

Twenty-two Will Try Out for Timmins Hockey Team

Hockey Club Strengthened Through Arrival of New Men

Durham, Toronto, Brockville, Sudbury, Quebec and the West Contribute to Team This Year, Along With Last Year's Best

Timmins hockey club isn't promising any championships for the town during the coming winter but they admit they've laid the foundation for one of the best teams in recent years at least. There's no lack of material this time. Early organization, careful choice of men, and excellent co-operation from Timmins and Schumacher has made the hockey executive's job a lot easier this year. Dr. E. A. F. Day, president and Fred Quesnel, manager, have been hard at work on hockey ever since last winter.

Here are some of the results of their labours that will make Porkies, Lake Shore and Noranda look to their laurels:

Bill Sommerville, goalie, practiced with Toronto Maple Leafs last fall. Used to say he was from Toronto, but now it's "McIntyre."

Barney Fowler, another goalie, six-footer, played with Brockville's Magdanas last year until Tony Grabowski broke his jaw in a couple of places.

Gordon Thompson, defence, already known in the North for he played with Sudbury Cubs in 1932-33.

Mort Lauder, coached the championship Durham team last year, and plays left wing as well. Is an ex-professional and now works at the McIntyre.

Raybold, another man from Durham from whom Timmins fans may expect real action. Played with Lauder last year at centre.

Ray Morgan, right winger, is another with experience in the North. Played with Thompson on the Sudbury Cub Wolves in the same year.

Eddie Malone, wing, has been seen in action on Timmins ice before, but

in a Noranda uniform. Lloyd Kerr, left wing or centre, came here from the West last year and made a good impression, but couldn't get a transfer. Is all set for the season. Calls Conlaunum home.

Many Others to Try Out
There are others who have come in on their own, found jobs, and say they want to try out with the team. Among them are three from Quebec leagues: Leclaire, defence; Vaillancourt; and Demontigny, another defenceman. Smith, from the West, is a veteran at the game and still itches to get into skates when the first ice is made. There are still more who have said they might be in Timmins this week.

Then, of the players who appeared on the ice last year, the best are still here. Bob Kennedy will try out for senior this year. Jack Young, Sparky Vail, Carson Miller, Joe Miller, Jo-Jo Tremblay and Chevrier are as enthusiastic as ever and looking forward to a real season. Rene Lortie is still in town. Red Auger and Bill Arundel will in all probability be on the job.

That makes 22 men—among them some fine material for Mort Lauder to whip into shape. And Mort is already on the job.

From All Levels

Too early to talk hockey? Not a bit of it. The gates come down next week on roving hockey players of Ontario. The place that's to win the Allan Cup is really decided right now. It's only a matter of playing a few games.

In all probability the amateur championship will go once again to a mining centre. Kimberly, Sudbury, Kirkland Lake—all have been bragging about the hockey talent that has been flowing in from other parts of Canada. But the Porcupine has not been neglected as anyone may see from the partial list of those who will try out for the Timmins team this year, published in this issue.

Dome hasn't been asleep at the switch either. Plenty of new faces will be seen in the Porkies' uniform when the season opens.

Many Eligibles at Sudbury
Max Silverman of Sudbury predicts that the Allan Cup will come North. This is how the Sudbury Star figures it: "Either Kirkland Lake or a Nickel Belt club will be the eventual winners of the coveted silverware, claims Max, and he bases his prediction on the number of classy players who will this year be eligible in the Nickel District and Kirkland Lake. Among the outstanding men who will get the nod this year (who were not qualified last year on account of transfers) are Frank Graham and Frank LeVigne, of Frood; Higginbottom, Creighton goalie; Rae and Meadows, who were with Creighton last season; Miller and Hamel, of Falconbridge, and McGlashen and Shields of Creighton. Salonen and Mermanson, the pesky pair of second string Creighton forwards, will be eligible if they return from the Lakehead, where they have been spending the summer."

New League at Lakehead
Changes are coming at the Lakehead, too. Port Arthur, Port William, Duluth, Superior and a couple of other towns are trying to form an international amateur league. That might leave them out of the Allan Cup play-downs, but it seems a sensible thing for the towns on both sides of the international border. Both are isolated from other parts of their own countries.

Switch to E.O.B.A.?
Both Sudbury and North Bay seem to favour affiliation with the Eastern Ontario Baseball Association rather than with the Southern Ontario leagues in which they operate at present. The kick is that they keep on playing baseball finals down south long after the baseball season in the North is over. In the East, they finish up about the first week in September.

There is no need for either the Sudbury league or the North Bay teams to affiliate directly with the E.O.B.A. The Temiskaming Baseball league is already providing a good governing body for baseball in the North and has affiliation with the E.O.B.A. already. But Sudbury will have to go at it in a little different way than they did last time if they expect to get the full co-operation of Porcupine and Kirkland Lake district teams.

