Iroquois Falls Rod and Gun Club Meet


Correspondence Received from Dept. of Game and Fisheries.

Correspondence from the Department of Game and Fisheries explaining that sanction of patent holders at Nellie Lake would be required before the club petition to have the lake closed to all fishing during the winter months was read at Monday evening's meeting of the Iroquois Falls and District Rod and Gun Club. In order to protect fish which are being planted in the lake by the club a petition was circulated and forwarded to Toronto. The secretary was instructed to get in touch with the holders of lots on the lake with a view to securing their signatures to the petition.

Word was also received from the Department that the club's applications for speckled trout for the district had all been forwarded to the Petawawa Hatchery. This was in reply to a letter from the club, anxious at the failure of the 1936 shipment to arrive. Ordinarily the trout are received in September but to date this year none have been received.


