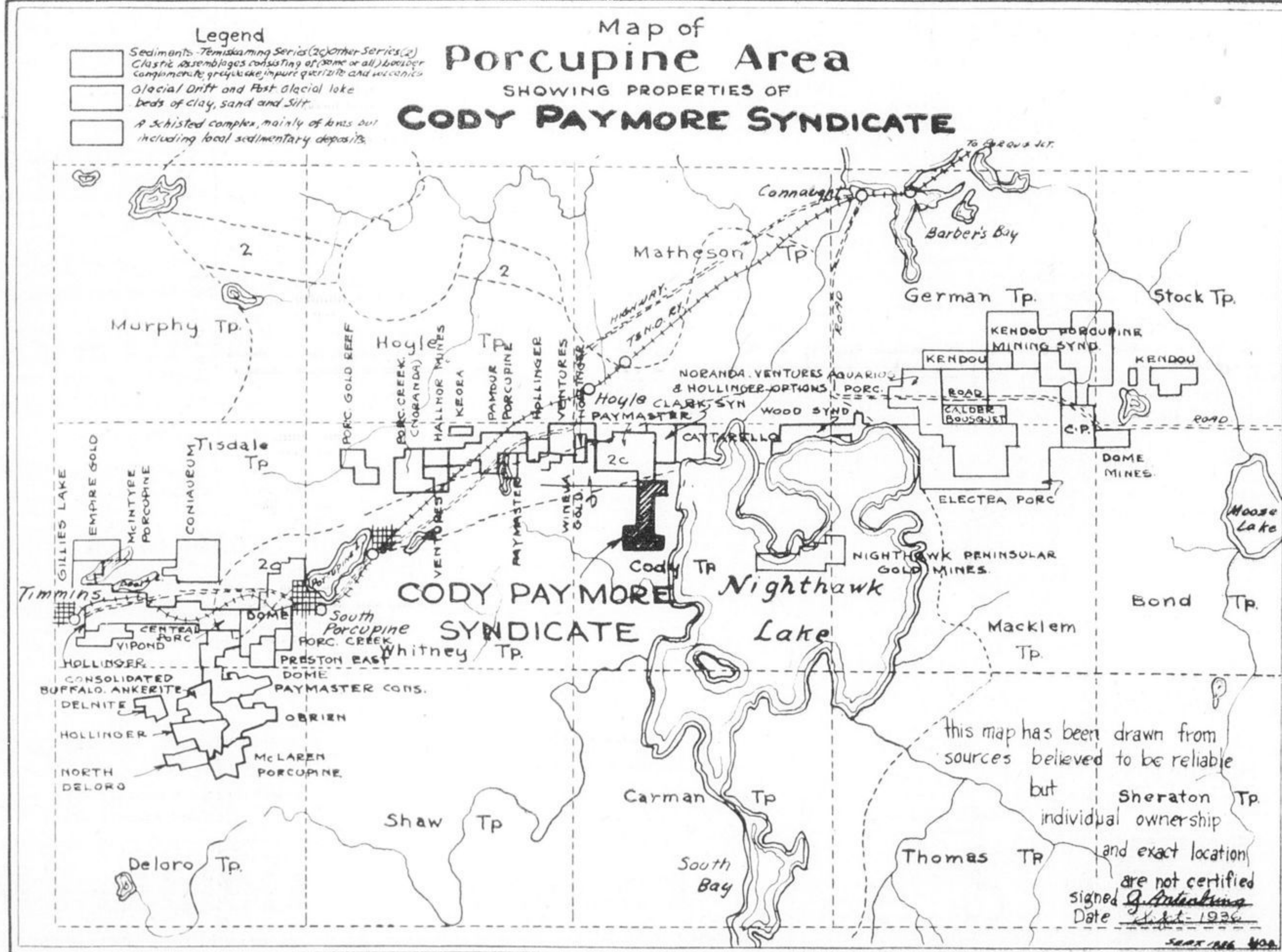
P. W. Meahan, M.E., has arrived at the property, and under his direction a crew of men is actively engaged installing new machinery. The construction of new permanent camp buildings is well under way. It is the intention of the management to carry the shaft down to greater depth, following which intensive lateral work will be proceeded with to develop the known ore bodies. The engineering staff of the parent company, Fort Rouille Mining Corporation, will inspect the property as development work advances.