Hockey a Month Away
It's less than a month now till the big hockey league gets under way again. On Thursday, November 5th, the Stanley Cup holders, Detroit Red Wings, will be in Toronto and the Chicago Black Hawks entertain the New York Americans.

May Stay Here
Rolly Richer and Spider McKinnon were still around town this week. Both these Timmins lads would rather be here than away from here for another hockey season.

Right For Once
So the dopsters on the World Series were right this year. It all went according to the odds laid out by New York almost a week before the games were started.

Iroquois Falls Rod and Gun Club Meet

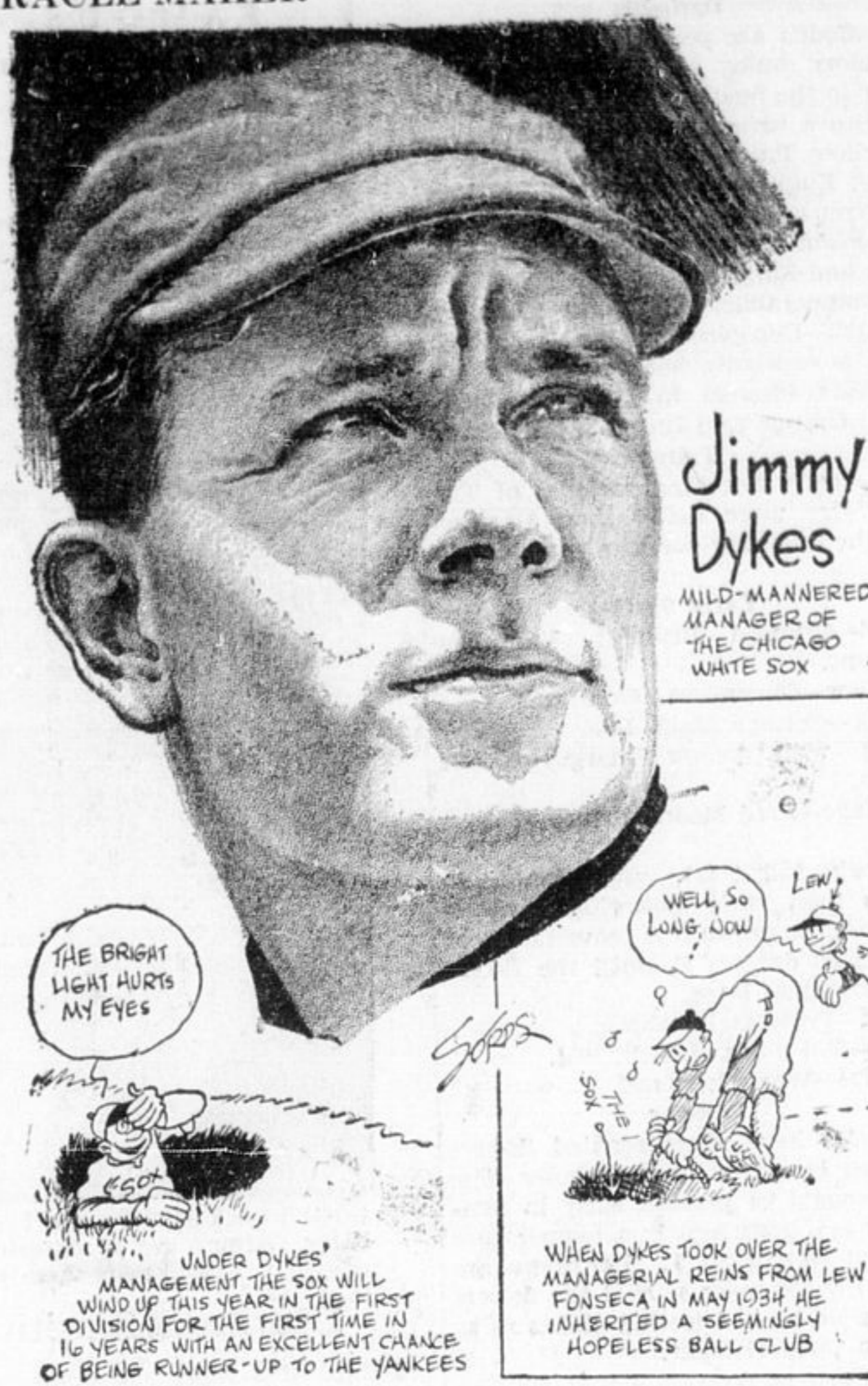
Correspondence Received from Dept. of Game and Fisheries.

Correspondence from the Department of Game and Fisheries explaining that sanction of patent holders at Nellis Lake would be required before to all fishing during the winter months was read at Monday evening's meeting of the Iroquois Falls and District Rod and Gun Club. In order to protect fish which are being planted in the lake by the club a petition was circulated and forwarded to Toronto. The secretary was instructed to get in touch with the holders of lots on the lake with a view to securing their signatures to the petition.

Word was also received from the Department that the club's applications for speckled trout for the district had all been forwarded to the Petawawa Hatchery. This was in reply to a letter from the club, anxious at the failure of the 1936 shipment to arrive. Ordinarily the trout are received in September but to date this year none have been received.

Although the Porcupine club was not a member of the Zone last year, the delegates were very much impressed with the good work of the organization and will speak favourably of affiliation at the annual meeting of the local skiers.

Cliff Re-Elected
H. C. Cliff, known throughout Canada for his interest in skiing organization, was re-elected president of the Zone, and Al Wilson is secretary once more.

Motion pictures of the winter sports at the Olympic games, particularly the skiing events, were shown to the delegates in the afternoon. These were so

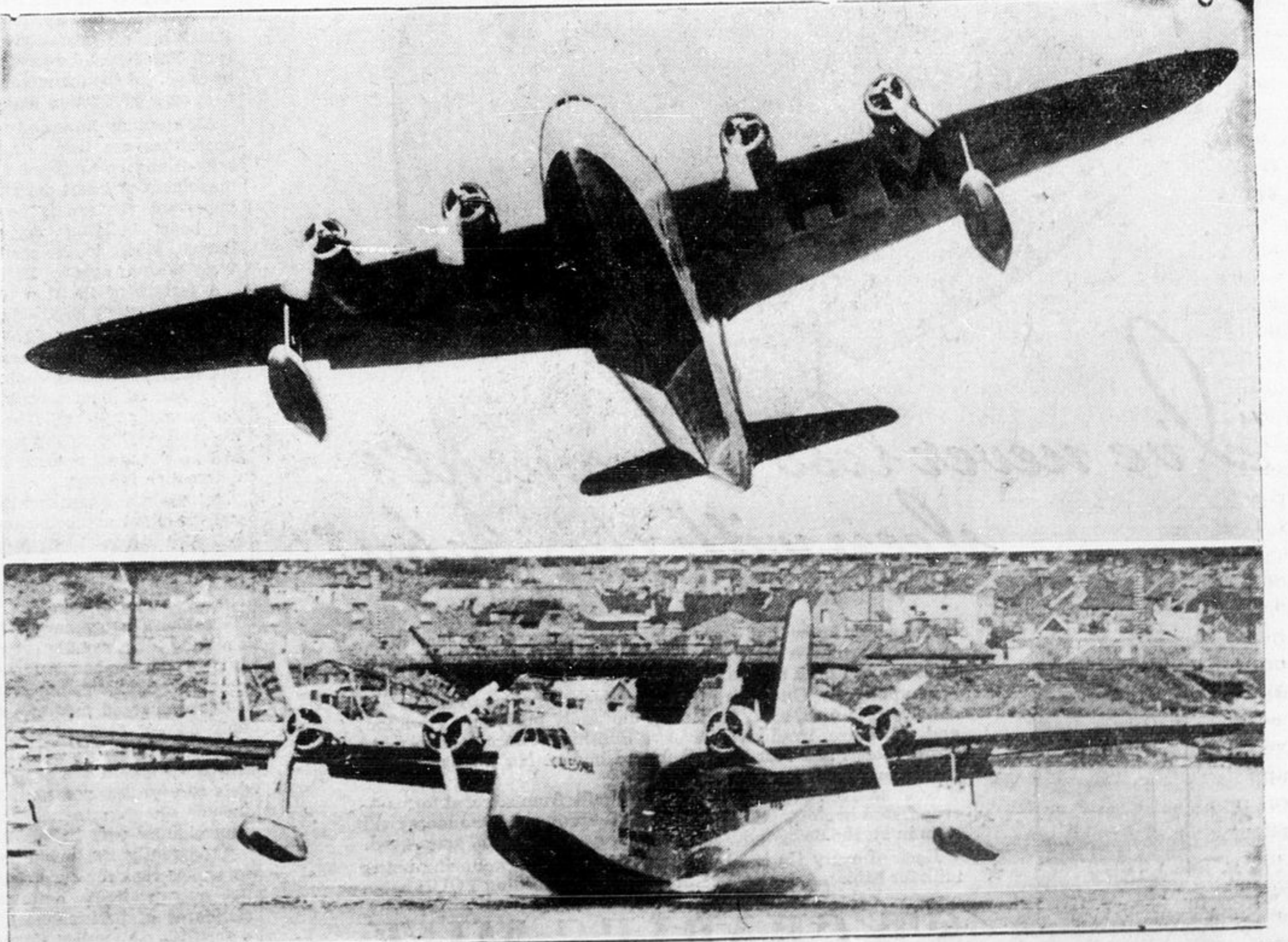
